Letter to the Editors

Dear Villagers,



My apologies for resurrecting this subject once more. However, due to the laziness or forgetfulness of one individual, I feel obliged to raise the matter of dog poo once more.

Without wishing to appear pompous in anyway, sometime during the hours of 7am and 9am today (11 August), some kind person deposited a bag of poo outside our property in Star Lane. Thinking it may have been left to be collected later on a return journey, we decided not to pick

it up there and then. Having walked our own dog later, it was eventually removed at 11.30am by us.

I recognise that all dogs need to go but equally owners need to be responsible. I am not averse to the stick and flick approach as mentioned here http://www.bbc.co.uk/news/uk-politics-39254072. However, it is never pleasant to find poo left on roads, streets and even country pathways. Worse still for me is when owners go to lengths of bagging the offending item but then leaving the same in public open spaces, where it will take considerably longer to biodegrade, if at all.

The large field behind Star Lane is a popular walk for many villagers and I have seen increasing instances whereby trails are littered by excrement. Furthermore, there is evidence that the hedge at the Star Lane entrance/exit to the field has been used as a 'bag graveyard'. What is the solution?

The obvious way of dealing with this is for owners to take greater care and responsibility over such matters. I fully appreciate that a poo bin exists at the Cross, but in view of the popularity of walks above and beyond Star Lane, I would like to suggest that a new bin be positioned at the top of the lane beyond the end of the cottages. It can only help.

Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



Being a team of volunteers and dealing with local government, it is sometimes quite frustrating how long it takes to get things done. However, it's very satisfying when projects come to fruition, and this month I can report that two big pieces of work are complete – the most visible is the installation of the play equipment on the playing field, which is already proving very popular. This is the first phase of a major upgrade of the playing field, and we are very close to announcing the designs for the rest of the programme.

The school kitchen was in a very poor state, but was the responsibility of GCC. Following long negotiations, agreement was reached to split the cost of refurbishment between them, the hall management committee, and the PC – the kitchen will now also be available for general use, and hirers. The total refit is now complete, and special mention must go to our project manager John Collinson, who has driven this challenging work through. With the new fire protection, projection and sound equipment, and reopening of the reading room, we now have a hall to be proud of.

We also have great news that the youth club is re-starting this month – thanks to Peter Best for his hard work.

Unfortunately, I must return AGAIN to a delicate subject, this time in the church grounds. It is not acceptable to let your dogs run freely in the churchyard, and even less so to let them foul the grounds — it's a place reverence where families and friends can remember loved ones and tend graves in quiet contemplation, not a convenient toilet for Fido — it's not as if we are not blessed with more appropriate open spaces within a ball's throw! If the situation continues, it may lead to a decision to ban dogs altogether.

JESUS of NAZARETH was a talented and graphic story-teller. He used some of the same verbal illustrations we use every day in Avening and Cherington to make a point.

When they asked him for a sign from heaven he said "When evening comes you say 'It will be fair weather, for the sky is red,' and in the morning, 'Today it will be stormy, for the sky is red and overcast'".

Good old Cotswolds weather lore. The Met Office did some research and found 70% of us use the old saw "Red sky at night, shepherd's delight".

What's more, the 83% of us who believe this to be true, including Jesus according to St Matthew, are largely correct. According to the boffins, high pressure in the evening tends to lead to good weather. It traps dust and dirt in the air, which scatters blue light, leaving only the red light remaining.

Good for planning a day out - but Jesus looked further and deeper, as he was wont to do. "You know how to interpret the appearance of the sky, but you cannot interpret the signs of the times." I don't know if we do much better.

We still look for "signs" to tell us what we know already. If God did give us a miraculous sign we would then expect the same power to clean up the world for us. But it's our problem. God gives us free will and longs for us to fulfil expectations. Jesus and his wisdom are all we need.

The Master actually said the only miraculous sign would be the "sign of Jonah". Nice touch, for Jonah was a prophet who went to the wicked city of Nineveh preaching repentance. Jesus' mission was to lead us to repentance. His teaching and miracles are signs we can believe and trust, and then take action for ourselves.

Avening Playgroup

Avening Playgroup is open each morning in term time from 9.15 to 12.15. Each session is charged at £9.50 per session until the children are eligible to receive government funding, then sessions are charged at the voucherable rate. All 3 and 4 year olds get 15 hours of education paid for by the government. This funding can be spent in more than one setting. Some two year olds are also eligible to get their fees paid by the government. See the Early Years website http://www.gloucestershire.gov.uk/earlyyears for more details. Avening Playgroup normally takes children from the start of the period in which they become three. This will be either September, January or April. We also open until 1.15 for a lunch club which costs £4 per session on days when there are enough children wanting to attend.

Down to Earth

For the gardener surveying his or her domain, besides the meteorological seasons, there are the seasons of charm and seasons of despair-inducing waywardness. There are highs and lows, more especially in the summer. In many gardens, June is a season of great freshness and beauty while August presents decline and fall. Heavy downpours batter rosebuds to a pulp; inattentiveness and absence, vacations and day-trips, allow bind-weed to creep, climb and entwine; more flowers 'go over' than can possibly be deheaded. But, of course, the dedicated gardener, the thoughtful gardener, the gardener who plans with schemes of planting, will ensure that the best is still to come. I have never done dahlias, but I admire them enormously when I see them. Cosmos is an annual and can easily be sown from seed. Nerine bowdenii, provided their bulbs have been well baked in the sun, add a touch of exoticism. Asters, or michaelmas daisies, appear around, well, Michaelmas (29th September) and are beloved of the pollinators. If you're thinking of buying asters, avoid the multicoloured hybrids on sale in garden centres. Go instead to a nursery and find an old variety such as aster 'Little Carlow' with its pretty blue daisy flowers, or aster divaricatus, useful in shade.

I first came across lambs' lettuce many years ago while staying with an elderly couple in a hill top village in France. It was late-winter or early spring. Just before our midday meal our host walked across the square to his vegetable plot and returned with a bowl of small, shiny heart-shaped leaves.

They call it 'mâche'. That was our nutricious, fresh salad. We call it lambs' lettuce, or corn salad. I grew it in our previous garden; it survived frost and snow to come again and again through the winter months. Lambs' lettuce grows in rosettes, close to the ground and it is best to cut the rosettes and not pull the root. I have just remembered it and sown some here. Several varieties of spinach can be sown in September, too.

It is always a wrench to leave a garden and its plants behind when one moves house. It is simply not possible to prepare cuttings or take divisions of everything when there is packing up to be done. Easy — but expensive — to buy the same again from a nursery. How much more thrilling to 'strike' a cutting begged from a friend who has the same. I managed to do this, eventually, with a clematis tangutica.

Despite my (careless) failures, it is really not difficult to persuade clematis cuttings to root. My c. tangutica is now well established and in flower with pretty little yellow bell-flowers. I never thought I would have an eccemocarpus scaber or Chilean glory flower again. But, last summer I sowed some seeds and the resulting climber is now eight foot high and producing tubular scarlet/orange flowers. It is not reliably

hardy so I shall save seeds for sowing again. Now all I need are the high walls to train these climbers up. That may be more of a challenge!

Browsing through a charity bookshop recently, I came across a volume of collected gardening articles. The title was 'Down To Earth'. 'How kind,' I thought. 'They (someone) thought to gather up my collected oeuvre and issue it in book form.' Alas, no. These were the writings of Anne Scott-James, with quaintly amusing illustrations by husband, Osbert Lancaster. (It was also another -uncomfortable - reminder that my title was not as original as I had

originally thought!) I do love the illustration of the jolly, innocent gardener arriving at the customs desk horticultural with her contraband. (And who remembers flying with BEA?) These writings, by A S-James are seriously good. Being, myself, a never-quite-goodenough gardener in an ongoing dual with our wayward garden, I took heart from the final sentence in her Foreward: 'However, I enjoy planting and working in the garden so much that I am quite content if the reality never catches up with

my dreams, for there is more pleasure in making a garden than in contemplating a paradise. 'Down To Earth' is for like-minded gardeners who travel hopefully and sometimes, to their unbounded joy, arrive.'

Avening Youth Club

Is Back in Business!

After the great disappointment of not having a Youth Club last term, it is a great pleasure to announce that Avening Youth Club is back and will start on either Tuesday 12th or Wednesday 13th September at Avening Memorial Hall at 6.15.

After much searching and getting very concerned that we would not be able to find a suitable provider, we are delighted to say that the Stroud-based youth worker organisation, The Door, have agreed to provide the leadership for Avening Youth Club and we have signed a 12 month contract with them to provide 39 sessions over the academic year.

The Door is an established and flourishing charity, dedicated to youth work in the Stroud area. They are 21 years young and their strap line of 'unlocking potential-opening opportunities' says a lot about their philosophy. The charity has steadily grown both in size and reputation, broadening from their traditional base of youth mentoring for the 11-25 year olds. Recently, The Door have expanded into providing Youth Club support in outlying villages, and Avening will be the third such youth club that they will run. As ever, Avening Youth Club will be open to all youngsters in the 8 to 14 age group and will provide a variety of fun and interesting activities.

There will be a charge of £1 per child per session to cover snacks that will be provided. The Parish Council will again be generously paying for the hire of the Village Hall, which the majority of the cost is being funded by Avening Church of England Educational Fund. We really hope that the new format will be popular and successful. Come along and join us.



Two photographs of the Beaufort Hunt meet at Cherington in December 1935. One shows the Green with part of the Old Rectory visible in the far background, to the right. In front of it is Barn House, which was being converted into a house by Mr E S Tarlton and was later renamed Cherington House. Mr Tarlton lived at Cherington Park and owned the Cherington Estate. Scaffolding is just visible on one side of the building. The roads were by then asphalted but there were no kerb stones around the green until the 1980s. The other photograph shows the huntsman and a whipper-in at Cherington Park gates.




