How to Make a Spanish Omelette!

CHURCH news is often about eggs but seldom about omelettes. Let this be a first for Avening and Cherington - and there is more to it, we promise.

On a recent holiday in Cantabria, where we were privileged to attend and take part in a veneration of a claimed relic of the True Cross, Richard also had a lesson in making the famous Spanish omelette. The result was as good looking as his teacher!



The point is - "Keep it simple!" The true Spanish omelette contains eggs, potatoes,

and salt. None of those left-over vegetables the English hurl in, or tomatoes or anything else. It's how you do it simply that counts, and he has the recipe if anyone is interested.

A parody sermon might nasally continue: "Christianity is a bit like that omelette!" True, actually, but pass on, please. Christianity can be made to appear very complicated, whereas the variety we serve up here is simply the best. The recipe is easy to understand and follow.

Jesus of Nazareth had it right. What he said 2,000 and more years ago was also re-cooked and served up in a few words by the Jewish Rabbi Hillel. "Fear God and love your neighbour" he said. "All the rest is commentary". Jesus went further. "There is none other commandment greater than these. On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets".

That's just how the Church here feels, even if we put it differently but still simply. "Fear" as the ancients had it might now become "Honour" or "Obey". And you do not actually have to like someone to love them, although it can help. "Respect" is a word young people understand, and even politicians are beginning to catch on.

Our churches here, as everywhere, are built upon simple truths that are easy to understand, even if not always easy to get right. The answer is to keep trying, as we do - just as Richard intends to practice with that omelette until one day it may even turn up at a village function if he has enough help and encouragement!



A Thank you to Roger Gegg, Churchwarden, St. Nicholas, Cherington 2008 - 2017

In 2008 Roger Gegg was elected as a Churchwarden at St. Nicholas, Cherington on the retirement of Mrs. Beryl Milsom from this ancient office which dates back to the 14th century.

In the intervening nine years Roger has been an invaluable and efficient Churchwarden, devoting much time and work to the everyday needs of the church, its flock and its fabric. He has decided to retire from this role as he wants to spend more

time with his family and expanding brood of grandchildren.

As Churchwarden he has had particular responsibility managing the three Driver's Charity Cottages overlooking the village green and the allotments, and in his early days he arranged for the first surveyor's inspection of the cottages for almost half a century. He has also been involved in the quinquennial inspection of St. Nicholas, which is designed to ensure that our church stands at the centre of our community for centuries to come.

Roger has held office at a turbulent time in the history of our church. There was substantial uncertainty over the future of Ministry in our parishes, which at one stage appeared to be very gloomy indeed, with the prospect of us being steered towards a 'merger' with all the churches in the Kemble Benefice. Roger was a vital member of the team resisting that move, which led to an important change of heart. The departure of Rev. Peter Quinnell (our House for Duty priest) after a year in office presented a variety of difficulties which have been faced and dealt with by Roger and the Parochial Church Council, influenced by his steady, calm and efficient guiding hand.

Contrary to expectations our congregation has been maintained and in fact grown, the pain has eased and the church and the cottages are well cared for and in good structural condition after a programme of renovations. Those renovations allowed two of the cottages to be retained by long standing tenants, while the third cottage has been essentially rebuilt internally in order to enable it to be let out at a commercial rent in accordance with the requirements of the Charity Commission.

Alongside the thanks of the Parochial Church Council, I would like to place on record my sincere personal thanks to Roger and to Kate, who has supported Roger throughout his term in office.

With the agreement of the PCC and the Trustees, Roger will continue to support the church helping to maintain the effective management of the fabric of the church, allotments and cottages.



Avening W.I.

The first round of the County Skittles Competition didn't go as well as the Quiz Competition! We welcomed Bisley WI to the Social Club and they proved to be a very talented team. Although we tried hard, we couldn't recover from a slow start. However, despite this we had a great evening and a brilliant supper. We can now look forward to the Plate competition as we were knocked out of the main competition in the first round. We have a practice evening on 18th May and a friendly match against Kemble & Ewen WI on the 25th.

We enjoyed lovely weather for our May walk in Preston Park, Tetbury which was followed by lunch at the Royal Oak. For our next walk we are planning to go to Uley and Owlpen, with lunch in Uley.

Our speaker this month was Steve, a ground crew volunteer for the Great Western Air Ambulance. He was extremely interesting, illustrating his talk with slides. They only have one helicopter and this covers six counties including Gloucestershire, 2.1 million people. It costs £2.6 million to run per year and they do not receive any Government or Lottery funding. We are very lucky that the crew includes a critical care paramedic and critical care doctor which means that the helicopter can carry more advanced equipment and much stronger painkillers. The paramedic is the only member of the crew that is funded by the NHS. On average it is called out 4 times per day. A third of the calls are for cardiac arrests, a quarter road traffic collisions and 15% of all calls involve children. He finished his talk with a video featuring former patients which was very moving.

Visitors are always welcome at our meetings which are held on the 2nd Thursday of the month at 7.30pm in the Memorial Hall.

Academix:

Capella and beatboxing choir visit Holy Cross Church



Singing without accompaniment has been called 'a capella' since Renaissance Italy, when unaccompanied singing was termed 'in the style of the chapel'. And so it was very fitting that on the 29th of April the Church of the Holy Cross was fortunate to welcome Academix, not only to showcase their talents in the evening but also to lead a group of intrepid singers and novice beatboxers in a pre-concert workshop. This accomplished quintet have been honing their skills in Surrey since 2014, taking a repertoire of over 60 well known songs and arranging their own close harmonies and

beatboxing accompaniment themselves.

At 3pm we began with a general vocal warm up "Bella mama" before splitting into our respective choral groups. I think we surprised even ourselves at how quickly

The plan was for us to learn their own unique arrangement of "Stand By Me". The ladies (and Benedict) learned the backing vocals whilst the men lead with the main lyrics. Avening School

As we enter our last two months of the school year and the weather hopefully gets warmer, we move our learning out of doors and this term's topics perfectly compliment this by taking on an environmental theme. The Kestrels (y1/2) are being inspired by 'Dens and Dandelions' while the Hawks (y3/4)will become 'Eco-Warriors' and the 'Owls' focus on the rainforest as part of their topic 'We are the Future.' The whole school will be out and about on trips this term with KS1 visiting Copsegrove Farm where they will take part in activities such as den-building and nature trails. The Hawks will attend the Cheltenham Science Festival and The Owls class will be taking to the water on their residential visit to the Cotswold Water Park.

We are working closely with our colleagues at Sir William Romney's and this term will see us collaborate on a joint project for Years 5 and 6, based on the text Treasure Island. We will also be joining SWR for a 'Proms in the Park' in July – with children from our school joining the choir.

If this wasn't enough to be going along with, there is also our annual school sports day, our whole school sponsored walk and the much anticipated musical soiree to look forward to this term.

On behalf of FOAS we are excited to announce details of our new fundraising campaign — APS IT (Avening Primary School IT). Like many schools, we have to make some very tough choices when it comes to our resources - and in recent years the school has had to prioritise the upkeep of the buildings, with no funds left over for IT. We haven't been able to upgrade our limited stock of laptops and tablets for several years. A statistic taken from the World Economic Forum, Future of Jobs Report states that "65% of children entering primary school today will ultimately end up working in completely new job types that don't yet exist." The majority of these jobs will be IT-based. That learning starts today, in the classroom, highlighting the need for up to date IT equipment to help our pupils become the digital citizens of tomorrow. We plan to raise enough money to purchase a tower of work pads, several new laptops and better projection equipment.

We have set a big target of £12,500 but we are overflowing with original ideas and our Chair of Governors Richard Barley has set the wheels in motion by completing a cycling challenge last month, riding 600km across Northern France, starting in Ile-de-France and finishing in Le Mont Saint Michel. The weather was harsh and each day exhausting, but Richard returned home in one piece delighted to hear the difference his efforts had already begun to

make through people supporting him. It isn't too late to sponsor Richard. Simply contact the school office on 01453 833191 for more information.


Down Memory Lane



My great-grandfather, Edgar Rymer, took the tenancy of Grove Farm, now known as Grove Park, in 1902, renting from the Misses Constance and Gertrude George of Cherington Park. Following his death in 1933, his youngest son, Geoffrey Rymer, ran the farm until 1943. A change of landlord occurred in 1934 when E. S. Tarlton bought Cherington Park estate and its three farms; Westrip, Coxes and the Grove.

This wedding photograph from 1919 shows guests at the front of the Grove farmhouse, following the marriage of my great aunt, Katherine Rymer, to William Hatherall. My great-grandfather, Edgar Rymer, and his wife are seated near the front, 3rd and 4th from the right. The clergyman is probably Reverend Clarke from Cherington. Next to him, on the right, is my grandmother, Gladys Rymer, with a baby in her arms - my father, Jack Rymer. My grandfather, Ted Rymer, can just be seen between the bridegroom and bride – he was the second eldest of 10 children and all 6 sons farmed around Tetbury in later years.



Down to Earth



The forecourt garden, Nymans

'I have broken my back, my fingernails, and sometimes my heart, in the practical pursuit of my favourite occupation,' wrote Vita Sackville-West of the forty years of her life which she dedicated to gardening. It is one of my favourite quotations.

Some of us would gladly make such sacrifices if the result were to be a garden in the class of Sissinghurst. What a peculiarly British obsession it is. With the build-up to the Chelsea

Flower Show (nicely dubbed the Chelsea Cowparsley Show by Tim Richardson when umbelliferers became all the rage) dominating the television schedules and the crowds about to descend on SW3, various commentators are reflecting on what drives this obsession. I like these lines from India Knight in the Sunday Times:

'Really, it's about how Brits as a nation do sensuality. This is why you often meet quite buttoned-up people whose gardens are insane exuberances of colour and exoticism: the garden is the inner life, or the longed-for one — the suburban garden that thinks it's on a Tuscan hilltop.'

Why do we do it? I often wonder that as we drag ourselves inside, exhausted, from the garden when the owls are already hooting and the bats are doing their crazy, electric dance, passing up the garden to the woodland. But I do think that there are far, far worse places to be than this place at this hour. India Knight, who relocated from London to East Anglia, concludes: "It doesn't matter if you're [no good at it]: you'll get better. I can't think of anything more life-affirming you could do with your time." Another convert, then.

When one moves into a house, in a different geographical terrain, with an established (or semi-established) garden, as we did, one has to make the acquaintance of new sitting tenants (in a horticultural sense). Of course, they do not tell you their names, and the labels around their necks have long since faded or disappeared. In the ensuing years, you may chance upon the same in a nursery or botanical garden. It never happens if you deliberately set out to establish their identity. Chance being wonderful thing; 'Ah, so THAT'S what it's called!' you exclaim. One such in our garden was / is the beauty bush, or kolkwitzia amablilis 'Pink Cloud'. This really is a pretty thing, with pale pink

trumpet-like flowers and yellow throats. Tough and unfussy as to soil. Really quite obliging. When we moved it (not best practice but for some unfathomable reason, we keep on moving things around ...) I potted up a couple of cuttings. One looks really good and I shall bring it to the plant stall at the summer fête.

The rain that we are getting nowadays is proper 'stair-rod' rain. (Who can remember stair-rods?) This makes it all the more important that seeds sown in the ground, such as radish or carrots, have a good

measure of well-firmed soil above them, to prevent them being washed away. I know that some gardeners lightly rake seeds in. To me, that would seem to leave a lot to chance. Our weather is definitely changing and we need to evolve our techniques. If we are indeed in for a warm, dry summer, then following a deluge is just the time for laying mulch on the surface, to keep the moisture in.

On the day before writing this, a day of May sunshine and squally showers, we revisited a garden with a strong local connection, and one, coincidentally, in my

home county of Sussex: Nymans. This is regarded, deservedly, as one of the great gardens of England. Horticultural artistry. Set high up on the Sussex Weald, affording farreaching wooded vistas, the fertile sandy loam and shelter belt offer scope for both exotic and ericaceous plants. Ludwig Messel arrived here with his family in the late C19; his son, Leonard, further developed the garden (and at this point I turn to glance appreciatively at our young magnolia x loebneri 'Leonard Messel') and daughter Anne, Countess of Rosse, further enhanced and extended his work. The ruin of the partially burnt-out medieval-style manor house provides a backdrop for climbers, echiums and the euphorbia mellifera. But go and see it for yourself. It is exceptional. An enchanted garden.

Forest Green Rovers vs Tranmere Rovers

On the 14th May 2017 Forest Green Rovers played Tranmere Rovers at Wembley for the last promotion place into League 2. To get to this world famous stadium, FGR beat Dagenham and Redbridge 3-1 on aggregate, while Tranmere played Aldershot Town and won 5-2 over both legs.

To travel to this stadium, I went on a long coach journey with lots of other ambassadors. It was roughly a 3 and a half hour trip there with a 25 minute stop, but it was worth it when I saw Wembley's famous arch.

Luckily, Tranmere couldn't catch us up so we won, becoming the first ever village club to be in the football league!

"This was even better than watching Spurs miss out on the Premier League title!" said my Dad.

Forest Green Rovers are now an official football league club and the New Lawn is an official football league ground! We will definitely need the new stadium now!
