

PARISH LETTER

Dear Friends,

It is a real joy for Jean and me to be living in the rectory and we very much look forward to meeting everyone. As discovered many vears ones' ago, vocation, or God's will for each one of us, is never static. About a year ago I advised the people in the Whitewater Benefice that we would hope to retire in the autumn. Whilst in the Lake District last May during my daily prayer I asked, 'Dear Lord, what next? Where do you want me to be a shepherd for your people?' And now I am to be your Parish Priest with the privilege of bringing God closer to you, and bringing you closer to God.

Since Ordination I have been an Assistant Curate, a Rector, a Perpetual Curate, an Area Dean, and a Rector again! Now, as a



Parish Priest, I will have the opportunity to exercise a pastoral ministry for which I was trained. Please call me by my Christian name of Peter.

As I write, we are still in the season of Lent; a time for 'refreshing' our faith through prayer and fasting as we journey with Jesus through the events of the first Holy Week leading to Easter. This coming Holy Week Bishop Michael will be leading the services as we encounter Christ en route to Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, share in the Last Supper, join his disciples at the Cross on Good Friday, and participate in the Paschal Liturgy on Holy Saturday. We have the wonderful example of how to prepare for the journey through Holy Week in Jesus himself – following his Baptism in the River Jordan he retreated to the wilderness for forty days to prepare for his ministry. Shortly before my Licensing I will be 'in Retreat' at Alton Abbey in preparation for a new beginning for myself and also for these communities. I hope that you too will have time for a Retreat and participate in the Easter triduum.

Richard Uzzell

1952 - 2014

Life expectancy nowadays is long...so to be told that you haven't long to live is both shattering and unbelievable. This, as you all know, is what happened to Richard. He was suddenly told that he had terminal cancer and that there was very little the doctors could do.

Both he and Lynne must be two of the most courageous people I have ever known. They both accepted what was said and resolutely faced the days ahead. Richard was not a man who wanted people to feel sorry for him....in fact that would have been an anathema to him...instead he made light of the horrors he had to endure.

At his last appointment with the specialist, just a week before he died, he was asked if he wanted to stay in hospital or go home. He answered: "If I am going to snuff it, I am not doing it here, I'm off home."

His wonderful, fighting spirit there... as always... to the end.

You have heard stories of Richard's life and his friendships with people with whom he worked. I have a little more to offer from his family.

The Uzzell Family have lived in and around Cherington for all of Richard's life. He was born in Colly Cottage where Bob, his father, worked on Malcolm Tarlton's farm. Soon after Richard's arrival, the family moved to the Forge and from there, to a cottage called 'Windy Corner'... and then finally to Gastons. Sue was born 4 years later and in time they both went to school in Tetbury. Richard never liked school much and was glad to leave at 15 when he got a job at Newman Hender.

His interest was sport, but he preferred to watch rather than play. However, he did play soccer for Didmarton. He was swept up with others in the late sixties and early seventies and became a Rocker. There he was...long hair in a pigtail, leather jacket and, of course...the motor bike. This is when Lynne first met him, through a mutual friend. She says she became more interested when he swopped his bike for a car! He was very proud of his car and loved decorating it with Peacock feathers he picked up in the gardens of Avening Court!

Lynne and Richard got married in 1973 and moved in with Bob and Mary and his sister Sue, at the Gastons, where Stephen was born. Later, they were able to get a house of their own at Iron Mills when Richard was working at Longfords, and John was born in 1977.

For 26 years, Richard was a long distance lorry driver, working away from home during the week and managing to get back home at week-ends. During his time off he enjoyed helping out others with the lorry to move house or to deliver Christmas trees and hampers. He also used to go and get a ton of potatoes and then divide them up amongst his work mates. This was the life he loved and when he made many friends.

Richard was always thoughtful and generous and particularly kind to older people. For example, one day he stopped his lorry and rescued an elderly lady from her car which had gone off the road and got stuck in a hedge. Once he had done as much as he could with the car, he drove her home. Later, his mother Mary received a letter from the lady's niece asking her to thank Richard for his kindness.

When Stephen got married and the grandchildren arrived, Richard was thrilled. He was as proud of his grandchildren as he was of his two sons. The children spend a lot of time with their grandparents and Richard enjoyed taking Jonathan to Rugby at Minchinhampton and went with him on a Rugby tour to Bournemouth last year. His other sporting enthusiasm was for the Robins and motor bike racing.

Richard was sustained through these last difficult months by the loving support of Lynne and his family and their shared Christian Faith. The Uzzells have suffered many tragedies and through all of them have shown us their amazing bravery and resilience. As I have said, they are not a family that allows their suffering to burden others, but I know how all of you - their friends and neighbours - will support them with your prayers and friendship in the time ahead.

We lift the soul of Richard to the love and care of our Saviour Jesus Christ and know that he will be welcomed to that place prepared for him in the Everlasting Kingdom of Love.

OTHER TRIBUTES TO RICHARD INCLUDED THE FOLLOWING FROM THE CHAIRMAN OF THE MINCHINHAMPTON JUNIOR RUGBY CLUB

"Richard was a wonderful, generous, decent and kind man. I first met Richard when, as grandfather to Jonny, he would bring him up to Beaudesert playing fields in the early days of our age group at the club. Richard could always be counted on to do more than his fair share of helping out in the pavilion, shouting at the boys from the side-lines and looking after children who had somehow managed to mislay their own parents. Richard was always good natured, level headed, positive and fair no matter how badly the boys played, the adults refereed or grim the score line. Without fail Richard would always put everything in perspective with one of his very dry one liners. He had a special way of keeping your feet well and truly on the ground and his commitment to Jonny's rugby was humbling.

When we were lucky enough to secure the ground at Hollybush we called on many members of the club to come and help. Richard was so generous with his time and energy that we would have struggled without him and I doubt we could have done things as well, as calmly and with such style. There was never a job that he would not willingly take on, no matter how unpleasant. Throughout much of last year I was out of work and spent a lot of time at the club preparing Hollybush for its first season. I was lucky to be joined there regularly by several dedicated members of the club including Richard who would always come up to help whenever he could. I have many fond memories of Richard passing on the road, hooting the horn and giving us a cheerful wave. On most occasions, if it was evening, having disappeared over the horizon one way he would, in pretty short order soon appear back over the horizon and join us to help out. As always in life we come to realise how important things are to us after we have lost them. Richard was an important part of Jonny's rugby, our age group team and the club. There aren't many grandfathers who would willingly "go on tour" with an Under 9's team, but he did and we loved him for it; he will leave a very large gap on our side-line."

AND THIS POEM FROM A PREVIOUS EMPLOYER

Richard was hired back in 88 By my Dad no less, who sealed his fate I joined them all back in 89 All of us young with plenty of time

My girls they called him the Grizzly Bear As that's how they saw him to be fair A cantankerous, grumpy, bearded chap Who would shout and bawl and snarl and snap

His bark was definitely worse than his bite And he'd shy away from a fisticuff fight A generous, friendly, genuine lad A heart of gold he definitely had

Going back before we used mobile phones My girls were babes, so I worked from home Two way radios we used back in the day And with the mike my daughter would play

Hiya Richard Hiya she would shout As how to use it she soon worked out He would patiently play along time & again Her patience rewarded with a reply from her friend

A pushbike he carried in the back of his truck So if he came north my girls were in luck A playmate to ride around the yard And in circles they would peddle hard Lynn keeps a clean home with polish and bleach Unfortunately to his truck this did not reach Richards truck which some of you may know Had the scruffiest cab out on the road

Years ago I refused to drive our little truck Too big for me so in the office I was stuck Until Richard talked me into taking me out So it's his fault you drivers now scream and shout

Down in London at the Earls Court Show The Lads worked hard, the day was slow Tired and grumpy, the machines were loaded Banter was made tempers were goaded

A machine went over, and Richard with it The story I'm told was funnier to live it His arms and legs they did protrude And the comments he made were very rude

But roll around in mirth and laughter With remarks made and plenty of banter The lads did laugh at Richards cries Richard was not hurt except for his pride

Then we come to 2002 He went off to work in pastures new So for Trevor & Jim he went to drive A mind of information was kept alive

Over the years we did lose touch And didn't have need to talk that much Peter kept us up to date with each other's trends As they became the greatest of friends

For 26 years in this industry he did toil For Macvan, T&J then finally Carnival A larger than life character everyone did know For who a dignified respect we all do now show

Richard from our daily lives you have certainly gone In our hearts and memories you are sure to stay strong You shall be remembered and talked about in the times that follow With a smile and some laughter but also with sorrow.

Avening Roll of Honour

Those of you with long memories will recall that I first started writing in November 2007about those who are named on our Roll of Honour in the church.

In 2006, I was moved to hear the names of the fallen of Avening read out during the Remembrance Service and asked myself "Who were these people? Hence my monthly entries into the Villager giving the readers what information I could discover.

Since then we have had a number of new residents in the village and, as part of the 100th Anniversary of the start of the First World War, I plan to rewrite the life history of those who fell, concentrating more on their lives rather that their military service. I hope to write each month in which one of our Villagers fell, starting with November of this year when Fred Pollock died in 1914.

I am aware that in the eyes of the younger generations, 1914 seems a long time ago but I still feel that we should continue our Remembrance of those men of Avening who gave their lives. It may be worth pointing out to our new residents, that acts of remembrance will be carried out in their own "birth" town or village wherever that may be.

Meanwhile, research into various facets of our war dead continues. We still seek information as where William Freeman lived prior to his death in early April 1918.

He is number 23 on our Church Memorial but we have no record of any residence in Avening. He does not appear in the village's births or marriages, nor does he show in any of the village census Returns. As a final resort, I am waiting for a copy of his Pay Book Will which, I hope, will at least give us some idea as to who were his next of kin. Meanwhile, if you can throw any light on William, please let us know.

Our plan is to put more plaques on the houses where we know our heroes lived before the hostilities started. This has stalled for the last couple of months but I hope to become active on these in the coming weeks. I may be asking you for assistance!!

Down To Earth



A sudden joyous flash of yellow and then another! The brimstone butterflies had woken up. The brimstone sightings, in the first week of March, were followed by a red admiral, tortoiseshells, a comma, and - as I write this - a pair of peacocks, dancing in the air in a swirl of ecstacy. Perhaps we should make time in our busy lives to record our sightings and notice their habits. Patrick Barkham, a young journalist, did just that

Peacock butterfly Barkham, a young journalist, did just that when in 2009 he aimed to spot and record every one of the 59 species that visit or reside in the British Isles. The resulting book: 'The Butterfly Isles: A Summer in Search of our Emperors and Admirals' is delightful.

The garden is waking up, a thrilling time. In greenhouse and on window-ledge there is no room to manoeuvre among the seed trays and propagators. All is unbridled aspiration; everything is possible! Time now to lift and divide clumps of snowdrops. Divide those perennials that have an expansionist and neo-colonialist habit and give the pieces to your unsuspecting friends - or not! (Perhaps they already know that when a gardener offers off-cuts these will be precisely those plants which rapidly grow too big for their boots or have ideas above their station!). Trim close to the crown the old stalks of perennials that marked their position. Leave it too late and the new shoots will make this impossible. Delphiniums are emerging and the slugs are waking up too and looking for a hearty, juicy meal. Surround the emerging shoots with grit. Additionally, a sacrificial cabbage or lettuce leaf or bowl of beer would lead them away from your precious plants to a place where they may have a good feed, be caught napping and disposed of!

I used to avoid sowing seed of perennials out of misplaced impatience. Could I be waiting until the following year for the flowers?

But actually there are many species that do flower successfully in their first year, but you need to hurry! Campanula, coreopsis, penstemons and achillea are all fairly reliable. Last year I was thrilled with the success of gaura lindheimeri which I raised from seed. It produces panicles of the prettiest white starry flowers.

I had occasion recently to study facsimiles of The Gardeners' Chronicle, a popular weekly gardening journal that was founded in 1841, although the series I was looking dated from 1874. It is quite extraordinary to contemplate the skill and the

extraordinary to contemplate the skill and the enthusiasm of Victorian

gardeners. The articles cover a wide spectrum, including foreign gardens and new plant discoveries. Each edition bore a bold advert for 'Peruvian Government Guano'; there was also William Honey's greenhouse 'Vaporizing Stove' run on kerosene. Not so sure about that one! (The importation and selling of South American guano provided the fortune on which Tyntesfield was built.) I suppose pelleted chicken manure is our modern day guano equivalent, but nowhere near as good. The outstanding BBC series from the 1980s, The Victorian Kitchen Garden, is available to watch on YouTube and I would recommend it to a younger generation who did not see it the first time around. The book, by producer Jennifer Davies, is excellent, too.

I move my plants around far too much. It's a wonder they flower at all. The

reason? Wrong place, either for aesthetic reasons or for the plant's 'wellbeing'. Having recently cleared an area in semi-shade, we went off with my wish-list to Derry Watkins' Special Plants at Cold Ashton. This is an exceptional nursery, with knowledgeable staff and ... special plants! I bought: omphalodes cappadocica 'Cherry Ingram' (stunningly beautiful blue flowers), gillenia trifoliata, (although it will need a large hole packed with rotted leaf mould or equivalent as

I'm not sure whether it will be happy in our alkaline soil), white veronicastrum, aconites and tiarella (foam flower). All of these should be happy in full or partial shade.

Well, prepare for the invasion of the Easter bunnies





Avening Playing Fields is going to have a new climbing frame!

The playing field is a fantastic resource for the village, offering a hard court basketball area, a hugely popular "flying fox" and a recently created cycle path - well used by cycling enthusiasts young and old along with dog walkers and joggers (including the school cross country team).

Avening Playing Field Association (APFA) has worked hard in recent vears to improve the facilities in the park and its attention has now turned to sub-standard the and rather ageing activity play equipment. This equipment has not been updated in over 20 vears. shows

significant signs of wear and tear and, more importantly, offers limited challenge to the children in the village.

APFA is very keen to replace the existing equipment with a new multifaceted climbing frame, along with swings, etc., that would provide fun and interesting challenges for children of all ages in a safe environment. The annual mandatory insurance inspection has helped APFA come to this decision. After 3-4 companies were asked to tender for a similar design, APFA selected a contractor (Playahead) based not only on the competitive cost, but the local support that the design received, the enthusiasm with which the proposal was given and the fact that the contractor is very local – Stroud. This preliminary design and cost was then finalised, see the attached sketch.

APFA is now in the process of applying for grants. All being well (and completely fund dependant), the new installation will be up and running at some stage this year. There will also be some minor remedial works to the existing facilities at the playing fields over the next few weeks so don't be surprised if you see a few goings-on – goal keeper areas being made good & flying fox take-off area being repaired, etc. Then we all look forward to the happy day when the new installations are in place – we are confident that these will serve the village well.

Local "Grey Democracy" Initiative



Residents of Avening may be interested to hear about developments at Woodchester Valley Village, previously known as Crystal Fountain. This is a landscaped village for the over 60s, located just beyond Nailsworth on the Stroud Road. In addition to a range of individual houses and apartments, it also includes a restaurant and shared facilities such as a library, games room and lounge areas. A number of the houses are owned by the parents of Avening residents, as it is one of the nearest retirement villages to Avening.

The residents have recently come together to create a not-for-profit mutual to acquire the freehold of the village from the previous owners and to run the village for the sole benefit of its residents. The creation of the mutual is an exciting demonstration of "grey democracy" where a group of residents, ranging in ages from 60 to over 90, have taken on the responsibility of determining the future of their own village. All aspects of the running of the village, such as landscaping, building maintenance and social activities, are organised by elected committees of the residents assisted by their close relatives, who possess professional expertise in law, accountancy, engineering etc.

Since the take-over, the village has been rebranded as Woodchester Valley Village with a new eye-catching logo. The gardens have been upgraded and the communal areas have been refurbished and decorated to a high standard of interior design. In addition to acquiring the freehold to the village, the mutual has also acquired the somewhat decrepit old pub on the Nailsworth Road and this is now for sale to be redeveloped as a more attractive entrance to the village.


