

Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



I often reflect on the time individuals give up to make Avening a great place to live, but this month has been exceptional! I have to start with the WW1 events — what a great evening, and I've been blown away with all the positive feedback. There are too many people to thank individually, but a special mention must go to Click who came up with the concept of the projection, and who wrote the scripts for the young people, who read them on screen so well. For the evening show Andrea, Jane, Jenny, Pip and Mandy pulled off a hugely popular event, but this couldn't have happened without all the acts; MC Kieran (aka Elvis!); the entire supporting cast, including cake makers, catering, and Nick Winkfield who stopped the hall flooding by clearing a blocked drain in the middle of a storm!

If you would like a permanent souvenir of the presentation, DVDs are now on sale for £10 - an ideal stocking filler! All sales will go towards the hall roof appeal. There will also be another showing in the hall after Christmas for anyone who would like to see it again - watch out for details. To find out more about our 42 WW1 heroes, their stories are all now on the website – there's a link on the homepage.

The collection for the hall roof raised £225 at the WW1 event, and we are starting to get a good flow of tile adopters and stories. There will be a cash surplus for the roof fund from the event as we received a grant from CDC, and a generous donation from Mr & Mrs Richards before they left Avening Court. We have received details of a similar hall restoration project at Sapperton, and have set up meetings with our district councillor to progress a grant application – this work is our priority, and we are finishing off small projects to allow it our full attention.

Other people making a difference are the volunteers who have set up the community café – the launch event was very successful, and it promises to fill a daytime void enabling people to meet new friends in an informal atmosphere.

After 5 successful years, Clare and Krissie have handed over the reins of the Cinema Club to Katy Upton, and we already have two great films to look forward to – the Christmas classic 'It's a Wonderful Life' on 5th December, and the feel good singalong 'Mamma Mia Here We Go Again' on 2nd January.

We were very pleased to dedicate the Reading Room as the Jim Parsons room following the recent refurbishment, and Jim's son Keith came to the ceremony and said a few kind words.

Sadly, there are still too many scum-bags around, who think it's acceptable to trick their way into people's houses and steal their hard-earned savings. I sincerely hope the low-life's who committed such a crime on the day we were celebrating past heroes weren't local, but it is a good opportunity to remind everyone to keep all doors locked, and to carefully check the identities of <u>all</u> callers before letting them in – there will always be a phone number to call on valid ID cards to check their credentials, and genuine callers won't mind the delay. Better still; ask a friend or relative to be with you if someone wants to come in the house.

Cherington Takes Delivery of its Cardiac Defibrillator

In line with many other villages, Cherington now has its own defibrillator which has been positioned in the porch of the Village Hall. In addition to a



grant from Cotswold District Council we are extremely grateful to Chris and Siobhan Fagan for providing the additional funding required to purchase it.

We are also grateful to Sarah Priday who has donated money to support the maintenance of the machine.

Our machine has been registered with South West Ambulance Trust so that if anyone dials 999 in our area, they will be directed to the village hall.

We are organising training to accompany this installation but in the meantime be reassured that it can be used without training as it gives clear spoken instructions and it will not deliver a shock unless necessary.

Obviously, we hope it will not be used very often, but we are very grateful to our donors.

What's so special about Christmas?

It's a welcome break in the middle of the winter; it's a chance to get together with friends and family; parties and presents ... and so on. Yes, it is all of these but is there not something rather deeper going on too? The central character is a new born baby and the creation of a new life is joyful mystery that excites all: we may now know a great deal about genetics, DNA structure, cell division and so on, but none of these adequately explain the existence of our consciousness and self-awareness (or indeed the very matter of which we are made).

The baby of the Christmas story was not born in a modern hospital or into a warm comfortable home. For him it was a rough and humble start to life, born to very ordinary parents in the most unpromising of settings. That is a very appealing feature of the story and it symbolises the message that this baby was later to bring to those around him and to the world at large – that wealth, power and status are not the ways to 'measure' human worth: every individual, of whatever background, is loved by their creator and is invited to reflect that love back into the world around them in whatever ways they can. That love is embedded in the very fabric of creation and that is why one of the names for Jesus is 'Emmanuel' which translates to 'God with us' – that is at the heart of Christmas – may it be so for you.

All Souls' Service

This was held at Avening Church on the afternoon of Sunday 4th November. Many bereaved relatives came from near and far as we remembered those we have loved and see no more. Their names, 56 of them, were written on cards and hung on the 'thanksgiving tree' and candles lit in memory of them. It was good to share feelings over a cup of tea afterwards.

Remembrance Day Service

After the memorable events of Saturday evening the church was packed for this service on Sunday morning. We thank those who came. The British Legion have been sent over £280 collected at this service, a considerable increase on last year – thank you.

Forest Church

Our Forest Church on 10th November was at a farm near Tetbury and was attended people of a wide range of ages. We focussed on the beauty of the area, the sounds and the sights. We then looked at this Christian symbol and made it from the fallen branches and



leaves before lighting the fire and had a song, some prayers and refreshment. We look forward to another Forest Church in the new year.
















A Village Boy Takes His First Steps to War

The year is 1941, my apprenticeship with the RAF is complete and I am now Airframe Fitter 1st Class serving at Moreton-in-Marsh. Like many of my colleagues I was anticipating an overseas posting. Several war zones were not "doing very well", so a posting to one of these zones was not long in coming. A summons to the Orderly Room confirmed I was posted overseas.

After "Embarkation Leave", goodbyes were said. Instructions demanded I report to R.A.F. Padgate, where we were issued with khaki battledress and tropical khaki drill uniform as well. This complete, after a daily roll-call we were permitted to pass the time away, so Uncle Tom's Cabin, Blackpool, a few miles away, became our Headquarters.

Alas our numbers had now swelled and the 'draft' was assembled and we embarked on an overnight train trip to Scotland. After the usual 'pep-talk' we boarded a troop ship (an ex-P&O liner conversion). The usual issue of blankets and a hammock followed with a location to sling it in – our allocated number on deck 'so and so'. Practice followed and eventually we achieved expertise in mounting and dismounting our hammocks.

The conditions became ghastly with no air-conditioning, so the air was heavily contaminated, but worse was to come. During the following night we felt a vibration through the ship: We were underway.

By morning we were headed for the seas around the north coast of Ireland and September lived up to its gales. I had never seen the height of such waves. We were confined to the lower decks and very few were not sea-sick. This situation lasted a few days but eased as we approached the Atlantic. I concluded the only ones who enjoyed the experience were the 'Lascars' (sailors from territories east of the Cape of Good Hope who were employed on European vessels), who crewed the ship. "Weather good; no submarines in such weather", they chanted.

We were fed and watered and settled down to Navy Regulations, also to meet some of the troops on board, a mixed bunch of Army, Navy, Fleet Air and Royal Air Force. Some of the men had completed previous tours and were not a happy bunch, but we sailed on, zig-zagging against possible submarine attack. The further we sailed into the Atlantic the warmer it became and a number of us slept on deck, although this had its hazards. An early rise was essential, as the lascars armed with hoses would wake us washing decks with: "Wakey, wakey, George". (Everybody on board was known as "George" to the Lascars!). Personal hygiene was almost impossible, but we made do, and it stood us in good stead for our next posting of sand and sun.

The Mediterranean was closed due to severe enemy action so the long journey around the Cape of Good Hope was essential. This meant that we had to sail across the Atlantic and then take a reciprocal course to Freetown as refuelling was needed. That necessitated a stay of two to three days in intense heat.

On our way again, we crossed the Equator with the usual ceremony and headed for Town, South Africa, for Cape another refuelling. Conditions were now so bad that a strike was anticipated ("we would go no further") so shore leave was hastily arranged and we enjoyed the courtesy of the South Africans who took us into their homes and allowed us to bath. What a relief! Then day after day we roamed the city and stayed with the family who were our guides. Eventually all good things came to an end and we sailed for Durban. How well I remember the 'Woman

in White' as she was known, an opera star who sang each ship in to port and likewise sang them out again with 'Land of Hope and Glory'.

Next stop was Aden to refuel again. This took longer as the 'chain gang' of natives refuelled us from four gallon tins. Away again up the Red Sea; what a relief that we were not detailed to sail on with the rest of the convoy. We parted company, with us sailing North whilst the others sailed East, only to land up in Japanese Prisoner-of-War camps in Singapore.

The last lap: we anchored off Port Tewfiq in Egypt and were taken ashore in 'lighters' (small boats) and thence to await our next posting.

We sailed from the UK on September 17th 1941 and docked at Tewfiz, mid-December.

Ah, Christmas!

The Royal Air Force contingent was housed in Transit Camp at Helwan to await the next posting, that being the Desert Air Force, where we were to remain for the rest of our four-year tour.

But that is another story!





The Jim Parsons Reading Room

The Reading Room was officially re-named by Jim's son Keith, prior to the Parish Council meeting.

WWI Centenary Event

The event proved to be well attended, very successful and also very moving. Huge thanks were expressed to all those involved in helping to organise it.

Avening Youth Club

It was reported that a grant has been approved to set up a Youth Club for 12 - 16 year olds in addition to the existing club for 12 - 16 year olds. The views of what young people would like from the club would be welcomed.

Future Events

A reminder that the Christmas Tree lighting will be happening this year on Saturday 1 December at 5pm.

Memorial Hall Roof

Proposed Planning Application for Old Quarries

A planning consultant attended the meeting and presented the proposals to Councillors. These proposals included restoration of the main house and gallery; demolishing inappropriate modern buildings, and creating a total of 11 dwellings. The detailed designs of the proposed buildings were not yet available but Councillors were concerned about an increase in traffic and unsuitable access to the site – suggestions were made to remediate the risks, but these will be fully considered when the application is formally submitted to CDC.

Installation of replacement windows and door and insertion of side facing window - Flat 2 Simon House 4 High Street Avening Gloucestershire GL8 8LU. No objections raised.

Ref. No: 18/04043/FUL

Conversion and works to barn to create one dwelling with parking. Barn at Owl House West End Avening Gloucestershire.

A number of concerns were raised including;

- Possibility of contamination to nearby stream from building works and water disposal, as no details were available for foul water disposal.
- Access to the adjacent bridleway needs to be maintained.
- Over development of a largely unspoilt area of outstanding natural beauty.
- Possibility of flooding.
- Visitor parking

Part of site was originally designated as agricultural use so change of use application was required


