Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



Now that the election is out of the way and we know the electorate's view, we must now work together at all levels of government to ensure promises are fulfilled. During the canvassing period, I was lucky enough to have an impromptu meeting with our district and county councillors, and our MP. All of them promised to help with some specific issues that are developing, and to ensure Avening remains a viable and attractive place to live. I am confident that we can build on these existing relationships, and continue to *preserve, conserve, and enhance* during our next period of office.

As a quick reminder, we still have a vacancy for a co-opted councillor, so contact our clerk, or come along to the **annual village meeting on Saturday 6th June** to find out more.

You may recall that we have been unable to recruit a new hall management committee, but because the hall is so important to the community, I have been progressing ideas for the much needed investments it needs. Items high on the shopping list are: a new heating system; installation of sound dampening materials; an upgraded stage lighting bar; installation of a projector and sound system; installation of Wi-Fi; improved ambient and accent lighting; better storage; the re-opening of the parish council room upstairs. We will probably form a sub-committee of the PC, working alongside key users to prioritise the work, but installation of new the blinds has already been completed. The transition of bookings to John Collinson has now been completed, and I will soon be upgrading the hall page on the website to include an availability calendar. The proposed improvements will make things better for existing users, but will also hopefully encourage more usage, and generate much needed income. Let me know if there are any facilities that you would like to see.

The playgroup has been running successfully for many years, and has been in its current site for almost 25 years – I remember crawling around on the roof doing some last minute guttering adjustments just before the grand opening! But society is changing, and the playgroup in its current form may not meet these changing needs. Following a recent request for financial help with an A/C unit, the PC has been working with the playgroup to help identify what the future looks like. We have helped to pull all of the interested parties together, and following an EGM, there look to be some exciting developments in the pipeline.

Finally, I haven't mentioned the popularity of the avening-pc.gov.uk website recently, as there has been a glitch with the stats since January. However they are now back on line, and I can report that we broke through 5,000 hits for the —

Avening W.I.

Avening W.I has been busily planning its June event which is a group meeting with 3 other Institutes. The meeting will have a theme of 'Our Changing World' and we have a speaker from WWT Slimbridge Wetland Centre. We are hoping to have a good number of entries to our various competitions.

This month's speaker was Alan Wells from May Hill. His subject was 'Gardening for Bees'. Alan has a number of hives in his large garden where he grows flowering plants, annuals, perennials, shrubs and trees all of which provide nectar and pollen for his bees. Despite this he said that his bees often ignore his offerings to seek out the powerfully scented rape seed fields. Rape seed pollen apparently sets like concrete in his hives and is difficult to extract and process.

We are now having a planned monthly walk during the spring and summer months. The last walk was from Minchinhampton around Besbury Common. It was a beautifully sunny day and there was a profusion of wild flowers everywhere and no mud! We followed the walk with lunch at the Halfway Café. Next month we are walking along and around the canal at The Daneway.

Unfortunately we failed to get past the first round of the County skittles tournament but had a very pleasant evening with our competitors from Stone W.I. at the Tudor Arms at Slimbridge. We now compete for The Plate for all teams that did not get through the first round.

In June, at the Village Fete, we will be serving teas and delicious cakes and scones throughout the afternoon.

We are continuing to support the Vine Project which provides help to families in one village in South Africa where most of the children have lost their parents to AIDS and are being cared for by their grandparents. We are collecting items of clothing, particularly white shirts for school uniform and underwear for the children. Also they appreciate soap, toothbrushes and paste, pencils and ballpoint pens. If you have any spare items (used clothes are fine) please give them to a W.I. member as we are funding a crate to be shipped in July.

We had another successful fun quiz for the village in April and £100 has been donated to Avening School to provide more books for their new library.

At our June meeting our speaker will be Diane Gaskins talking about summer entertaining. Visitors are always welcome.

We will be having a summer coach outing in August (date to be confirmed) to Hampton Court Castle and Gardens, between Hereford and Leominster. Villagers and friends welcome - more details in next month's Villager magazine.

Avening School

Out in the Open!



We're putting on our gardening gloves and picking up our trowels at Avening School as we gear up for our participation in this year's Avening Open Gardens event on Sunday 24th Mav. We will be proudly showing off all the hard work and joint efforts from our gardening and club and parent teacher volunteers as

everything begins to bud and bloom and hopefully the weather will be on our side too. Our gardening club (made up of KS2 children and Mrs Rushton) have planted lettuce, radishes, beetroot and carrots in our raised beds, stocks and sunflowers in the wildlife area and are cultivating lemon balm for a bed in our new outdoor classroom. At the end of May, Tamsin Bent from Stroud Valley Project visited our eager young gardeners and helped them to plant wheat which will be harvested later on in the year. Tamsin will visit us then with the flour from our wheat which children will use to bake bread in our KS2 classes.

Back inside to the classroom, our Kestrels class (Y1/2) have been growing beans and subsequently produced a wonderful music composition about the growth of a seed which they proudly performed in front of parents.

The school has been out and about on various trips throughout the first half of the summer term. At the end of April, the Hawks class (Y3/4) spent a day at Forest Green Rovers football club where they combined professional football training with learning about how FGR help to protect the planet by being a 'Green' football club. After meeting members of the team for a Q&A session, the children went on an eco -trail around the stadium where they learned how the club keep the pitch watered and healthy using rainwater and a solar powered automatic lawn mower.

The Owls class visited Skillszone in Gloucester to support this terms class project – 'We are the future' and learned about how to ensure they have a safe and happy future.

At the end of May, the whole school paid separate visits to Copsegrove Farm in Bisley where they experienced real outdoor fun and acquired skills such as den building, exploring the natural habitat of wildlife and toasting marshmallows over a bonfire. A well-earned educational treat after a busy first half to the summer term!

Thank you to everyone who helped support the School at our FOAS Promises Auction in May, either by attending and bidding on the night or donating to our auction. The evening was an overwhelming success; look out for the amount raised in next month's issue!

Now through the support of Avening Church of England Education Fund, Kathryn and Sean will be doing a workshop for the two junior classes at Avening School during the afternoon. Kathryn Roberts, who was a school teacher prior to becoming a full time musician, has much experience in presenting folk music to a young audience and to explain to a new generation the importance of folk music as a means of communicating social and local history in days before television and the internet and when literacy was a rare talent.

Avening School head teacher Jane Rushton, herself a folk fan, is looking forward to the workshop which will centre on this year's theme of the world and the environment. The junior classes will sing the beautiful song, "I am the World", which highlights the plight of the plant and focuses on important environmental issues. 

70 Years Ago: Avening's War June 1945

The War Continues

Despite the end of the War in Europe on the 8th of May 1945, the illusions were shattered when, on the 22nd of the month, it was announced that the ration of bacon, cooking fats and soap were all to be cut. The weekly ration of cooking fat was halved from two ounces (50g) per person to one ounce (25g). The bacon weekly ration was reduced from four ounces (115g) to three ounces (80g) per person and soap rations were cut by an eighth. (Now I know why my mother used to tell my sister and I to wash our hands at the same time)

The following day, Prime Minister, Winston Churchill and the coalition government resigned. The date of the resulting general election, the first for ten years, was set for the 5th of July, whilst the battles against the Japanese in the Far East raged on until their surrender on the 15th of August 1945.

Rationing continued in the UK until the early 50's.

Gallipoli Remembered

Some eighteen months ago we saw a 'Gallipoli Remembered' cruise advertised and decided that it offered the chance to combine my husband's interest in naval and military history with the opportunity to visit destinations, especially in Greece and Turkey, which were new to us.

The focus of the cruise was the centenary of the Gallipoli campaign, which Britain embarked on in 1915, with the help of French, Australian and New Zealand troops, hoping to reach Istanbul, defeat Turkey and, thus, deprive Germany of her ally on the eastern front. The campaign was a disaster, with a devastating loss of life on all sides. I had a vague memory that one of Fred Vening's series of interesting accounts of the war casualties whose names appear on the Avening war memorial mentioned someone who died on the Gallipoli peninsula and I thought this could provide a focus for our visit. I contacted Fred and he very kindly provided me with information about Hubert Ind, who died at Gallipoli and his name appears on the Helles Memorial, which records the names of British servicemen who have no known grave. (At Fred's request I shall write a tribute to Hubert Ind, to commemorate his death, for the August issue of the Villager.) We also discovered that the grandfather of one of our neighbours died at Gallipoli and when we visited the Helles Memorial we were able to photograph both names.

We spent a day touring the Gallipoli peninsula, visiting the main sites of the campaign and the war memorials, where wreaths were laid on behalf of the crew and passengers of the ship. Having seen the rough and hilly terrain at close quarters, it became obvious why the troops were in difficulties once they had landed, even without being fired on by the Turkish forces. As this visit was a few days before Anzac Day, all the stands

were being erected and preparations made for the centenary services.

On 25 April, Anzac Day, our ship was allowed to anchor off the Gallipoli peninsula. At 5am the service from Anzac Cove was broadcast on a big screen in the ship's lounge and later a service was held on board. During the cruise we had a series of talks about various aspects of the Gallipoli campaign and a highlight was a concert given by the New Zealand soprano, Dame Kiri Te Kanawa. She was accompanied by a student from the Kiri Te Kanawa Foundation, which sponsors Maori students wishing to pursue a musical career.

Of course, there were other ports of call on this month long cruise. Many brought to life the ancient civilisations I learnt about at school. We studied the Minoans at Knossos, the Trojan War at Troy, the Greeks in Athens and the Ottoman Turks in Istanbul. We also followed in the footsteps of St Paul in Corinth Malta. ancient and The excursions we chose included a vintage train journey in Majorca and a boat trip on the Bosphorus, which separates Europe from Asia.

After a stimulating and exhausting month we returned home in time to vote in the General Election and to battle with the overgrown garden.



Down to Earth



Le Bois des Moutiers

Hugh Johnson called it, 'a Sussex garden on vacation on the French coast.' Le Bois des Moutiers, just 5 miles along the coast west of Dieppe, was the very first collaboration between the young Edwin Lutyens, who designed the house and much of the interior furniture and fittings, and Gertrude Jekyll, who planned the garden layout and plantings. The project was commissioned in 1898 bv Guillaume Mallet and his wife,

great grand-parents of the present owner, and it has been cherished and preserved. The ethos and atmosphere remains, in the spirit of the Mallets, who were Theosophists, gentle, artistic, welcoming and uncommercialised. We visited

it on a sunny afternoon in the middle of May, when the rhododendrons and azaleas in the parkland that falls away to the north towards the sea, were at their peak. The garden rooms on the south side, divided by buttresses of yew, were sensitively in harmony with the English vernacular style of architecture. Our visit, long anticipated and planned, did not disappoint.

I realized, during our brief tour of half a dozen very varied gardens in

Normandy, that even in this era of lavishly photographed brochures and fulsome internet sites, there is no substitute for *being inside the garden*. I had expected the very formal, French, restored seventeenth century gardens on four rising terraces at the Chateau of Brécy, north west of Caen, to be something of a dry, intellectual exercise. Instead, the sense of intimacy, together with the 'moments' of contained chaos around the edges, made it a most exquisite place to be in. It was, unexpectedly, my favourite of the tour. Conversely, there was one disappointment, at the Prieuré St Michel, Crouttes, where, amidst beautiful, ancient priory buildings, there was something indefinably wrong and insensitive in the presentation of the gardens created around them.

Driving through Normandy, we observed, on recently re-thatched cottages, how the French had given a new meaning to the idea of a roof garden: planted along the ridge were tall, blue irises and, crouching below, a row of house leeks. Standing out against the sky, they were an unexpectedly joyful sight,

though I did wonder how they could be assured of a water supply in a hot summer.

Back in England, confronted with a garden that appeared to have grown a month in a week, we are moved to reassess what a garden is for. Dame Sylvia Crowe, in the opening to her book, Garden Design (1958) wrote that, 'Gardens are the link between men and the world in which they

live.' This is why I believe seating is so important, for it allows for repose and a momentary state of suspension. A garden should give pleasure, peace – and pause for reflection. Thereafter, one emerges to reconnect with the world outside.


The rain brings on the weeds. Treat weeding as therapeutic. I know it is fashionable to treat wild flowers (er ... weeds) with the same respect one accords to precious plants, but, allowed to flourish to excess, weeds will take the moisture and goodness from your roses, fruit bushes, hedging etc.

Tomato plants will be ready for their final positions now. If you plant them lower in the ground than they were in the pot, this should encourage new lateral roots from the section of buried stem, thus giving the plant greater stability for carrying all those fruit-laden trusses! Sow pots or trays of basil now so that the leaves are synchronised with the ripe tomatoes. (Sown too early, as I have done in the past, means that the basil is in flower, with the leaves less succulent, by the time the majority of the tomatoes are ripe.)


As I write (it is Chelsea week) I am listening to Monty Don who is the guest on Radio 3's Essential Classics. He has just said that, 'the most interesting thing about any two plants is the space between them.' When you see that two plants are getting too close and personal, or fighting each other for a limited space, sometimes to the point of the demise of the weaker, then you make a note to yourself that next year you will allow each plant the space in which to flourish gracefully and graciously.

Cherington Cricket Club



These photographs of cricket at Cherington are circa 1912. My grandfather, Edgar. C. Rymer, born in January 1890, was one of the 2 umpires and is standing on the left of the photo of the team, with a cap and his arms folded. At that time he was still living with his parents', Edgar and Kate Rymer, (my great-grandparents) at Grove Farm, Cherington, The other umpire was Joe Milsom. In the back row 2nd



from left is John Cook, agent for the Cherington estate. 5th from the left is Alan Hiscock, farm pupil to the Saunders at Aston Farm. I assume that the pictures were taken in Cherington Cricket field.

In the second photograph, the boy, second from right wearing a cap next to ladies having tea is probably George White, aged about 12 or 13, who was born in December 1899.

The other photograph is of 'Cherington Cricket Fixtures, 1920'". My grandfather, Edgar.C. Rymer, his younger brother, Jack Rymer, and Percy Saunders from Aston Farm were 3 of the 6 committee members. The Hon Treasurer, Mrs White, was my great-grandmother, (her daughter, Gladys, married Edgar. C. Rymer in April 1918,) and farmed Westrip Farm, Cherington. Her son, George White, my great-uncle, was Hon. Secretary.



The White family farmed Coxes Farm for about 130 years until 1971. All the family members here are buried in Cherington churchyard.

My grandfather owned a Model T Ford from about 1917 and used it to transport players to away matches. He had a reputation for driving very fast, alarming his passengers.

It would be interesting if anyone has any knowledge of the other persons listed in the Cricket Fixtures, and mentioned here.
