

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# New Associate Priest For Avening and Cherington

As many of you will by now have heard, shortly after we went to press with the last edition of the villager the following announcement was made:-

#### **Appointment of Peter Quinnell**

We are delighted to announce the appointment of The Reverend Peter Quinnell as Associate Priest for the Benefice of Avening and Cherington. Many of you may know Peter from his time as Area Dean of Cirencester (2006-2008), while he was Rector of Stratton, North Cerney, Baunton & Bagendon. Peter joins us now from The Whitewater Benefice in the Diocese of Winchester, where he has been Rector for five years. Peter will be serving as a House for Duty priest, working three days a week with Poppy as Rector of the Benefice of Avening and Cherington. He will be living in the Vicarage in Avening with his wife Jean, they have two married daughters and six grandchildren living nearby.

The benefice of Avening and Cherington and the Benefice of Tetbury, Beverston, Long Newnton and Shipton Moyne will be "held in plurality". We are now planning a licensing service for Peter in March 2014, when Poppy will also be made Rector of the two benefices.

It is important to note that we are remaining a separate benefice although we will be sharing a rector, this should also mean that we can share resources with the Tetbury benefice on some occasions to the benefit of all parishes, Rev Poppy is already planning a day when all of the Church Council members will get together to get to know one another and share ideas.

In the meantime we are still in a vacancy and the Church Wardens should be contacted for any extra services that are required in the church.

#### The Menin Gate: Armistice 2013

This year is the hundredth anniversary of the outbreak of the first World War and there will be many events planned to commemorate the men who lost their lives. It is difficult for us, so far removed in time, to really relate to the horrors of that war or appreciate the scale of the loss of life and devastation to towns and villages.

This last November, I wanted to see for myself where some of the fighting took place during those terrible years of war. With others, I set out to Ypres, to stand alongside many thousands in the town square close to the Menin Gate to pay tribute to those who have died in the fighting. On the morning of the 11<sup>th</sup> we boarded a bus in Bruges and drove towards the town of Ypres. In no time we were in a queue of buses and cars approaching the town, and, as the traffic slowed, we could see on either side of the road, hundreds of acres of cemeteries, and row upon row of identical tombstones marking the graves of the half million men who were killed in the four years of fighting over the staggeringly few eight miles between Ypres and Pachendale. A sobering and awesome sight.

As well as wanting to pay my own tribute to the men of Great Britain and the Commonwealth, I had another mission which was to find three Avening men who have no known grave but have their names inscribed on the Menin Gate. I had been given a map reference researched by our archivist Fred Vening, of the place where one of the men, Alfred William Risby had fallen. We passed the very spot and paid a silent tribute to him.



We were blessed with a glorious day, cold but bright and sunny. On arrival at Ypres, we disembarked from the bus and hurriedly looked for a place of advantage from which to watch the procession and the ceremony at the Gate. The main square of Ypres is very beautiful. A typical Flemish and Medieval town Square to all appearances, and it is hard to believe that the houses, clock hall and churches were all flattened in the war. The citizens of the town painstakingly searched through the rubble to find the stones and bricks with which to rebuild the town after the war.

As we waited, the Church bells began to toll and the crowd fell silent. We could just hear the sound of approaching military bands and marching feet. Before long, the Regimental Banners could be seen above the heads of the crowds, and then the leading band came into sight followed by contingent after contingent of marching men. The uniformed men were of many different nationalities, Belgian, Canadian, British, Australian, Gurkhas, South African among others, and a band of the Royal British Legion. Following them were Firemen, Medical Corps and Police.

Hundreds marched by and I couldn't help but stand a little taller when my father's regiment passed with other guards' regiments looking magnificent in their Bearskins and great coats. All came to a halt by the Menin Gate and only the piped



band of the Scots Guards kept playing as the dignitaries began to arrive. The Crown Prince of Belgium arrived to take the salute, and the Ceremony began. The hymns were all familiar to us as they were those we sing at our traditional memorial services, and they seemed to be equally well known by the thousand or so people around us. The Salutation: "They shall grow not old as we who are left grow old" was somehow even more poignant than ever with the evidence of the sacrifice of a whole generation of young men who do not have a grave so their names cover every wall of the Menin Gate. The Buglers sounded the Last Post and Reveille, as the crowds stood with bowed heads, followed by the plaintiff notes of 'The Flowers of the Forest' by a lone Scots Piper.

The laying of wreaths followed, laid by the dignitaries of many countries and hundreds of others who brought their own flowers. However, our attention was soon diverted by the sounds of hooves coming over cobbled streets in the distance and on into the Square. Black horses from the Household Cavalry pulled an empty gun carriage through the square escorted by a contingent of mounted soldiers. The crowd fell silent again as the gun carriage drew up under the Menin Gate greeted by a fanfare of trumpets and groups of Flemish and British schoolchildren who had filled bags of soil from each of the 75 cemeteries surrounding the town. When the gun carriage was loaded the bags were covered in a black cloth and HRH the Duke of Edinburgh, came forward to accept the gift on behalf of the Brigade of Guards, to whom it was being presented by the Flemish people and the children. The procession moved off to begin the long journey to London, where the soil is to be used to create a memorial garden at Wellington Barracks, which will be opened by Her Majesty the Queen on Remembrance



Day this year. It was the most moving and profound ceremony, simple and dignified, at which we all felt privileged to witness and attend. The Royal visitors and the officials now left and we made our way to the Gate to complete the mission to find the names of the men of Avening.

Many thousands of names are inscribed on the walls of the Gate, a shocking and saddening sight. Column after column dedicated to each Country and Regiment. We had made enquiries as to where we would find the names for which we were looking so it was not too difficult: Charles Fletcher, Percy Sharpe and Alfred William Risby. We paid our respects to

them in silent prayer, and felt a surge of pride as well as sadness, that these young men had courageously volunteered to leave Avening to go and fight for their King and Country, and paid the ultimate Sacrifice.

Their names are on the War Memorial in Holy Cross Church and the relatives of both Charles Fletcher and Percy Sharp still live in the village.

#### **Derrick and Doreen Pierce**



We have finished iust celebrating Christmas and seen in the New Year during the 'vacancy' period in our Church. Everyone has worked hard to make this a very happy period and this is in no small part due to Derrick, our licensed Lay Reader, and his wife Doreen. She, with others, took on the task of making sure that one of the central events of the Christmas festivities, the Crib Service, was again the successful and well once supported occasion it has been in past

years. Derrick has been stalwart in recent months not only in taking services but in seeing that the pastoral life of the parish continues smoothly pending the arrival of the new incumbent. It therefore seemed to be entirely appropriate that this edition should include a little bit about this remarkable couple and their lives before coming to Avening, as well as since they came here.

Earlier in the month, Doreen and Derrick and I settled down in their home to discuss life in general and their lives in particular, enjoying a cup of coffee and a piece of one of Doreen's delicious homemade cakes.

I was really surprised to discover that they are still almost 'new comers' to the village, having lived here just under ten years, but in that time they have become an integral part of village life.

Both spoke warmly of childhoods of great happiness. Doreen described her early life as being idyllic. Born in 1941, she lived at Sudeley, where her father ran the dairy farm and her mother made the butter for the Castle. The animals spent their whole lives on the farm and at the end were slaughtered on the estate. What a happy contrast to so many farms today, where the animals are driven many miles to meet their end. Everything necessary for the running of a large estate, including, for example, the laundry, was found on the estate. Doreen's companions during her youth were the Dent-Brocklehurst children; playing in the moat and all around the wonderful gardens. She remembers the Italian and German POWs, who helped on the farm, with great fondness. By comparison with many of her contemporaries, the farmhouse in which the family lived was the height of modernity. When Doreen was eighteen her father bought his own farm at Olveston. By contrast this wasn't half so well appointed!

Derrick, born in 1944, remembers a different, but equally happy start in life.

His grandfather had also been a farmer, but his father followed a different path and became an accountant. The family lived in some comfort in Stoke Gifford. Derrick was the eldest child, with a younger brother and twin sisters. Before his birth his mother was admitted to Hambrook Hospital for the delivery. In the days before the NHS, such care had to be paid for privately and Derrick was amused to find, amongst his father's papers, a receipted bill for the princely sum of £5 10shillings, for his mother's stay in the hospital, which included a period of convalescence of a week following his birth.

Once she was eighteen, Doreen studied Domestic Science at Gloucester College. She speaks warmly of the course she followed, which gave her the skills, which she has enjoyed using all her life. The students were taught the art of dressmaking, as well as all things culinary. Her first job was based in Cardiff and was with the Wales Electricity Board, giving talks and demonstrations as a Home Economist. I gather that this was on a trainee basis and it lasted about six months. She obviously was a great success, because this was followed by permanent appointments with the MEB, first in Stroud and then in Chipping Sodbury, where she could live at home.

Meanwhile Derrick, following his grandfather, hankered to go into farming. From the age of 13-16 he attended Brymore School in Somerset. This is a boarding school, with its own farm attached, which provides not only a general education, but also a chance for the pupils to learn the skills needed to become a farmer. Derrick loved it. After he left, he spent a year at Hartpury College and thereafter spent a few years working on various farms gaining experience. However, there came a time, when he realised that he did not wish to continue working long and arduous hours for other people, earning relatively little and with no real hope of ever having a farm of his own. He moved into the seed trade, starting in the stores and working his way up through the business, including working as a crop inspector and seed merchant. Eventually he became the assistant general manager for Chamberlain Pole. He had spent ten interesting years with them, but sadly at about this time, his hip began playing up and he realised that he might have to rethink where his career was going.

Turning to their earlier lives, I asked how Doreen and Derrick had met and discovered how lucky it was that Derrick had looked to farming as a way of life and that Doreen had been born on a farm. Naturally they both saw joining Young Farmers as a way of developing a social life. It worked! They met and eventually married in 1968, with their first child Brian born in 1972 and their second Catherine in 1974. Once the children arrived, Doreen gave up work, but her skill in making beautiful cakes, meant that she continued to supplement the family income by creating masterpieces for people over the years. Whilst I was with them, she showed me one of her recent creations, which she made to celebrate their Ruby Wedding.

Fairly soon after they married, Derrick and Doreen moved to Kingswood, which is just outside Wotton-under-Edge, where they lived for thirty two years.

Their faith had always been important to them and it was whilst they were living in Kingswood, where Derrick was Churchwarden that he decided to offer himself for training as a Lay Reader. Following a fairly gruelling two year course at the Gloucester School for Ministry, he was licensed in 1995. Not only has Derrick always enjoyed this work, but on a personal level, he has felt that it helped to bring him out of himself. As a young man, he had felt very shy and uncertain of himself in social situations. Following his initial licensing whilst living at Kingswood, Derrick has moved twice and each move has necessitated a re-licensing in the new parish and diocese, so I think it is safe to say that he has been well and truly licensed!

Once it was clear that Derrick's hip would no longer allow him to continue with his work as a seed merchant, he and Doreen had to think hard as to

what they wanted to do with their lives. They eventually decided that it would be good to work together and bought a shop/post office in Oake in Somerset in 2000. They set off in trepidation, having sold their much loved house in Kingswood. The shop was a very modest affair, but with their usual enthusiasm Derrick and Doreen set out to transform it. which they obviously did. Whilst I was with them. Doreen showed large lever arch me

crammed with letters and cards of warm appreciation for all that they achieved, whilst there. It was only a four year stint, but quite obviously they had become a much loved part of the community in that short time. Then it was time to go. Their daughter-in-law, who lives in Gloucestershire, was expecting her first child and they were determined to be as full time grandparents as possible.

In order to pursue this aim, the shop was sold and they came to Avening in 2004. Here, they quickly became 'embedded' in the community. Doreen plays a full part in the Tetbury Art Society, acting as the Social Secretary. She is also an enthusiastic member of the Avening Art Society. On the home front, Doreen is in seventh heaven, once again knitting and sewing beautiful things, like her Noah's Ark, for the next generation of Pierces, and fetching and carrying grandchildren to and from their schools. Doreen is also involved in the Sunday School, whilst Derrick sings with Avening Angels.

I left their house feeling invigorated. Derrick and Doreen seem to have that wonderful thing, total contentment in each other's company and a unity of purpose in their life together. Thank you for talking to me and sharing that feeling of happiness.



The film is set mainly in San Francisco in present day and using flashbacks-in-time it cleverly unpicks the reasons for the demise and breakdown of its main character Jasmine, a once prosperous, wealthy, trophy-wife of a successful financier who quite suddenly goes from riches to rags after her husband is publically disgraced and she comes to realise her life is a very long way from being perfect. Jasmine throws herself on the mercy of her sister who lives world apart from her and has very different priorities but she welcomes Jasmine into her home and attempts to support her despite past grievances. Jasmine slowly starts to try to make a new life although the road to finding herself is not a smooth one and she struggles to fit into a very different existence. Wonderfully unpredictable and incredibly captivating,

Blue Jasmine is a perhaps unexpected jewel of a film and is definitely well worth watching.

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

January, named after the two-faced god, Janus, is associated with looking both forwards and backwards. Winter is a time for taking stock and gardening in the head rather than on the ground. To borrow from the title of a delightful little book, A Gentle Plea for Chaos by Mirabel Ostler, I should like to make a 'gentle plea for planning'. We need sometimes to consider the design of our plot, whatever its dimensions, peruse the catalogues, the plant lists and planting suggestions.

The idea of design need not be intimidating. Think: Seasonal Interest, Focal Points, Vistas and Variety! There are flowers in winter, too. *Viburnum x bodnantense* has, in defiance of the downpours, been flowering for the past couple of months. The scent is gorgeous, too.A plant that draws the eye does not need to shout, 'Look at me!' in all its gaudiness. There is often as much interest in a shrub that has tiny or insignificant flowers, but delights in the texture and reflective surface of its leaves. The many species and varieties of hebe may be useful for small-scale structure. As for vistas - a grand term, I admit - why not consider what you see, all the way from foreground to background and think about *composing* it. The vista could be what you see when you fling open the bedroom or landing curtains in the morning, or the view of the garden from the entrance or garden gate. Is there a pleasing balance of heights and variety? Of course, the very idea of a 'pleasing balance' could be subjective, so at this point I'll hand the design over to you!)

The Royal Horticultural Society has an excellent web site (www.rhs.org.uk) and its Plant Selector will give all the necessary guidance as to the growth habits and requirements of particular plants and suggestions as to which

plants might suit a particular location. Of course, there should be room in a garden for conscious composition *and* chaos, for serenity *and* surprises!

Winter, when many shrubs and trees are bare of leaves, is a season for appreciating structural qualities and a time for visiting the great landscape

gardens of the early to mid eighteenth century. Close to home is Cirencester Park, of which Alfred's Hall, once mockruined, now supported by scaffolding, was one of the first Gothick buildings in England. in contrast to classical temples. Walk on from the main gate in Cecily Hill discover to charming eighteenth century garden buildings, designed for resting or taking tea, such as Pope's Seat with its vista stretching to Kemble church steeple, and the pair of oddly incongruous but handsome 'sentry boxes', the Horseguards.

Rousham, (between Banbury and Oxford, open daily) is the masterpiece of William Kent and incorporates statuary, grottoes and seats inspired by a decade spent in Rome from 1709. It is a delightful garden, sensitively maintained, the more so for the complete absence of visitor-centre or other commercial paraphenalia. Stowe, a few miles further on and also, in its later stages, the work of William Kent, is on an altogether grander scale. The garden can be read as a statement of Whiggish idealism. Lord Cobham and others had been expelled from the Whig party by Sir Robert Walpole and the

garden represented Cobham's assertion of true Whig values, as in his Temple of British Worthies. (A brilliantly written book is Tim Richardson's The Arcadian Friends: Inventing the English Landscape Garden.) But with the politics went a degree of fun. While Cobham's wife took tea up on the hill in the Queen's Temple (designed by James Gibbs in 1740), opposite and down on the lakeside Lord Cobham entertained his friends from the Kit-Cat Club in the Temple of Venus, away from the sight-line

of the Queen's Temple, (a motor-cycle ride away?) and the nature of the murals which were later white-washed over, is best left to the imagination. (Politics and Hanky-Panky? Plus ça change...)

conductor was David Lawrence. The rehearsal took about three hours and sounded great!



### **Luminaries by Eleanor Catton**

The Luminaries was the 2013 Man Booker prize winner and is a tome of a book in excess of eight hundred pages. The book has been much lauded for its complex and clever structure. However, the structure was less important to us all than the actual story itself.

The writing in The Luminaries is so consistently poised and the characters so well drawn we could only be in awe of the achievement of such a very young author. The act of reading is made so pleasurable by the writing that it is like being wrapped in the familiar literary blanket of the truly good writers and storytellers of this genre.



The story is set in Hokitika, New Zealand in the 1860's during the gold rush and centres on twelve characters that are also planetary in their interaction with each other and the

world. The twelve character interests are centred around other characters. This sounds like an unwieldy cast but Catton handles it deftly. As well as a murder mystery it is also a love story of sorts and a story of reinvention. There are villains, victims and perpetrators.

We thoroughly enjoyed this novel, whether it is our favourite of the short-list remains to be seen. We have two novels left to read on what has been a very impressive list.

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## Tetbury Art Society Roy Baker Memorial Lecture 2014

On Tuesday 18 March, we have the next annual public lecture to be held at The Orchard Room, Highgrove House by kind permission of HRH The Prince of Wales and the Duchess of Cornwall. The Prince of Wales is President of the Society.

This year's lecture is based on the art of the silversmith and particularly the work of the Hart family from Chipping Campden, gold and silversmiths. The workshop is the last operating remnant of the Guild of Handicraft\* which C R Ashbee established in 1888. George Hart was a silversmith with the Guild when it moved to Chipping Campden in 1902. From 1912 he took on the running of the workshop, joined in 1930 by his son Henry. This tradition is now carried on by his grandson David along with Derek Elliott, and William and Julian Hart.

We will hear more on the background history, the design and making of private commissions and presentational ware and the Hart Silversmiths Trust, by David and Trish Hart. We hope to have some examples of their work on display! All will be illustrated with a power point display.

Frank Hatt, our resident Sherston playwright, wrote a play about the Guild and has the following to say:

When I learned that this year's Tetbury Art Society's Roy Baker Memorial Lecture was to feature the Hart family of Chipping Campden, it brought back a bundle of happy memories. In 2002 my play, *Against the Grain*, toured several venues in Gloucestershire as part of a celebration of the Guild of Handicraft's migration from London's East End to Chipping Campden in the North Cotswolds. It was a community play, involving over thirty actors and a choir numbering almost as many. The director was Jo Bousfield of the (sadly defunct) Dr Fosters Theatre Company. Besides her and myself there was a fully professional production team, but nearly all of the performers were amateurs. Among them, to my delight, were four members of the Hart family, whose forebear, George Hart, was one of the original band of craftsmen who settled in Chipping Campden in 1902. The family embody a rich and vibrant tradition. It's an inspired choice for the 2014 lecture.

My job is to provide older or disadvantaged people with easier access to information and services. This service is free and confidential. If you are over 50 years of age or you know someone that is, I can help with many issues. Below I have listed just a few.

- Are you receiving all of the pensions and benefits you are entitled to?
- Would you like a free home safety check from Gloucestershire Fire Service?
- Would you like to know more about adaptations to your home, which may help you cope better with disability?
- Are you feeling **lonely** and would like to meet other people?
- Would you like to help other people by volunteering for a local organisation?

I can visit you at home or talk with you on the telephone, the number is 07810-630156. I work 15 hours a week, usually between Monday and Wednesday, therefore if I am not available if you ring please leave a message giving your name and telephone number and I will call you back as soon as possible

For information I try, most month's, to go to Avening Lunch Club at the Social Club, (which I can thoroughly recommend!), as well as having a 'surgery' at Tetbury Volunteer office twice a month and once a month at the Trap House (Council office), Minchinhampton, as well as the Arkell Centre, Forest Green, Nailsworth, the 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday of each month between 2.30 p.m. and 4.00 p.m.

One situation which I have been asked about relates to the closure of Avening Village Store and how it has affected some older people who feel the loss of their ability to get a daily newspaper. A delivery service does not seem to be available to the village.

One suggestion has been made about how to deal with this which would require volunteers to collect and deliver, either to individuals or to a central point. This would obviously need someone to organize and manage it as well as volunteers. I would welcome any suggestions or feed-back about either the number of people needing such a service or those to provide it.

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
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#### **AVENING BELLS**

#### **New Flood Defence Saves School!**

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

#### Be sure before you go

As the weather gets warmer and the days longer, what journeys are on your mind? A holiday, a trip, a visit to distant friends or relatives? Then add 'get the car checked' to your to-do list. The winter weather has been pretty demanding on your car. You certainly don't want to end up stuck somewhere with a flat battery. And the little things like correct tyre pressure can make a big difference to fuel economy.
