The Parish Letter

"The light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it.

What does this mean, when the Gospel says that Jesus is the light of the world?

It is that, through His life, his willingness to live alongside us, he revealed the true nature of God. He revealed the depth of God's love by facing the same difficulties, struggling with anxiety and doubt, overcoming pain, bearing rejection even to the point of dying for us. By rising to life after His death Jesus demonstrated that good can overcome evil, and that the True Light of God cannot be extinguished by the darkness of the world.

He gives us hope, to live by.

We are indeed in dark times, With the ever deepening recession and a bleak outlook into the New Year. Many thousands of people are losing their jobs. Pensions are threatened, houses are being repossessed and money is short. Maybe for the first time in many years people are approaching Christmas with a sense of apprehension...... conscious that they may not be able to meet the expectation of their families and celebrate in the way to which we have become accustomed.

But is this all that really matters?

Have we not been losing much of what Christmas offers by the way we have been celebrating the Festival over the last fifteen years or so? Is there not something fundamental at the heart of it all which we have overlooked?

Every Christmas Eve I am deeply moved by the expression on the faces of the children as they take part in the Crib Service.....by their look of rapture, of reverence, of wonder. They experience the reality of the Nativity as they act out the shepherds, kings, angels, Mary and Joseph. For a while they are conscious of the closeness of God as they focus on the baby, and truly believe that God has sent His son to change the world and draw us into his Kingdom of love.

This is the heart of the Christmas story. The Christ child embodies all the things that really matter and are lasting.

Our happiness does not depend on what we have to spend, or how much we can buy. It depends on our awareness of the love with which we are surrounded......the love we can give to others. It depends too, on the knowledge that the spirit of Christ is still active in the world, and that His light will not be overcome.

We can learn much from our children......recapture a little of the wonder, hear again the message of the angels, and re-awaken our faith.

A seven-year-old boy, when asked to define LOVE thought for a while and then said

"Love is what is in the room with you at Christmas, if you stop opening presents and listen.

May you all have a blessed and wonderful Christmas



A letter from Zimbabwe, from Venetia Winkield, received in November 22nd

Dear friends


The hunger here is terrible. Most of the families we help have almost nothing else to eat. Their vegetable patches have dried up as they struggle among big queues to draw water and carry it home. The rains have come but it will take some time before they can eat anything they plant now. Most of the families seem to have several other family members, not on our list of orphans and carers, who live at the house and share the food we give - but those people have nothing either.

We have managed to get a little seed maize so far and have heard of some fertiliser we may be able to get, as it is now the maize planting season and most families have dug their patch near Mabvuku all ready, just in case they get seed. Most Mabvuku schools have virtually closed for lack of teachers. Jayne said of one of her families: 'Says things are fine at home, but not very talkative. He tries to read but it's not easy with no teacher. These teenagers are very low and have a sense of hopelessness. ... is no longer doing extra tutoring as people around Mabvuku don't have extra money for tutors.' We will not get school uniform as we usually do in November, nor shoes, will just see what happens by next term.

Anyway, today at Avondale we are packing parcels for Christmas for the Mabvuku people, clothes for everyone which we have been given over the year, and a little something else for each one, and hope to be able to do a Christmas food parcel to be given out on Christmas Eve. The Lord knows the distress and we pray for his mercy on all these Mabvuku families and on our country Zimbabwe.

Thank you all for your prayers and help.

Avening Roll of Honour No. 11 Ralph John Dee

Sapper: 70th Field Company, Royal Engineers

rederick William Dee was born in Avening in late 1861 and was baptised in Holy Cross Church on Sunday the 23rd of February 1962. He was descended from at least four Dee generations in the village and became a carpenter on leaving school. He married Sarah Underwood, a member of another long-standing Avening family on Saturday the 4th of December 1880, again at Holy Cross and they had two daughters and a son (Daniel Edward) born between 1888 and 1893. Unfortunately, Sarah died in 1894 aged 31 leaving Fred with two daughters aged 10 and I and a son of 14.

We can only speculate as to how they met but Fred married again in 1896 at the Registry Office, Devizes, his new bride being Annie Eliza Plumridge aged 22. Annie was born and bred in Stoke Poges, Buckinghamshire. They had three children, Ralph John born on 17 August 1896 and Vera Lilian (1900) and Hilda Annie (1904). All of Fred's children were baptised in Holy Cross Church.

Some time in the early 1900s. Fred and his wife became landlords at The Cross, Avening and they are listed as such in Kelly's Directory of 1907. It was early in the First World War that tragedy again struck the family. Fred's eldest son, Daniel Edward died aged 25 on the 1st of April 1915. The Parish Registers do not say how he died. The same year, Ralph John, the eldest from the second marriage, joined Kitchener's First Army. We do not know whether he had followed his father's carpentry trade but he was taken into the Royal Engineers. He was posted to France on the 31st of May 1915 and we know very little of how the 70th Company was involved but by December the war had descended into bitter trench warfare. The last battle on any size had been the allies' "Big Push" of September and October which had proved costly in lives and for no avail. December 1915 time snipers, regular artillery bombardments. was of reconnaissance patrols and skirmishes to take enemy positions in Northern France and Ralph would have been heavily involved in trench and bridge reinforcement and the maintenance of wire defences. On Monday the 8th of December he was killed near

Bethune. He was buried at Le Touret cemetery, Richeburg-L'Avoue and his grave is tended by the War Graves Commission. He received (posthumously) the Victory Medal, the British Medal and the 1915 Star. But this was not the end of the family's distress as Ralph's youngest sister died just a month later aged 11 and was buried alongside her half -brother in Avening Church yard. The headstone is to Daniel and Hilda but Ralph John is also mentioned.

We have been unable to locate any living relatives.

THE MAGISTRATES COURT, CHRISTMAS SHOE BOXES & THE W. I.

On October 10th Pat Taylor and I were amongst 20 other W.I. members from around the County who met at 1.45pm in the Magistrates Court building in Gloucester.

On entering the building we went through a security check similar to that at an airport. When all were assembled we were taken to a small interview room where a magistrate outlined briefly the work of the Court and answered any questions. Then we were led into Court 1

There was quite a delay before we all stood as the three magistrates entered – two women and one man. One of the women was the Chairman, the other two being called Wings. The Chairman gave a special welcome to our W.I. group. Of the three only the Chairman speaks out in Court, although at times all conferred quietly together. We had already learned that the magistrates are lay people and the clerk of the Court is legally qualified as is the legal advisor to the Court, unlike the County Court where the Judge is legally qualified.

The defendant was already in custody on another charge and was brought up from the cells by two security guards and sat in the enclosed dock. The whole atmosphere of the court room was very calm. No loud voices, pacing up and down or waving of arms as in TV courtrooms. After details of the charge were given by prosecuting counsel, the defendant was moved to the witness box where he was questioned extensively, mainly by the prosecuting counsel. It was 4.10 pm before the Magistrates rose to leave the court to confer and reach a verdict. All three magistrates have equal say in the verdict.

Unfortunately because the case had over-run, many in our group had to leave because our car-parking tickets were running out, so a W.I. member who was staying on gave out her phone number so that we could ring her later to find out the verdict - GUILTY- with a Conditional Discharge for two years.

Unfortunately for him he was still awaiting sentencing on the charges for which he was already in custody.

Our recent Quiz Evening in the Social Club raised money for the transport costs of these boxes, which will go to Central and Eastern Europe, Mozambique, Swaziland or Liberia. We all wish we could be there when a child with very little opens one of our boxes.

TUDOR TIME TRAVEL FOR AVENING PUPILS

This term year 5 and 6 pupils (the Owls class) at Avening Primary School have been focusing on the 'terrible' Tudors as one of their topics and have been learning all about life during the reigns of Henry VIII and Elizabeth I.

As part of the topic, the children recently enjoyed a spot of 'time travel' to Mary Arden's farm in Stratford-upon-Avon where they took part in 'Tudors Alive!', a living history experience where they became Tudors for the day. The children thoroughly enjoyed dressing up in Tudor costumes - stays and laces, breeches or long skirts, jackets, woollen garters and a variety of headwear! They engaged in a variety of traditional farming activities including threshing and winnowing and also tried their hand at Tudor crafts such as making tallow candles.

They took their turn in the Tudor kitchen making butter and baking bread, and for their lunch they feasted on typically Tudor fare such as ham, cheese, bread and fruit.

Owls class teacher, Mrs Gill Redpath commented: "This really was a fantastic way of bringing classroom learning to life for these pupils. Not only did they see Tudor life first-hand, they got to experience it as well. It was certainly one of the best trips we have done and has proved a memorable boost for our topic work." The pupils have produced a fantastic array of model Tudor houses. They have written diary entries and found out more about the Tudor farming year – as well as writing extended historical 'novels' with a Tudor setting.

These brief extracts from the diaries the pupils wrote give some idea of what they learned about daily life for youngsters on a Tudor Farm.

'After I had helped with the cooking I had to make the butter. ... I like the squelch it makes and the feeling of it between my fingers.My legs were aching from standing up but I couldn't say anything......' Rebecca

'After that I had to go to the barn and separate the grain and the chaff, together with my dad. It was quite easy because I am a very strong lad. The clothes I had on were very uncomfortable. The shirt was itching because it was so rough but at least I was warm working so hard.....' Gregory



'I was really looking forward to falconry because my father had a new peregrine falcon.....and it was great fun. I had to get a leather glove and my new bird. I went outside and my bird flew around the field. It came back and scratched me on the arm (naughty bird!)...' Thomas

".....It was then time to do my last job of the day along with my dad. We went into the barn and had to shear as many of the sheep as we could. It was very hard work trying to hold the sheep still. At the end of it, mum cleans the fleece and gets the wool ready to knit. ..."

All those vegetable peelings for a start - sprouts, parsnips, carrots and potato peelings can all be composted at home. To balance out the vegetable peelings don't forget to add wrapping paper, along with cardboard packaging, and how about those shredded receipts from all that Christmas shopping. Other festive items that can head to the compost are cardboard tubes from the kitchen foil, cracker jokes ("How do worms send their Christmas cards? Through the com-post!"), party hats, streamers, pine needles and envelopes. Just scrunch them all up and add them to the mix. 
