Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



We hit an impressive milestone this month – there are now 200 followers of the Avening Facebook group. For those who don't know, this is a social media site where anyone can share details of events, news and photos – it's great for getting messages out quickly, or just seeing what's happening. As people 'like' a particular post, it is highlighted to their 'friends', so information can easily and quickly reach a thousand people or more. We are linked to other local groups, such as the cinema club, school, and playgroup, so it is a great source of information. It costs nothing to join, and you don't have to give loads of personal details, and you can even have a look without joining – just go to Facebook and search for Avening.

Following sustained pressure to Highways and our County Councillor about the condition of our local roads, we recently had a visit from the top man in Amey/Gloucestershire Highways, and his local team. Cllr David Bendall met with them and highlighted some of the more pressing issues (Point Road, New Inn Lane, Lawrence Road, Old Hill, to name a few). To be fair, we are in an area going right up to Moreton-in-Marsh, which has a budget of just £450,000 for the year – we could use that just around Avening!! Highways have agreed to commit £8,000 to cover immediate repairs (you may have seen lots of ringed potholes), but I intend to keep up the pressure to improve GCC policy towards our roads (the low budget priority is purely a political decision), as a few blobs of tarmac is merely a sticking plaster fix.

On a similar theme, I thought I would test the effectiveness of the road issues reporting process — I logged three potholes around Avening and Cherington on Sunday via the Highways website (the link and phone number is on Avening-PC.gov.uk), which took about 2 minutes each. By the time I got home on Monday they had been marked, and within a week they were all filled. I must admit I was impressed, and quite surprised! It might not be that efficient every time, but on this occasion the process worked well.

We have had to move the re-cycle bins from the playgroup to a temporary site close by due to the transfer of a strip of land they were on. As everyone now has doorstep recycling, we are likely to remove the bins permanently due to limited usage — please contact us ASAP if you feel there is still a need for them.

Letter from Richard & Margaret Maslen

'Cross' joins Church, Culture and Community

Most Anglican and Roman Catholic churches are dedicated to 'patron' saints. The idea was to make a special connection with a holy man or woman who would serve not only as an example, and an aid to prayer, but also as spiritual comfort and protection. National dedications also became common, and developed as battle cries. "For England, Harry, and St George", as Shakespeare had it. Sometimes statues or banners were carried into battle as rallying points.

Anglo Saxons had a special reverence for the Holy Cross, symbol of the way Jesus of Nazareth accepted death for our sake. In the battlefield they shouted "Holy Cross" to give them confidence and courage. Instead of a saintly or angelic dedication- although many Saxon saints are so commemorated - Holy Cross may have been associated with the Saxon place of worship that existed before our Norman church was dedicated in 1080.

Avening parish dedication has a special day of celebration in the western church calendar, on September 14th. It was originally known as 'Exaltation of the Cross' and is said to mark the dedication of the basilica, or church, on the spot where Jesus died. The date was chosen because, according to tradition, it was the day after the true Cross was supposedly found by St Helena.

We call it 'Holy Cross Day' in Avening. It is still a rallying cry because the parish church is the essential focal point for village life and people. 'Church, Culture, and Community' - the High C's - make us as a nation what we are, in that order, and are inseparable. 'Cross' is the fourth and equal 'C' in this parish.

Because Holy Cross Day this year is on a working Wednesday we are going to mark the village holy day on Sunday September 11th. As they did here hundreds of years ago there will be an open air gathering, and a merry, musical procession behind our symbolic banner back to the dedicated centre of Avening, our parish church.

It will be an important day for everyone who loves, and lives in, Avening, whether or not they are church supporters. This may be mainly, although not just, about church but it is also about our heritage, history, and community spirit right up to the present day and into the future.

All are urged to come. Everyone is invited, adults, young people, and children. Gather at the churchyard gate at 10.45am. Refreshments and a jolly good chatter afterwards. Contact Richard or Margaret on 01666 840387; maslens@tiscali.co.uk.

Avening Churchyard - A Village Amenity to Cherish

Those of us who live in and around Avening are proud of our wonderful Norman Church, consecrated during the 11^{th} century. Surrounding this wonderful building, on four sides, is an unusually large churchyard, bounded for the most part by Cotswold stone walls.



Whether you are a regular member of the congregation or not, most local people like to bring their loved ones to the church to celebrate the life-stages of our families; for baptism, weddings and funerals. This has been happening since about 1078 so it is no surprise that the churchyard has been extended several times over the years, to provide additional resting places for our loved ones. Only during the last decade, we acquired, through the kindness of a church member, an extra piece of land on the south-west boundary, which is now used as a memorial garden for Cremations.

The churchyard also gives access to reach the Avening stream with its ancient stone bridge, or

to join some of the right-of-way footpaths which traverse the fields on our boundary. These rights of way are very popular and in daily use to walk our dogs, our children, and exercise ourselves and by visitors to our lovely area.

So we are enormously grateful to those who generously give freely of their time and energy to cut the grass and hedges, shore up ancient and tilting gravestones, prune the lovely trees which enhance the churchyard, and repair the stone walls which bound our property.

I would like to publicly thank our faithful groundsman, Stephen Uzzell, and all

those lovely dedicated people who have laboured free of charge on our behalf, and continue to do so.

I would also like to thank the Avening Parish Council who, in recent years, have allocated funds to pay for the services of specialists such as stone masons, stone wall repairer's and tree surgeons, whose skills have kept us all safe as we pass through this very public asset. This is an ongoing and





seemingly never-ending need, when ancient walls and hedges and trees becoming top heavy, require regular attention.

Sadly our congregation has fallen over recent years, so that their contributions cannot hope to fund these expenses, on top of caring for the ancient church. The stone walls which surround this very large area are regularly collapsing, which is

hardly surprising given their age. So we are very dependent upon the Avening Parish Council for the ongoing funding to keep this very public asset in a safe and accessible condition. We are also very dependent upon the kind volunteers who, naturally, are not getting any younger, for regular work in the churchyard. If you would like to help these dedicated people, and enjoy some very good company, whilst helping to preserve our very precious amenity, we would be very pleased to hear from you. 








Avening W.I.

A large contingent of Avening members attended the annual group meeting this year hosted by Tetbury W.I. The speaker was Philip Serrell well known for his appearances on Flog It! and other antiques programmes on television. Unusually for Avening we did not sweep the board with the competition entries so we will have to put more effort into them next year!

Our summer outing to Dyffryn Gardens near Cardiff was a great success. The weather was kind to us and the gardens very beautiful. The National Trust has only recently taken over the gardens from the local council and has much work to do to restore them to their former glory. It was really interesting to see the gardens as



'work in progress' and we are all eager to make a return visit in a few years to see the full transformation.

Our speaker for July was David Lemon from France Lynch (but originally from Zimbabwe) who 3 years ago undertook a solo trek along the whole length of the Zambezi River a distance of approximately 1,600 miles. The river rises in Zambia and goes through Angola, Namibia, Botswana, Zambia and Zimbabwe to Mozambique where the river's delta opens into the Indian Ocean. David who was in his late sixties at the time told of some of the enormous problems regarding the trek and in particular crossing the tributaries of the Zambezi. He engaged the services of a dugout canoe and paddler only to capsize it! The dugout canoe sank like a stone, much to his surprise. He suffered two severe bouts of malaria and had blood sucking leeches to contend with but no encounters with larger beasts that inhabit the areas he walked through. He could not give an explanation as to why he did it - just like mountaineers who have to climb to the summit of high mountains because 'they are there'.

We have a summer break now but will still have some events to arrange. We are catering for two lunches, a Christening and for the Stroud Macular Society annual get together. We are also hosting the August County W.I. walk and we are expecting around 80 walkers. We will be leading a 6, 4, and 2 mile walk and then providing a ploughman's lunch. Finger's crossed for a dry day!



Down to Earth

Box blight. I know of gardeners for whom this has meant almost total ruination of their parterres. So far, I say with caution, we have not been afflicted. I have had my Assistant Gardener down on his knees, weeding and clipping at the base of our box hedge so that you really do see the little legs the box is standing on. This, of course, keeps the plants well ventilated and this, it has been said, often, is a good method of resisting the disease. We shall see ...

Now, I have not heard of hebes used as replacement for box hedging, but in my experience (limited) they can stand in very nicely for box balls. Needing to plant up two lead planters for immediate effect, I seized on two similar hebe plants from elsewhere in

the garden. They didn't take too long to get over the shock, and, shaped into a ball, they are already coming on nicely and one is beginning to flower. Hebes hail from New Zealand, they are tough and evergreen and have the prettiest little spikes of flowers, in shades from white to lilac and purple. They do need a sunny spot, though and grow easily from cuttings. (I believe my hebe balls originated in cuttings). So, let's hear it for the hebe!

The eighteenth century architect, garden designer, painter and furniture designer William Kent turned his hand to many projects and we have his 'finest garden





building' (in the words of Tim Mowl: 'Gentlemen Gardeners: The Men who created the English Landscape Garden') on our doorstep. The Worcester Lodge, just past Didmarton on the road to Bath, was built around 1746 as a hunting lodge and banqueting house, using 'Palladian vocabulary to Baroque effect' ('Buildings of England'). It is remarkable for the luminous effect gained by

opposite windows through which you see the sky. The effect is one of uplift, contrasting with the heaviness of the stonework. In a field across the road stands the castellated Tump Barn, designed by Thomas Wright to be seen as an eye-catcher from the upper-floor banqueting, or dining, room.

It is generally considered inadvisable to place rhubarb leaves on the compost heap. Surely, no worm would relish the prospect of ingesting all that oxalic acid. Imagine my surprise, then, when I saw my rhubarb plants turned to lace by the depredations of slugs! But, on the vegetable plot, pillage: cabbages, lettuce, and emerging seedlings were proving irresistibly delectable to pigeons, slugs and snails. Young cavolo nero (black Tuscan kale) plants yanked right out of the ground. Right, it's war, I declared. But what weapons could I use? Tom Lehrer might have taken a sadistic delight in 'Poisoning Pigeons in the Park' but not I.

Poisoning slugs and snails is not nice aesthetically, and I never apply pellets too liberally. As well as endangering predators of slugs and snails, traces of metaldehyde are now being found in rivers and drinking water supplies. I have a couple of ideas which work (to a greater or lesser degree). tunnel of flexible plastic trellis protects а patch of lettuce seedlings from pecking pigeons. I planted twiggy sticks around a

larger area of cavolo nero and wove a cats' cradle of cotton to deter them from landing. Damp newspaper or cardboard laid on the ground attracts the slugs. Then, just before they commence their nightly onslaught, you gather up the newspaper and slugs and - er - dispose of them.

I was interested to read about the four-year survey, 'Plants for Bugs', which is being conducted by the RHS to ascertain the preferences of our vital pollinators when it comes to native or near-native species. Apparently, we grow about 30% of native and 70% non-native species in an average garden. The good news is that the bugs are not too choosy. The exotic flowers tend to have fewer blooms, but since they come into their own in that floral lull of mid to late summer, they fill the gap, so to speak. However, double flowers are less attractive; bees will go to single dahlias, for example, but not the double ones. And purple seems to be the colour they like. So, purple haze all around, then.


