Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



We have had a pleasing amount of interest on the vacancy for a new Parish Clerk – if you have been thinking about applying, don't delay, as the closing date for applicants is 15th March. Full details are available from our current clerk, or on the website.

During half term week, there has been a lot of activity in the hall to ensure it remains a safe environment for users – two decayed lintels have been replaced in the Chamberlain room, and Gloucestershire County Council (who are responsible for this area), have removed some asbestos from the school kitchen. The newly elected hall committee will now take back responsibility for day to day management, improvements, and maintenance from the Parish Council which has been looking after the hall for the last year or so.

Crime in Avening is historically pretty low – we still have a steady rate of niggling issues such as break-ins to out-buildings and sheds, and a small number of petty crimes, but there are also hidden issues that tend to be technology related. I have a simple rule for emails, especially those that purport to come from businesses, if it doesn't address me by name and have other personal details it is unlikely to be genuine. NEVER click on any link or attachment that you are not entirely happy is genuine – it is always better to go directly to a website, and navigate from there. That said, I recently received an email from a friend referring me to a document, but something about it didn't seem right – it wasn't his usual language or tone, so I replied asking for clarification. I had a reply, but it still didn't seem right, and it was eventually confirmed that he had been the victim of an email hack! Much work was then needed to change passwords to avoid further problems.

Just as you need to be aware of risks to physical property and secure your possessions, it is equally important (but perhaps more difficult) to secure your virtual world – be careful; and be suspicious of anyone who wants to know your business. These data crimes don't appear on the police statistics for the village, but I am sure there will be many more victims here than physical crime – and they can be much more difficult and sometimes costly to resolve.

Letter from the Parish Priest



Are you ready for Mothering Sunday?

It's a wonderful opportunity to say thank you ... to our mothers and for everyone who has helped "mother" us over the years. Speaking personally, I have a wonderful mum who has been a great role model and given me unconditional love. She's always believed in me too ... although perhaps not quite as much as Picasso's mum? He once wrote: "My mother said to me, 'If you are a soldier, you will become a general. If you are a monk, you will become the Pope. Instead I was a painter, and became Picasso.'"

We'll have our special Mothering Sunday services at 9.30am at St Nicholas, Cherington, and then 11am at Holy Cross here in Avening, with posies and a piece of Simnel cake to collect for your mum. Do come and join us.

At the end of March we come to Holy Week leading to Easter, and we take this chance to share in services across our six parishes. Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday (20th March), with our usual services in Cherington and Avening. Then, each evening, our 7pm services go from village to village in our benefices, providing times of quiet reflection and prayer: on Sunday in Long Newnton with Stations of the Cross; Monday in Beverston with lessons and carols for Holy week; Stations of the Cross again on Tuesday in Avening; and on Wednesday in Cherington with a Taizé service. Thursday 24th March is Maundy Thursday, when we remember the Last Supper at a special service together at 7pm at St Marys' Tetbury. Then on Good Friday, we follow Jesus' journey to his death and burial. We join as Churches Together in the Tetbury Area for the Procession of Witness at 11am, starting at the Gospel Hall in Hampton Street in Tetbury, followed by our Tenebrae Service at Holy Cross at 2pm. Finally, at St John the Baptist in Shipton Moyne that evening (7pm), we share in a service specially written for us by The Right Revd Michael Perham, former Bishop of Gloucester, to mark the burial of Jesus.

What a joy it will be to then celebrate Easter, and Jesus rising again. We start as we light our "Easter Fire" outside St Marys' Tetbury on Saturday 26th March at 9pm. This is followed by a wonderful Easter service which moves from darkness to light ... and finishing up outside again with lots of bells and fireworks. So do join us then – or for our services on Easter morning in Cherington at 9.30am and Avening at 11am followed by our riotous Easter Egg Hunt all around the church. Not to be missed!

By the way, Mothering Sunday is Sunday 6th March – don't forget now. With love and prayers,

Jeannie Pargeter 1929 — 2016

Many glowing tributes have been paid to Jeanne Pargeter, a popular cornerstone of village life, who died at her home, Longmans Barn Farm, Avening, on 8th January, at the age of 86.

She was born in Gloucester on October 13th 1929 and grew up in the city. However she found her calling in life, and her husband, John, at agricultural college in Usk. John hailed from Tump in Edge, near Painswick, but after their marriage they made their home in Avening in 1954.

With a farm, a thriving haulage business to run and three daughters to bring up, time was precious for them both. However after John died in 2004 Jeanne's life as his wife was over, and she threw herself into local clubs and societies, where she was loved and valued for her contributions and warm personality.

The church always played a vital role in her life and she was a regular and devoted member of the congregation at Holy Cross Church in Avening, where she served as sides person, sacristan and member of the flower team for many years.

On hearing that Avening Art Group needed a venue she offered to host the group at Longmans. Encouraged to have a go, in spite of her protestations that she couldn't paint, right from her first attempt, Jeanne proceeded to produce beautiful, meticulously executed pastel pictures. Whatever the subject, her versatile work was characterised by her excellent eye, incredible attention to detail and her constant quest for perfection. But she was also a wonderful hostess, and all comers were welcomed with open arms by Jeanne and her little dog, Millie. The Art Group will really miss her warm and lively presence.

John and Pat Bingle from the Minchinhampton Garden club also paid tribute to their friend of 50 years saying "Jeanne loved socialising and entertaining, and often invited the members to her home, with bluebell walks through Hazel Wood, then back to Longmans for tea and cake. We have all lost a wonderful friend."

Yvonne Crew of the farmwomen's guild said "Jeanne loved being very involved and regularly hosted meetings at her home, where her warmth and hospitality were much appreciated. She was a dear friend for 55 years."

Jeanne was also an accomplished ballroom dancer, attending classes at the Britannia Dance Studio in Cainscross, where she won many medals and awards.

A few years ago Jeanne's wish to share her beautiful home and garden, in its glorious setting, led to her launching her popular Musical Garden Parties,

where a picnic lunch was followed by an afternoon of entertainment by the Avening Angels Choir and other local musicians. These also raised good sums for local charities as well as being most enjoyable.

Jeanne loved her family above all and leaves three daughters, Ruth, Sarah and Priscilla, five grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

"She loved people and entertaining them," said Sarah, "Mum and Dad spent their lives together, and when he died it was very hard for her, not having him there, but, after some difficult years, she made the most of her life again."

Priscilla added, "She made so many friends, and her faith and her family were so important to her."

The packed church at her memorial service on February 6th bore witness to her immense popularity, as relatives and friends from far and wide gathered to celebrate her life.

Jeanne had a wonderful capacity to make everyone feel so welcome and at home at Longmans. Her vibrant personality was a light shining on all and she illuminated so many lives with her love, warmth and enthusiasm.

She will be sadly missed by so many people, especially those who were lucky enough to be her friends.

Avening W.I.

We had a very good attendance at our February meeting where we also welcomed some new members.

Our speaker was Liz O'Dell who is a volunteer from the Shelter Box Charity. Liz brought along one of the shelter boxes, a green plastic trunk which contains everything a family of five would need in a disaster where they have lost their home. There would normally be a tent inside but as that weighs an extra 55kg Liz wisely left that out. The box was very heavy even without the tent and was filled with pots, pans, plates, utensils, torches, blankets, water containers and purification systems. Liz had been through an intensive training programme and had been sent at extremely short notice by the charity to disasters in Brazil, Columbia, Nepal and 4 in the Philippines. They can get the boxes to families within days. Liz was sent to Nepal 3 days after the recent earthquake and experienced numerous aftershocks herself. She had some very moving stories and photographs of the devastation. The charity works in conjunction with other organisations such as Red Cross and Save the Children so that all needs can be covered. We presented a cheque to Liz for the charity which was some of the proceeds of the Fun Quiz held in October.

We put our monthly walk on hold until March as it has been so wet, so instead in February we took a group of 14 members to the Highfield Garden Centre for lunch and a spot of retail therapy. We will go on our first walk on 1st March around Avening hopefully avoiding too much mud. Shirley Hand will provide lunch for the walkers.

We will be entering the county skittles competition again this year and to get some practice in and have a sociable evening we are having a friendly match against Sandhurst W.I. on 17th March, followed the next day by another of Shirley Hand's popular fun quizzes.

We have also decided on our summer outing this year which will be in June to Dyffryn House and Gardens near Cardiff. This is a recent addition to the National Trust's properties and is very beautiful and should be at its very best in June.

At our next meeting we are going to have a demonstration and hopefully a go at felt-making with Penny Prince. Visitors are always welcome at our meetings.





Down to Earth

'Royal poo!' said the Kew gardener as she shovelled a from a cartload of Kew



compost beside the order beds. secret 'That's the ingredient.' Twenty tonnes a week delivered from the royal stables at Knightsbridge and mixed in with the hundred tonnes a week of collected plant waste at the Kew compost compound; watered with collected rainwater and turned regularly. I gazed in admiration and envy at this horticultural gold. Later,

in our winter wander around Kew Gardens, we climbed the viewing platform, from which the above photo was taken. (Not easy to find; we circumnavigated the compound before discovering a pathway through the shrubs). Then I reflected: with so many horses around us here in Avening, **our** gardens should be flourishing. No excuses!

It is 300 years since the birth of Lancelot 'Capability' Brown, an occasion to celebrate or curse. Brown, visionary or vandal? is the question posed by Caroline Holmes, garden historian, and that sums it up. From Stowe in 1741, where he contributed the Grecian valley to the work of William Kent, Bridgeman and Vanbrugh, to Berrington Hall, one of his final works in 1780, he transformed around 170 estates formerly comprising parkland and formal gardens. We admire, today, his artfully composed landscapes with serpentine lakes, fine

bridges, precisely placed clumps of trees, grouped cedars of and Lebanon, sheep cattle grazing, thanks to the ha-ha, unfettered seemingly in proximity to the splendid house. But we regret the loss of most of the formal gardens created by George London and Henry Wise around 1700 and recorded graphically in 'Britannia Illustrata' by Kip and

Knyff. Brownian examples in the vicinity include Bowood, in Wiltshire, and Croome Court, in Worcestershire, begun in 1751, though, personally, I find this

one somewhat bleak. At Blenheim Palace Brown enhanced the existing landscape by creating a broad serpentine lake, partially submerging Vanbrugh's bridge. Henceforth, 'the finest view in England' was gained on entering the estate via the Woodstock gate. Indeed, George III remarked, on visiting Blenheim in 1786, 'We have nothing to equal this.'



Pulmonaria, 'Sissinghurst White'

On one of the coldiest days of our short burst of winter in early February I noticed that my pulmonaria, 'Sissinghurst White', was flowering in joyful response to the bright sunlight and clear blue skies. This is early for the lungwort species, or Jacob's Coat, so-called because the colours of the flowers change from pink to blue, such that the two colours appear together. It is a hardy plant, preferring shade and good drainage, so ideal in a woodland or shrub border. It colonises willingly, but never so much as to be a nuisance. I love it.

I used to sow cucumber and tomato seeds in January, but was then faced with the problem of giving them sufficient light and protection from the cold. Experience taught me (slowly) that later sowings invariably catch up, so I wait now until early March. Broad beans are tough enough to withstand some winter chill; indeed, some varieties may be autumn-sown. What they dislike is summer heat, which is why they are the earliest legume crop. I sow mine under glass, in large cream or yoghurt pots, and plant out when about 10cm tall and strong enough to withstand the onslaught of slugs or pigeons – or, at least, put up a jolly good fight!

This year I intend to allocate some space in a sunny spot for a cutting garden, hardy annuals providing flowers for the house. *Centaurea cyanus* (blue cornflower) are on my list, as are *gypsophila* and, of course, sweet peas, *lathyrus odoratus*, which can grow on a frame of hazel sticks.

As the mercury rises and the daylight hours lengthen, it will soon be 'full steam ahead'. With everything to play for and all things possible at the start of the season, one is easily overwhelmed. This year I shall try to combat the chaos resulting from my disorganised mind with a note-pad and pencil: a list of reasonably achievable target jobs at the start of the day, things that require attention noted during the course of the day, and plants or issues to look up when back indoors. Happy list-writing!

Diary of a Self-Build Part 14 – THE END!

Our much anticipated stairs finally arrived (after 14 excused of varying credibility!), and the treads were fitted. The glass was offered up, and... it didn't fit. The bolt holes to attach the treads were too far apart – out of 5 pieces of glass, only one fitted, so they will all need to be re-made. But at least we can use the stairs now, and see what they will look like. We also have the internal doors in place – Bliss!

So, in this 2 year process, with a 13 month build, what have we learned?

1 - Primarily, it is (as most people say) MUCH more expensive than you anticipate. The sheer quantity of materials and labour were



far more than we ever imagined. It is very difficult to specify anything even slightly out of the ordinary – despite having a great team, any component or fitting that was not in their standard vocabulary inevitably caused a lot of huffing, puffing, and head scratching. We have included a lot of features that while not necessarily being cutting edge, still aren't considered mainstream – this adds significant time and cost to the installation.

2 - Despite a great deal of planning, it took longer. We had aspired to have the house warming party at August bank holiday... then Halloween; but a combination of earlier delays to the timber frame, and consequential ongoing cashflow problems meant it took us 12 months to be habitable.

3 - The supply chain in the building industry is (with only a few exceptions) completely inept. Suppliers that tend to deal with consumers were great, but most of the others took far too long to deliver, even those that did understand what we wanted.

Will we do it again? Mandy says definitely NO! I say maybe (although it's a no at the moment), but it would be a shame to waste all the knowledge we have gained during this process. So, perhaps in a couple of years...??

I hope you have enjoyed our diaries over the last year, but it's now time to take a well-earned rest and get to know our new home. Hopefully we will have a nice summer, as we can't wait to be out on our top deck with a G&T and some pistachios.




