A Christmas message from the Bishop of Gloucester, The Right Rev'd. Michael Perham:

Blessed are the peace-makers



"O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie" is one of the most poignant of the Christmas carols, because the sad truth is that Bethlehem is anything but peaceful, caught up in the Israeli/Palestine conflict, a sign of injustice and oppression.

Praying for the peace of the Holy Land has always seemed to be an important part of Christmas and prayer for the ever smaller Christian minority in Palestine gradually being squeezed out. But in 2013 it is not just the land of Christ's birth that has been on our television screens, but the whole North African and Middle East region, where the promising

Arab spring has gone so wrong. No Happy Christmas in Syria or in Egypt this year.

It would be comforting to be able to forget all about such things at Christmas. A comfort, but a nonsense. For the birth of Jesus is God's good news for the oppressed. Jesus really is the Prince of Peace - ruler of a kingdom that begins in prayerful, peace-making human hearts like yours and mine, utterly unlike any

other kingdom, and which, if we will be its citizens, be a beacon of hope in a troubled world.

Commitment to that would be the perfect Christmas present we could give to God and to God's world in response to God's giving of his Son.



Roll of Honour Update No. 26

George Hill

Private: 2nd Battalion, Seaforth Highlanders

Those of you with long memories, will recall that in the July 2010 edition of *The Villager*, I wrote about George Hill, who died in May 1918.

Typically, George had his share of small inconsistencies in his history. Always given the name George, even by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, his full name was actually George Hibbard Hill. Born around 1894, no mention of him is made in our church records although he may well have been brought up as a Baptist. His father, James, came from Bath and his mother Elizabeth was born at Wootton. The family settled in Star Lane in about 1877, but had moved to Mays Lane in time for the 1891 census. George was then seven by which time his mother had died. James remarried before the next census of 1901 and George was still living in the family home and was, by that time, working as a mattress maker at Oakham Mill, Nailsworth.

He married in the Spring of 1911 at Cricklewood, North London, with a daughter being born two years later.

We are unsure when he enlisted in the Seaforth Highlanders although he may well have been conscripted and posted to whatever unit most needed men. He found himself facing the German Army at the time of the enemy's last big push which started in March 1918. He was one of two men manning a Lewis Gun, he firing the weapon and his comrade being the ammunition carrier and loader. As the Germans advanced, George lost contact with his colleague and other members of his section but continued the fight on.

He was wounded and lay in the field being tended to by the advancing enemy troops. Whilst lying there, the British counter-attacked and three days later he was found and taken back to a field dressing station. It was too late to save him and he died on the 3rd of May 1918.

Thanks to Ann Brick and her subscription to www.findmypast.co.uk it can now be confirmed that he was, as suspected, awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal (DCM) and the citation reads:

"For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. As Lewis gunner he fought his gun in an exposed position. He poured drum after drum into the enemy, who

overwhelmed his team. After lying wounded, he escaped from the enemy in the dark".

This is not quite consistent with press reports in Stroud which explained that he had lain on the battle field until the British counter-attack. The local newspapers also gave his medal award as the Military Medal (MM). The Seaforth Highlander's archives can find no record of the MM being awarded but confirmed a DCM to G H Hill of Cricklewood.

Confusion continued in Avening when it came to the War Memorial tablets in our church.

His entry can be seen as George M M Hill, although, as an excuse, he had been away from the village for ten years!! He carried Avening's highest award in the village for WW1.

Lest we forget.



A Lewis Gun in action in France 1918.


From the Archives

Hazel Redding recently came across a predecessor of the Villager magazine in a junk shop in Tetbury, where she now lives - the special 900 year anniversary of Holy Cross Church edition. She very kindly donated it to the Church archives.



It is not quite the same as this magazine, as it is basically a generic nationwide church magazine with the typed bits for Avening stapled inside the

pages. The front front cover. reproduced here. shows ladies from the WRVS handing out teas somewhere in London. but the sticker on the top is about Avening.



The first page has a rather brief Easter message to the Villages from the Rector, and then we discover that things haven't changed hugely in Avening and Cherington, with a very familiar list of church services and events - although a lot more tea seems to have been drunk. Whit Sunday (25th May 1980) saw a service for everyone baptised in the church during the preceding 25 years, followed by tea in the Rectory Garden.

On the 15th and 16th November, the bells were rung by two different groups.





Down To Earth



The Fountain Garden at Mapperton

Horticultural happiness is a hot and steaming compost heap, a zillion glistening crimson brandling worms, wriggling as they work your garden waste into gardeners' gold.

I started my compost heap the week we moved in, layering brown cardboard packing boxes with the turf I was digging up for my vegetable plot, then adding kitchen waste and other organic material as I always had done at our previous

garden. Ignorant of the meaning of the term 'Cotswold brash' before coming here, I rapidly saw that compost would be even more important to render the stony scree into a more hospitable home for my plants. A compost heap should never smell; it should never contain ingredients which attract flies or vermin; be neither too wet nor too dry. 'The ideal mix', according to Monty Don, whose book, The Complete Gardener, is one of the more interesting and readable gardening manuals, 'is a high ratio of carbon to nitrogen'. Carbon is in paper, cardboard, straw and dried plant stems; nitrogen in grass cuttings and other green material. As long as the compost heap has contact with the soil, brandling worms appear and rapidly multiply, attracted by the temptations of a feast. In ideal conditions, compost may be ready in about six months: dry, crumbly and the colour of rich dark chocolate, smelling of the damp woodland floor.

When the leaves and debris have, mostly, been tidied away - always allowing the odd corner as a hibernating home for wildlife -, when the garden has been put to bed and it's too raw and damp to work outside, then it's good to have some winter foliage close to the house. Evergreens such as skimmias, euonymus fortunei, pieris japonica, variegated ivy and even cotoneaster hoizontalis -with the herringbone habit- work well in large pots in a sheltered spot, planting three to an eighteen inch pot. Pieris, which are ericaceous, will need to be given an occasional tonic of Murphy's 'Sequestrene' or a feed of liquid seaweed and sequestered iron as they would not otherwise be able to take up iron from the soil and the leaves would turn yellow and chlorotic.

Garden visits this month took us south, to Mapperton in Dorset, and north, to Hergest Croft in Herefordshire, and prompted the reflection that it is rarely a

garden, in isolation, that you visit, but a terrain. From such a visit. you return to your little plot and its environs with a new perspective. Mapperton garden lies in a combe iust 5 miles inland from Chesil beach and bears traces of a 17c beside Edwardian garden the Fountain Court. This was laid out by Mrs Ethel the 1920s Labouchère under the influence of the Italianate garden designer, Harold Peto, whose own garden at Iford Manor near Bradford on Avon is also well worth a visit. There are some fine specimen trees in the

arboretum. Hergest Croft, high upon the Welsh border, contains an exceptional collection of plants and trees built up by three generations of the



Winter foliage plants: pieris, cotoneaster and euonymus.

Banks family, the first of whom,


W. Н. Banks. was influenced in his laying out of the gardens by the late 19c garden writer. William Robinson, who advocated more naturalistic and less formal planting. 



Avening Book Club

We loved this rich, complex, theme laden novel; our second Man Booker short-listed title. We have dislocation, dispossession, bi-culturalism, tsunami, death, memory, truthand consequence, conscience, the second world war, a kamikaze pilot, the reader-writer relationship, depression, suicide, a 105-year -old anarcho-feminist nun, quantum mechanics and Schrödinger's cat....oh, and time.

The Japanese-American novelist Ruth lives who lives on an island in British Columbia stumbles on a barnacle encrusted parcel that reveals a Hello Kitty lunchbox. The lunchbox contains are some old letters and the diary of Nao Yasutani, whose wonderfully authentic voice takes us on a journey through her deeply troubled sixteen year old life. Her voice is chatty, quizzical, warm and funny despite the truly horrible time she's having. Nao is looking for a reader of her words and Ruth is the recipient.

Nao is also Japanese-American, she has returned to Japan from Silicon Valley where she was happy and thriving. She easily gelled with America yet when her family returns home after her father loses his job, Nao finds herself an outsider in Japan. Ruth has sacrificed New York for her (sometimes rather irritating) husband's need to be on the isolated, claustrophobic island. Both writer and reader are displaced.

The narrative switches from Nao to Ruth episodically and while Nao's story is more engaging than Ruth's, almost to the point where I wanted to sometimes skip over Ruth's, the reader sometimes needs the quieter, more sedate life of Ruth to anchor them after Nao's story gets increasingly more desperate.

Nao's life is burdened by her suicidal father who returns to Japan unemployed and becomes ever more depressed. Nao's mother is strangely absent as a character and both parents oblivious to the horrifically sadistic bullying Nao is experiencing by her classmates and her teacher.

A wonderful character in this novel is Old Jiko, Nao's 105 year old, deeply wise, texting great-grandmother. Jiko manages to calm and center Nao in her mountain temple where life is simple and full of Zen wisdom. Nao sets out, in her diary, to tell the story of Jiko and tantalizes the reader with information about her anarcho/feminist politics and truly exceptional personality but ultimately fails to live up to her challenge. Old Jiko's kamikaze pilot son whose letters are also in the lunchbox are translated for Ruth by Frenchman, Benoit. These reveal an interesting and very moving set of parallels.
