
The Parish Letter


It is a symbol of Hope which will

A PILGRIMAGE TO THE HOLY LAND ~ 2008

n February 17th 2008 Doreen and I joined 20 other people, mainly from our old church in Somerset, at the start of a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. After nearly 5 hours flying from Heathrow to Tel Aviv's Ben Gurion airport, once we had cleared immigration and gathered our suitcases from the dreaded carousel we were met by our Guide (Aviv).

To set the tone for the whole of our Pilgrimage we stopped at a viewpoint over-looking the outskirts of Jerusalem where we read Psalm 122, in which the Psalmist asks us all to pray for the peace of Jerusalem.

We then proceeded to our hotel for the first four nights of our journey

Our first full day was perhaps a little unusual as our visits included both the beginning, Bethlehem and at the Shepherds fields. and almost the end of Jesus life with a walk from the Mount of Olives to the Garden of Gethsemane down the route that Jesus took on that first Palm Sunday.

The next day, Tuesday, we awoke to be given a whole



new meaning to the carol "In the bleak mid winter", for Jerusalem was covered with a blanket of SNOW. This did not stop us from our planned visit to the Dead Sea for a "float", Qumran where the Dead Sea scrolls were found, and the cable car to the top of Masada.

By Wednesday all signs of the snow had left Jerusalem so that we were able to travel mainly on foot around the old city including what to most of us were the most moving experiences of our lives These included praying at the Western (Wailing) Wall, entering what is thought to be the room where the Last Supper took place, and walking **up** the Via Dolorosa Her we stopped at several of the stations of the cross, both reading relevant passages from the Bible and singing various hymns suitable for the place in which we were. It is very humbling to be near to the place where Jesus was crucified and buried, also to walk on some

of the stones that were there at that time and wondering whether our Lord's feet had touched the same stones.

The last three nights of our Pilgrimage were spent in a Hotel at Tiberias on the shores of Lake Galilee. On our way there we stopped in Nazareth visiting a Kibbutz that is being run as nearly as possible in the same way as it would have been 2000 years ago.

Tiberias A timeless scene—a Nazarene and his donkey we were shown

the sites that are believed to be those of Jesus' ministry including the Mount of the Beatitudes where the Sermon on the Mount took place, the site of the feeding of the 5000, Capernaum and also Mount Tabor, where the Transfiguration is thought to have taken place. As we entered the church at the summit, I was reminded of Peter's words to Jesus "It is good to be here with you Lord", and I for one really felt that it was.

Our pilgrimage finished at Caesarea Miritima, on the Mediterranean coast, the remains of the city that was the Roman capital of Palestine for about 500 years.

We had been promised a trip of a life time, and that it certainly was. From scripture reading to prayers, asked and answered, to Hymns sung in various places along the route, even to the WALL that surrounds Bethlehem. It all means so much and the Bible stories that were so familiar will now have a more realistic meaning to them.

In closing I would like to pass on to you the inscription that was written above the door of our hotel in Tiberias, it comes from Matthew 28 verse 10,

"Jesus said to them 'Do not be afraid; go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me."

As I have said the pilgrimage that we went on was with a group from our old parish in Somerset but if anyone is interested I am trying to arrange one from this area in February 2009. The engines varied in size from 90 to 220 tons, most having been made years ago in Glasgow. They travelled for miles through the bush. Sometimes helping with stoking and riding on the footplate of the engine.

A couple of night's break was taken at a small hotel where they went on a 'booze cruise' - champagne and nibbles - up the Zambezi where hippos swam around, crocs kept a watchful eye on them and elephants crossed when the coast was clear. The pictures were wonderful.

Thy then hired another train to go into Zambia. This took them

over a bridge which had been made in Sunderland in1905. The train was stopped in the middle of the bridge, over the Victoria, so that they could take photographs. Next came the 'Flight of Angels', a ride in a 6-seater plane over the falls, to take more photos of the Falls with the train parked up in the middle of the bridge. At the end of the trip they were able to go on Safari.

The evening finished with cheese and wine. The only sad thing about the evening was the fact that twice Mr Berry had to stop while he and several others had to go out to deal with some very unruly characters who were causing a disturbance to the meeting. Members were very worried about their cars parked outside the hall. We were quite glad that we had some men visitors at the meeting. A sad state of affairs and hopefully it will not happen again.

e always seem to be very busy at school but this March, as Well as learning more about Easter, we seemed to have an almost record-breaking amount of activities and events, all of which were very enjoyable for the pupils and staff!

World Book Dav

For this year's World Book Day the children were asked to dress as a favourite character for school - a variety of outfits trooped into the playground including pirates, fairies, witches and cowboys. Potter seemed to be a favourite theme – not only with the pupils but also the staff who, in a very coordinated fashion, emerged to greet the children - all dressed as specific Hogwarts characters. As with previous years, the children all received a book token.

Songs everyone should know

Our older children had great fun learning any songs from the past few decades - from Country Roads Take me Home, to All Around My Hat! The school practices with our Owls class teacher Gill Redpath culminated in joining children from other local schools for a very successful concert in Stroud.

Mock Trial

Year six pupils got a flavour of how the law works, taking part in a mock trial. In the case of the 'graffiti' they won against Woodchester Endowed CE School. The school team acted out the parts of the accused, relatives, defence solicitors, magistrates and usher, against the prosecution team. It all took place in the Magistrates Court Room in Stroud so it was a real experience and enabled the children to understand the proceedings involved in a prosecution.

Sport Relief

One of the highlights of the month was our Sport Relief session. For this year's national sporting fundraiser the school held a very lively 'Shake and Wake' session for all the children and staff to kick off the day. The children, all dressed in sports gear, followed a funky routine

led by staff members Kelly Wilkinson and Shan Amos.

Working out to 'Shine' by Take That and 'I don't feel like dancing' by the Scissor Sisters, the whole school – staff and pupils – managed to raise over £100 for Sport Relief.

Avening Roll of Honour No. 4 Herbert John Bridgeman

Private: 1st Battalion Gloucestershire Regiment

erbert John Bridgeman was born in 1895 but was called "John" throughout his short life. He was born in the cottage attached to Avening Mill, where his father was the miller.

John's early life was in family history turmoil and a description of his home on the 1901 census tells all. In the home on Tetbury Hill lived his mother, aged 33, and his 54 year old step father (to whom she had been recently married), a stepbrother aged 18, a mentally handicapped half-sister aged 23, a half-brother aged 14 and an elder sister (8) and younger brother (3).

There is no readily available information regarding John's military career but we do know that as a member of the 1st Battalion, Gloucestershire Regiment, he found himself at Neuve Chapelle area of France on the 1st of May 1915.

From the War Diaries we learn that that day was spent on a route march and on Sunday the 2nd, a church parade was held. The following day there was a billet inspection followed by yet another move of billets, this time to Les Choqaux which was completed by 5.30pm. The new billets were very dirty hence the 4th of May was spent cleaning up followed by some indoor training. The 5th of May was taken up by training for wood fighting and they rested on the 6th with a Regimental Concert taking place in the evening.

They were on the move again on the 7th, this time moving billets to Lannoy which were finally occupied at midnight.

The following day they recuperated from the previous day's move but paraded at 6.30pm and marched to an area called "Windy Corner" which they reached at 11.30pm. They occupied trenches at Rue Du Bois and spent the night drawing bombs, respirators and rations.

At 7am on Sunday the 9th of May, following an intense bombardment by our artillery the battalion went over the parapet. The War Diaries state: "C and B Companies were not in good line

as they had to be extricated from the men of other Corps who were crowded in the trenches. The line went on till it was held up by very severe machine gun fire which started immediately our bombardment ceased. The remainder came out and gradually formed a line about 40 yards in front of our line whence no advance was possible. Here the line remained till ordered to retire. C Company lost about 60 men." The Battalion then withdrew to the lines behind the Rue Du Bois and the CO received orders to attack again at 2.40pm. This was the delayed until 4pm. The War Diaries: "Directly our bombardment ceased, hostile machine guns fired heavily. D Company suffered severely while crossing the parapet, A Company not severely. All the officers and nearly all the NCOs and men of D Company were killed or wounded. The Company advanced until they had gone about 120 yards forward. Here they were held up. A Company did not get so far before being stopped." During this period, enemy artillery fire was also brought to bear on "no man's land" causing further misery to the Battalion. The retirement was ordered by Divisional HQ and the Battalion withdrew to its trenches.

The losses were 263 men of which John Bridgeman was one. He has no known grave but is remembered on Le Touret Memorial. He was just 19 years of age and was unmarried. We have not yet been able to contact any descendant relatives.

We achieved a great deal at the inaugural meeting of the Avening Crime Group on 19th March.

The meeting, convened by Councillor Mick Williamson, was attended by Andy Fogden (Gloucestershire Police Neighbourhood Watch), Sue Fellows (PCSO, Gloucestershire Police), Sally Jennings (Anti-social Behaviour Coordinator, CDC), Abby Cook (Fosseway Housing), Reverend Celia Carter and Councillor Click Mitchell.

The Community Safety questionnaire has been finalised and 500 copies will be printed in time for distribution - primarily via our local shop/Post Office - from Saturday 12th April.

We have also arranged a 'Drop-in' Coffee Morning at the Memorial Hall on Saturday 19th April, from 10.00am - 1.00pm. Representatives from the Police Community Support Team, Neighbourhood Watch, CDC Anti-social Behaviour Unit, Youth Support Service, Fosseway Housing, Church and Avening Parish Council will be on-hand to discuss Safety and Care issues in our Community. A second shorter session, especially for mums collecting their children from our school, will also be arranged.

In parallel with this, the Crime Team will also be consulting with representatives from our Community in a SARA exercise (Scanning, Analysis, Response and Assessment) with the aim of identifying the roots of the problems we are experiencing, as well as possible and, where appropriate, enforceable solutions.


