Thought for the Month

It was the most exceptional time! In May this year we made a short visit the Holy Land. By chance we were all able to be together to visit our daughter who is doing humanitarian work for Amnesty International in Tel Aviv and more recently for a human rights group ICAHD in Jerusalem. Rose showed us how to travel



by sherut, a shared taxi that only departs when full. We stayed in a convent in Nazareth where the sister welcomed us warmly, hugged us and told us that she loved us (well me and Rose) – she was a bit more timid with the boys! It was deeply moving to stand as a family, often just the four of us quietly alone, before the most holy places – the place of the Annunciation in Nazareth, the birthplace of Jesus in Bethlehem and Mary's tomb in Jerusalem. The 'sense of the place' was quite overwhelming.

To tread the path that Jesus trod from the Mount of Olives and Gethsemane,

through Lion Gate amidst all the hustle and bustle along the Via Dolorosa up to Calvary, now the Church the Holy of Sepulchre, into the heaving crowds, was quite extraordinary! lt took a two-hour crushing wrestle reach the to silence of the tomb Jesus where was laid. How amazing it was that our guidebook was the Bible!

Jerusalem the universal

city is the capital of two faiths and the shrine of three faiths. I am so thankful that our children could visit, and even live there for a time to gain some understanding of the people. We need to live side by side and it is now our

children's time to do good and take away our fear of people we do not understand.

Our son, before setting off this summer to study for an MBA in Beijing, "the focus of business and the material world", has by contrast, just returned from an Order of Malta Volunteers camp in Lebanon. There he learnt how to care for the most 'abandoned' in this world and witnessed the horror of the

disabled locked away from human eyes in Beirut. He and his fellow volunteers learnt from those they cared for as well as from helpers from the Lebanon and others from all over the world.

In Beirut, like Jerusalem, the three Churches stand side by side. The Christians and the Jews and the Arabs can live together as somehow they dobecause there is no other way.

Our children understand more than we do discovering the world afresh. Let us pray that all our children's hearts may be filled with love and courage so they may be able to go out into the world to do good and help others.

Avening Parish Records

If you want to get ahead.....get Ann Brick!

Ann's extraordinary knack of being able to read difficult and worn script, was first noticed whilst we were mapping the churchyard graves a couple of years ago.

The exercise of transcribing our Parish Registers started in 2007 and, working backwards from 1999, reached 1700 with little difficulty. Avening's Registers go back to 1556 but the task of reading the earlier records proved difficult and the operation stalled. We were studying



records, supplied by Gloucestershire Archives, on microfiche and the originals had suffered from damp, fading, poor handwriting and, worst of all from my point of view, the occasional use of Latin!!

Then Ann volunteered to "have a go" and she achieved success quite quickly. Thanks to her efforts we now have, fully transcribed, our Baptisms, Marriages and Burials from 1556 (when Avening's records began) to 1999.

The results have been computerised and are presented in indexed form in 25 year groups. Our first showing of the complete records will be on Saturday the 12th of October at our Family History Day in the Memorial Hall, but if you need access to them at any time, we can arrange a personal viewing.

These latest records cover the period of the Great Plague. I naively thought that was over by 1666 and the Fire of London but, from the numbers of burials in Avening around that decade, it appears that the affects were being felt here a couple of years later.

Amongst today's vibrant population in Avening, I feel sure there must be someone in the village who can write a small article on the affects of the Plague on Avening's population for our Avening History. Is there anyone willing to take on this challenge? If so, please contact me.

Meanwhile, thanks again to our "transcripteur extraordinaire", who has helped to complete an almost unique record of Parish Records.


Parish Update

Canada Day at the Bell

Oh Canada!



On the last day of June this year, The Bell at Avening was decked out in red and white, the Canadian maple flew proudly from the flagpole, and the dulcet tones of Michael Buble echoed down the High Street. What on earth?

Canada Day was being celebrated (admittedly a day early) courtesy of Avening's very own resident Canadians, Peter and Jaqui Hofman. For the last three years,

they have brought a little piece of their Canadian tradition to the village on or around the 1st of July and shared it with friends and villagers.

Hosted very generously by The Bell, Peter organises the drink: the beer, Moosehead, and Jaqui provides the Canadian 'snacks', including butter tarts and Nanaimo bars. Butter tarts are small sweet filled pastry tarts a bit like our treacle tarts but with raisins and pecans added. Nanaimo bars are a chocolate crumb base topped with vanilla butter icing and covered in melted chocolate and then refrigerated – needless to say, there are never any left at the end of the evening.

Only Canadian music is permitted – along with Mickey Bubbles, (to name but a few) there is kd lang, Bryan Adams, The Crash Test Dummies, Alanis Morissette, Shania Twain, Nickelback and, of course, Celine Dion – something for everyone?! A highlight is Jaqui and Pete patriotically and spiritedly singing the Canadian national anthem.

Canada Day is essentially Canada's birthday, celebrated on 1st of July, and marks the union in 1867 of three colonies (Nova Scotia, Brunswick Province and the of Canada) into а single called country Canada. Celebrations are usually outdoor public events



including carnivals, festivals, picnics and fireworks. Avening is in good company – celebrations also occur in Trafalgar Square (location of Canada House), New York City, Hong Kong, and Shanghai.

When I asked Jaqui why they do this each year she replies: "To bring friends and community together to celebrate our Commonwealth and Canadian beer and have a good ol' party!!"

MUSIC




In the last weeks of term the children made the most of the sunny weather playing outside with lots of toys and equipment. The sand and water have been particularly popular.



Avening Book Club



The Great Gatsby by F. Scott Fitzgerald

This much studied, talked about, reviewed classic leaves me little to add except to say it caused lots of intense discussion at our book club.

The epigraph at the beginning of the novel gives us a foreshadowing of events that will unfold. Not just in the life of Gatsby but also in life of F. Scott Fitzgerald as fact and fiction entwine. *'Then wear the golden hat, if that will move her; If you can bounce high, bounce for her too, Till she cry 'Lover, gold-hatted, high bouncing lover, I must have you.'* Some of the group members have returned to this novel again and again with real affection and other members of the group found the novel depressing and its characters superficial, shallow and morally bankrupt. The very sad thing about the novel is how it echoes Fitzgerald's life and how as an author he is able to take a critical stance against it in the shape of Nick Carraway.

The roaring twenties and the Jazz Age have an enduring hold on our interest to this day but this novel explores the dark side of that era. Gatsby's love interest, Daisy, has little to recommend her; she is very fickle and extremely shallow. Gatsby's obsession with her makes him a pathetic shell of a man. It is in fact very difficult to get a grasp of Gatsby as a character as he is so contrived and lacking in substance – Fitzgerald achieves this effect very well.

I found that when reading this novel a couple of decades ago I focused on the enduring romance of it and the allure of the era. On this reading (maybe its age and cynicism) I found I was far less forgiving of the characters and focused much more on the bleakness and lack of decency and humility within them. It reminded me of crass eighties culture of acquisition and ostentation.
