Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



After my personal observations lamenting the lack of new volunteers over the last few months, it is now appropriate to reflect on the great work people have been doing for the village – not just the high profile stuff, but all of those unsung heroes that are making the village a better place to live. We are looking for your nominations for 'Villager of the year'.

This award has previously been restricted to people who give their time for unpaid work, so I asked the Parish Council to extend the award to recognise people who make a significant contribution to the village, but who may also receive a payment for doing so. This was agreed at the April meeting. The person we want to hear about could be a carer, someone who does great work for an organisation or club, or perhaps does something for the school or playgroup. Please send your nominations to the Parish Clerk (see contacts, or the PC section). But don't delay - the closing date is 8th May. The winner will be announced at the annual village meeting on 6th June.

We chose the 6th June for the annual meeting this year, as we thought that by having it on the weekend of the village fete, everyone would be in a great frame of mind, and ready to chat to the exhibitors. This is not just about the Parish Council – we just organise the event, so do make a date in your diary to come and see what all of the village organisations are up to.

As we go to press it has been confirmed that we don't have enough councillor nominations to require an election, and there will be a vacancy for an additional co-opted councillor – In recent editions of the Villager, there has been a series of articles about the various roles and responsibilities in the Parish Council. If you are interested in joining us, contact the clerk, or come along to the annual parish meeting and have a chat to us to find out more. In the interim, I urge everyone to vote at the general election to make sure your voice is heard.

Letter From the Parish Priest



Over the past weeks, we have been sharing the joy of Easter in our churches. It begun of course on Easter Day – and lots of Alleluias!

I always remember a friend of mine – not a church goer – asking why Christians are so "crazy happy" at Easter. She could understand Christmas ... but not Easter. I explained it like this. All of us – at some time in our lives – will be like Mary Magdalen standing by Jesus's grave before sunrise. We will all stand by the grave and weep. We will weep for people we have lost, for dreams and hopes that are shattered, and for relationships that seem broken beyond repair. But then Mary Magdalen turns, and finds Jesus is alive. And in that moment she knows – and we know – that fear, darkness and death will never "have the last word". That – in Christ - love and life and light are unconquerable. That is at the heart of our joy and our Alleluias on Easter morning.

Over these weeks, however, this joy has been mixed with sadness as we said goodbye to the Revd Peter Quinnell, and his wife Jean. Peter was licensed as Associate Priest - and I as Rector - at the end of March last year. This marked a new phase of ministry in Avening and Cherington, following the retirement of the Revd Celia Carter. As so often happens, some have struggled to come to terms with this change. The challenges this caused, from the outset, led Peter to conclude eventually that his ministry here had been made untenable.

This is a sad moment for us all. Peter is an experienced and dedicated parish priest, and will be missed by many. We wish him the very best in his new post as Team Vicar in Cainscross. As we go forward, please be assured of my continuing commitment to effective and loving ministry in these parishes, and I am already working with the Church Wardens to plan for the coming months.

JUNE JELLYMAN 1942-2015



We will all have our own memories of June and there will be an opportunity to share these with one another

I am grateful to both Sue, June's sister, and Maureen Stone for the information that I have about June, although Doreen and I got to know June fairly soon after moving into Avening about ten years ago and we have our own memories.

June was born on 21st January, 1942 in Tetbury, at the maternity hospital (now Kingsley House). She was the first daughter born to Ada and Arthur Jellyman who lived in

"rooms" rented from the Brown family in Point Road, Avening. While her father was away in India during the war, around 1946, her mother started renting 6 Pound Hill and this became the family home to June for 68 years until January 2014 when she was forced to leave there due to illness.

June was educated at Avening Primary and then at Sir William Romney's grammar school in Tetbury; she left school aged 16 to work at Prices Stores in Nailsworth. June worked there for several years before securing an office job at Avening Mill, which she loved. When the mill closed she was made redundant and had to find work elsewhere, working in the kitchens at Avening House when it was used by Gloucestershire County Council. Also in June's younger days she worked in the offices of Rines corn mills in Avening and then went on to run the accounts and wages departments of several local companies, and then doing various other office jobs in the district.

June always had a love for the countryside, horses and dogs, especially Springer spaniels which her father always had. In mid-life she took up playing the cornet and joined Avening band which she enjoyed. June was following her uncles who had played in the band before her.

We are not sure where June's love of horses came from, her mother was a little scared of them and said it stemmed from her childhood in The Forest of Dean watching the dray horses pulling coal carts and seeing the sparks fly off their steel shoes as they strained up the hill. June's love must have started when was quite young because one day her mother found she had wandered off only to find her at the top of New Inn Lane with May's bread delivery horse having followed her Uncle Fred who was the driver. Having learnt to ride on Marshall May (the baker's) ponies in her twenties June managed to buy her own horse *"Tom"* who gave her great pleasure. In his prime he was the smartest pony in Avening, having his mane plaited, his hooves oiled and his coat gleaming when he was taken out for a ride.

He did give her one serious incident though when she thought she would jump him over a seat on Minchinhampton Common; now Tom was no show jumper and unfortunately his ungainly jump left June head first in the turf. Fortunately she only had torn ligaments in her neck and after a few weeks of treatment it got better but never left her completely.

She had Tom for about 25 years so he was an old pony when he passed away but in recent years thanks to Click and Celia she has been able to help look after first Charlie then Doughty which gave her an equine interest in life again.

But her love of animals made her many friends in and around Avening; she went to many horse shows and local markets and could always talk with great knowledge about farming and animals.

June always had time to stop and talk to anyone, and often on her travels around West End (her favourite part of Avening) she regularly called in to the Stone family for a cup of tea and a chat.

In her early years June had a motor bike, although she also always had a push bike as well, and that is where my memories of June really begin, as she was never seen in the village without that bike, often with two flat tyres. I think that it became for June a prop and a shopping trolley.

During the last twenty years June had found life quite difficult and in recent times she had suffered several serious illnesses but her determination always shone through. June was June, a true Villager, Countrywoman and last of the Jellyman branch of the Coates family who have lived in the village for at least 150 years.

June will be missed by not only her close circle of friends but also the many residents of Avening who saw her pushing that bike. As I said earlier she was a true villager and was very knowledgeable about the countryside in which she lived.

June was a very difficult lady to turn when she was set on a certain direction but loved the Village, the countryside, horses and dogs. It had been a struggle for us all in the last year but we are grateful she passed away in the Village and for the help we received.



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
100 Years Ago: Avening's War May 1915

John Bridgeman's birth was registered as Herbert John Bridgeman in the 2nd quarter of 1895 but he was always known as John. Following the death of his father, his mother married again, this time to William Neale and at the time of the 1901 census, the family were living on Tetbury Hill. At some time before 1911, they had moved to Nags Head and we have been able to identify the cottage in which the family lived. By then, John's occupation was described as "Help in Stables" aged 15. At some time early in 1913, he enlisted in the Gloucestershire Regiment and was posted to the 1st Battalion prior to a move to the British Expeditionary Force on the 11th of November 1914.

Martin Viner Pollock was born in Kensington on the 15th of May 1888. His father was Robert Pollock, an eminent lawyer and his mother was Mary Viner Playne who inherited Avening Court from her father on his death when she was only three. It wasn't until the mid-1880's that the family settled into the Avening home, although still spending much time in London. Martin went to boarding school in his earlier years, moving on to Eton College and Cambridge where he studied in Law to follow in his father's footsteps. At the outbreak of war, he was offered a commission with the South Wales Borderers (SWB) and following training was posted with his battalion to France on the 20th of February 1915.

Meanwhile, his brother, Frederick (a professional soldier) had been in France since the outbreak of War and had been killed in October 1914. His mother had died in 1910 and his father on the 4th of January 1915, leaving Martin Squire of Avening.

John's battalion was rested after training on the 6th of May and were entertained with a regimental concert in the evening. The War Diaries tell us that on the 7th they moved billets around midnight and on the following day



marched again, this time to Windy Corner and occupied trenches at Rue Du Bois.

Martin's battalion arrived in adjoining trenches at the same time. Along with battalions from the Meerut (an Indian regiment),the Royal Munster Fusiliers and the Welch regiment, they made up the 1^{st} and 2^{nd} Brigades of the 1^{st} Division. The Munsters , the Welch and the Meeruts occupied the front trenches whilst the Glosters and the SWB were in the rear three trenches in reserve.

After an evening of the British artillery bombarding the German lines, those in the front trenches went "over the top" in attack. The cessation of the artillery was the signal for the enemy's appearance from shelter and with rifle and machine gun fire had a devastating effect of the British attackers. Seeing this, those in the rear trenches were called forward to face any counter-attack, an act which didn't go unnoticed. The Germans switched their artillery fire to the rear trenches and Martin was a casualty during the transfer.

Having arrived in the front line, it was thought that a second attack during the afternoon of the 9th may prove to be more successful, following another artillery bombardment that was launched against the German lines. Again, after its cessation, out came the German machine guns and this second attack, which included John's Gloucesters was cut down by the enemy fire. This was made worse by the German artillery concentrating on No Man's Land. John was killed during the attack which was called off fairly quickly, the survivors retreating to their trenches. The Borderers lost 233 men (including Martin) and the Glosters, 263, of whom John was one. The gain was nil.

Martin was buried in the Cabernet-Rouge British Cemetery, Souchez but John has no known grave and is remembered, with Honour, on the Le Touret Memorial. Both received the triple medal awards ("Pip, Squeak and Wilfred"), John with the 1914 Star and Martin the 1915 Star, plus the Victory Medal and the British Medal. Their relatives would have received the medals in 1922.

I hope to able to report shortly on the siting of another remembrance plaque.

What did they know of each other prior to the War? Was John working as a horse man at Avening Court, the closest source of that type of work to Nags Head? Was John joining the military encouraged by Martin's brother, Fred Pollock who died in October 1914? We will never know the answers to these questions, but, despite the social gap in their lives, together they fought and died for Avening, on the same day and during the same battle. Let us remember them on the 9th of May, a day after the end of WW2 in Europe.

Avening Playgroup

It has been really lovely to welcome the children back to playgroup after the Easter break with such beautiful weather. The children have been playing outside now straight after the small group time session, when they take part in an adult led activity, based on their next steps in learning with their key worker.

Just before the holiday the children had great fun preparing our vegetable patch, weeding and digging in new compost. They then helped to plant seven different types of vegetable, which thanks to the sunshine have started to grow. Since we got back, the children have been watering the patch and pulling up some weed seedlings which have also popped up.

It has been great to go outside just putting on sunhats instead of the coats and wellies needed in the winter. However, our pre-school children have begun practising changing for P.E ready for when they start school. They change into a pair of shorts and tee-shirt, do a few exercises and then change back again, putting their clothes neatly on their chairs.

Diary of a Self-Build

Part 5: Hands off our builder!

Anyone who has wandered past our site in Sandford Leaze (we have been expecting coachloads of tourists to gaze in awe at the scale of our foundations!), has been amazed that our builder, Shaun Vickery, has done everything on site practically singlehanded. He has worked through all weathers (thankfully not too extreme this winter) to excavate well over 600



tons of material, pour the concrete, build retaining walls, and work co-operatively with the Avening Mill developers. He also orchestrates suppliers, and sorts out the best prices for materials. He has taken (nearly) all of the stress out from the build, and when we had some difficulties recently, he was able to call in help from Rob Henderson (extra-large digger), Steve Taylor (access from Avening Mill), and especially Pete Savage who spent a couple of days on site helping, plus removing and storing excavated material. They literally dug us out of a hole – thanks guys!

Our Villager diaries have given Shaun additional exposure, and (quite understandably) other people want him to do work for them. He'll do a great job for you, but we'll hopefully be keeping him busy for a few months yet!

On site, the foundations are at last complete. There weren't any major problems, but for various reasons they have cost us almost double to what we had budgeted. That's not an unusual scenario, but it puts great pressure on the finances (especially the cashflow), and means we will need some economies elsewhere to keep the final costs under control. On the plus side, most of the remaining elements are more controllable, and many items have already been sourced and prices agreed.

The detailed designs for the timber frame have finally been completed, and the frame ordered. It is being manufactured in Cambridgeshire, and should arrive on site in early May. We will get the opportunity to visit the factory and see our house fully assembled, before it is packed onto a truck and delivered to us. We haven't got the final arrangements yet, but there could be a little disruption to traffic in the street on delivery day – we will keep those neighbours affected informed once we know. It will also prompt a second visit by Charlie Luxton, which will probably cause more of a disruption – maybe we should sell tickets?

Avening Art Group



Down to Earth



Pulsatilla

Sometimes the purchase of a new plant can take you on a journey – a six mile walk in this case. When I bought a *pulsatilla vulgaris,* or Pasque flower, from a nursery in Oxfordshire a few weeks ago, I was told it thrived on chalk downland. Curious, I looked it up. Richard Mabey, in 'Flora Britannia' wrote that it was 'a nationally scarce plant.' (It is, in fact, on the 'red list.') 'Its largest colony is on the steep banks of Barnsley Warren in the Cotswolds.' Barnsley Warren, I discovered, is an SSSI

(Site of Special Scientific Interest) with open public access, and only 10 miles from here. It stretches north-westwards from Barnsley village towards the Stow road, (the A429) and comprises 'unimproved limestone grassland' which hosts a number of rare wildflower and butterfly species. So, on the Saturday of Easter week-end, we undertook a circuit walk of the site and discovered a magical land, alive with bunnies (Easter?) where time seemed to have stopped; far, far from the madding crowds and the demented turmoil of the twenty-first century. Alas, we saw no Pasque flowers, so-called because they bloom around Easter-time. It was probably slightly too early.

Last autumn, inspired to try something new, I ordered some erythronium bulbs. Did I ignore my own advice and leave them too long in their bag so they developed mould? Tut, tut! Nothing daunted, I planted them in the ground. Within days, I saw the tell-tale signs of small rodent activity around them. Groan. One last chance, then. I dug them up (no sign of rodent tooth marks; had the mould not been to their taste, I wondered?), potted them in pampering, proprietory compost and left them in the green-house for the winter. When, in spring, a few shoots appeared, I plunged them into the ground, and, reader, they rewarded me, negligent and undeserving gardener that I am, with a

modest display of flowers. *Erythronium* 'Pagoda' was the most spectacular, with its tiered, waxy yellow bells; the *erythronium dens canis* has some exceptionally beautiful marbled leaves. Another beautiful spring flower is that of the *brunnera*. The cultivar, *b. macrophylla* 'Jack Frost', so-called on account of its silver, green-veined leaves, has flowered abundantly with an intense skyblue colour (even after I had chopped it in half to make another plant. Ah! Forgiveness or defiance?).

At this time of year it is all too easy to end a full day in the garden without even crossing off the first job on the list. Planting and sowing possibilities are exhilarating but sometimes overwhelming. For this reason it is important to consider carefully placed seating where the weary gardener can rest and admire what they have achieved. However glum one might feel about one's own horticultural inadequacies, there will always be a bud, shoot or flower that will catch the eye and say: 'Look at me - and cheer up!' Place some large containers around the seating, with, for example, pelargoniums in the middle , in scarlet, white or pastel shades, and spilly, trailing plants such as *helichrysum, lobelia* or *glechoma hederacea* 'Variegata' (a form of ground ivy, often sold as *nepeta*!) around the outside. There is great choice; you can design your own colour scheme. (Add wine as appropriate.) You must, of course, be prepared to bring tender plants under cover if any late frosts are forecast.

I really do hope that as many of you as possible will embark on the trail of the Avening Open Gardens on May 24th. We all garden in our own particular style and our gardens can be extensions of our own personality. Yet there should



still be room for a communality of gardening spirit, an exchange of ideas, experiences, plants, even seeds and seedlings, from which we can all benefit. Just as we all like our hard work to be acknowledged, so it is equally important that we acknowledge the efforts made others, working by with different ideas and inspiring results. See you there!

The Parish Chairman

Sorry readers, but it's me again! As part of the series highlighting who does what in the Parish Council, this month it falls to me to describe the role of the chairman – I use the title chairman, but it definitely doesn't have to be a man.

The chairman has all of the responsibilities of other councillors, but is elected by the councillors at the annual meeting to undertake some additional roles and accountabilities – in common with all organisations the PC needs a leader/focal point to ensure there is always someone the public and officials know who to contact. If done well, it can be used to engage the community, and generate interest in what the wider council is trying to achieve. There are no fixed rules or right way to do this, and it's up to the individual to use the role to best effect. I try to use different mediums to communicate to as many people as possible; via the Villager magazine, website, Facebook, and at village events. Other people will have different interests and approaches. The most important thing is to listen, treat everyone equally, and take action wherever you can make a difference.

The chairman must run the monthly meeting in a balanced way, and facilitate the decision-making processes on planning; spending the precept; initiating projects; or managing various issues. Members of the public can attend the meetings, and can ask questions in a designated slot – for this reason, there is a degree of formality, and there are also a number of official procedures that need to be completed. As there are nine councillors, no one person can exert undue influence – not even the chairman!

This is a voluntary position, but it requires additional commitment on top of that required for a councillor. Other specific responsibilities include:

Being a point of contact for members of the public

Staffing – adhering to regulations; sorting out any staffing issues; appraisals.

Budgets and precept – set each year, helped by a sub-committee

Agreeing the agenda and signing the minutes.

Helping other councillors and agreeing training.

Being the 'compere' at the annual village meeting.

Managing and motivating the team of councillors.

Dealing with anything else that doesn't need to go to full council for approval.

With central expenditure being gradually reduced, more responsibilities are being absorbed locally; for example we look after our own verges, and can contribute to some capital work to 'speed it up'. This means more work for the PC, but also makes it more rewarding when we can directly see the results of our efforts.
