Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



The pre-work on the playing field has started. Having agreed a small package of support with a local surveyor, the topographical survey has been completed. We will soon arrange some temporary test holes to establish what's in the ground (I can hazard a good guess that a lot of rock will be involved!), and to identify drainage requirements. All of this information will enable us to identify the most appropriate surface to lay, produce detailed plans to get costs, and to request grants. We will have a display at the show on 20th May, which will give everyone another chance to shape the final designs.

On the subject of the show, plans are coming along well, and it should be a great addition to Avening's 'summer season'. You can find details in this magazine, but there should be something for everyone — and it's FREE! Outside there will be music; animals; bouncy castle; inflatable slide; soft jousting competition; a big tractor; Pony and cart rides, and lots more besides. In the hall there will be special cup-cakes; a display from the school; many of the village organisations; and of course, the Pride of Avening awards. We will also be using our brand new microphone system to complement the recent audio improvements — that will save me shouting!

Funerals are obviously sad occasions, but they also bring people together. Sometimes very many people, as was the case recently with Barry Robbins. I have never seen so many people in the church, and afterwards in the Social Club – what a great send off on a glorious day, for a lovely man!

Over the last few months, we have had a flurry of planning applications – some straightforward, some more controversial. As Avening is deemed officially as being 'unsustainable' (whatever that means); is surrounded by areas of outstanding natural beauty (AONB); and has a number of conservation zones, it means applications for brand new properties are generally difficult to get through. There are also hurdles for extensions, and even some home Where land is within a conservation zone, trees are improvements. automatically protected by preservation orders (TPO) so can't be felled without The PC provides context and local knowledge for planning applications, but technical and policy decisions are made at CDC, and by the district planning officer. However, everyone can comment on an application (either an objection, or in support), and this is easy to do on-line – the link is on the Avening website – they are all taken into account. We encourage anyone with an application to come and talk us through it, so we understand the background when we pass comment.

Don't forget to vote in the local elections on 4th May!

The Good News gets better

Holy Week and Easter Day, the greatest Christian festival, which we celebrated in our village churches is Jesus' story in seven days, if you like. Great promise, worldly popularity and expectation, spiritual discipline, teaching and example, rejection by his own people leading to torture and death - and then the proof He is right, and justification of who we are and what we are. The gospel is good news which becomes better if we pass it on to the people around us.

One of the convincing records of the first Easter morning tells how a "beloved disciple" recognised the real meaning of the empty tomb, and came to belief. The beloved disciple stands for every one of us, whom Jesus loves, and that is why he is unnamed.

He is close to Jesus at the Last Supper; at the Cross he is the one present who is designated, with Mary, the first community of the saved. Now he is the one whose love enables him to see beyond the empty tomb, even to and beyond our time. He is the guarantor of our tradition, who is to "remain until I come".

Easter Day is about life triumphing over death. It proves why we may put our trust in Jesus of Nazareth, and reminds us of how He puts his trust in us. So, hold fast and hope, even when things go wrong. Always remember it is here, where we are, that we take heart from the past and stand fast for the future.

Easter promises that faith, compassion and goodness will win through, but they are values that need to be stated and re-stated generation after generation. If they find echoes in any community, or any hearer - sacred or secular - then they are not far from sharing the Christian faith. Ours is an inherently Christian community, and we should be proud of it.

When Christianity won its first converts it was slow going, and very, very difficult in the world - or even in the church! But our values were, and will still be, well received if they are faithfully, fearlessly, and honestly preached. That is what we are about.



Avening W.I.

A group of 14 members attended the Gloucestershire Federation Annual Meeting in Cheltenham Town Hall. The hall was completely full of W.I. members from all over the County. We had two excellent speakers in Lady Bathurst who was in her last week as High Sheriff of Gloucestershire and Dr Lucy Worsley, historian, author, T.V. presenter and Chief Curator of the Historic Royal Palaces.

Lady Bathurst spoke enthusiastically about her role as High Sheriff involving herself fully in the work of the police, the fire service as well as prisons. She was proud to have been involved in setting up a new W.I. at Eastwood Park women's prison. She was also delighted to have had a new fire engine at Cirencester Fire Station named after her.

Lucy Worsley spoke of her career and then gave us a very interesting illustrated account of life in the palaces many centuries before, concentrating on bedrooms, bathrooms (which mostly did not exist!) and kitchens.

I am very pleased to report that our very clever quizzers came 1st 2nd and 3rd in the first round of the County Quiz. The team that came first was reduced to 3 so did particularly well to win. The 1st and 2nd teams will go onto the next round at Chedworth in June. This week we start our bid in the skittles competition. Our first opponents come from Bisley W.I. 

Down to Earth



No. 4 The Circus Bath

When garden historians talk about the eighteenth century, Georgian, garden, this usually refers to the landscaped gardens such as Stourhead, Stowe or Painshill. Certainly, town gardens but few have existed recorded in art or restored. The reconstructed garden behind No. 4 The Circus in Bath may be unique. Archaeological excavations in 1985-

6 revealed paths and beds. Sadly there is no record of what was planted, but following the advice of an expert in the field, Dr John Harvey, and working to a plan of around 1770, the reconstruction was completed and opened to the public in 1990. You enter the garden through a gate leading from the Gravel Walk in the Royal Victoria Park. Before Edward Budding invented the lawn mower, in 1832, greensward was uncommon in small gardens. Instead, 'hoggin', a mixture of clay and gravel, was used. Box hedges edged the borders and plants were placed singly rather than en masse, chosen for their fragrance, their rarity (many were new introductions from overseas) or their double blooms. But, hey, to enjoy the peace and delight of this hidden gem, no prior knowledge or interest in garden history is required! Find the gate, enter – and it's yours to enjoy.

In their fascination with the newly arrived and the exotic in plant introductions, our forebears would perhaps not have considered consulting

any 'perfect for pollinators' list. But do you know that the RHS have an online list of such PFPs? Double blooms do not make the list, either because they are too difficult for the bees and other pollinators to enter to find the nectar, and in so doing, pick up the pollen, or because pollen producing parts have been bred out. It has been a joy to walk out of our front door recently and see the bees a-buzzing around the two

potted skimmia 'Rubella's and the fragrant, white-flowered skimmia 'Kew Green'. A fortuitously perfect choice of plant, then, the skimmia.

Talking of Kew, we were there on a gloriously sunny Easter Sunday. Prominent – shouting out loud, you might say – in the borders on Main Avenue were groups of euphorbia charachias, in full, blowsy, unmissable lime-green yellow. And euphorbias are there on the PFP list. One doesn't realise that trees are in flower for such a brief period; unusual blooms are frequently missed. Such are the stunning, fragrant, lavender-coloured blossoms of the paulownia

tomentosa, or foxglove tree. Wonderful.

A pretty (and) useful plant to have in or around the vegetable patch is the limnanthes douglasii or poached egg flower. This attracts the bees and other pollinators, in particular the predators of those wretched aphids that turn broad bean stems black. (Hum, they were sleeping on the job last year, then.) Planted in each of the four corners, it will self-seed with abandon

but it is so pretty that one can hardly object to its expansionist habits. (In our last garden, the clumps at the four corners could almost meet in the middle if left unchecked.)

Blue IS a lovely colour for flowers but don't turn your soil blue with slug pellets. It is not necessary to carpet the ground with them. In fact, the kind I now use has a clever top beneath the lid which only allows half a dozen pellets to emerge at a time. (Once you have managed to open the child-resistant lid. A friend suggested that I gave it to a child to open.) This is 'Sluggo', German-made and approved by Organic Farmers and Growers, containing iron phosphate which occurs naturally in the environment. Once these pellets have been ingested, the moribund molluscs retreat to hiding places and expire there. This, of course, means that the corpses are not lying on the surface for birds and other wildlife to consume. This iron preparation is so much better than the obnoxious metaldehyde, which, according to a recent report, leaches into water-courses and can be detected in our water supply. There is no known treatment to remove the chemical from our drinking water. Imagine drinking slug pellet water? Not nice.

I hope we are all potting up spare plants for the fête plant stall?

The Annual Parish Meeting took place on 1st April and was well attended. The minutes are now available from cheringtonpc.org.uk, the new Parish Council website. The main topics discussed at the meeting were as follows:

Chairman's Report

Councillor Mitchell thanked the Cllr Hicks for his work as County Cllr over the last 20 years, as he stands down at the GCC elections on 4th May. He listed a number of successful events that had taken place over the year in the village and thanked all involved for their hard work. He also announced the new website, described the work done to refurbish the bench near the Village Hall and the agreement with the GCC to install bins for dog waste shortly. Representatives from Best4Ben were invited to describe the forthcoming Fun Run which will take place from Cherington on 21st May.

County Councillor's and District Councillor's Reports

County Cllr Hicks described the financial challenges on the budget, particularly that of social care. The performance of schools was high despite relative low funding and the Council will undertake more structural work on Highways in the coming year. Fire and Rescue services were improved and both he and District Cllr Parsons were hopeful for the improvement of health care support as a result of changes being made under the NHS Partnership plans.

Village Hall

New chairs had been donated this year and there are plans to paint the outside of the hall in the coming year.

Police Report

PC Hancock has left Tetbury and is replaced by PC Leah Davis and PCSO Sue Fellows. He reported 2 crimes in the village in the past year, both burglaries.

Defibrillator

District Councillors have received a small grant towards the cost of providing defibrillators in their areas. The Parish Council are researching the issues involved.

Local Highways

There was discussion of the state of local highways and County Cllr Hicks offered support to report issues to the Highways Department. Since the meeting the contractors have done work in the village and the Parish Council

will review the situation. Work to clean village signs should also be reported to the Highways Department.


Broadband
