

Letter from Richard Maslen

Jesus of Nazareth was a great communicator, not just as a story-teller with a purpose, but also for the way He grabbed attention by what He said and the way He said it. That is the aspiration of every politician, and some succeed better than others. Jesus was not one but He worked with them extremely well because He displayed in what He said just what a true radical is – and it is not always what it can be taken to mean today.

Political radicals of every party or persuasion can be admirable and they can be dangerous, but religious ones can be even more so! Some narrow religious radicals, of all faiths, creeds and denominations may zealously seek to return followers to the roots of their faith but they can wreck the apple cart when they set about it.

Real radicals are always prepared to think again, and examine different, and hopefully better, ways of doing things. It means accepting possible consequences before setting out on a course and then being flexible about it if circumstances change. Radicalism is not dogmatism; it certainly means growth and change but does not always need total destruction to bring it about. That ought to be a good definition of Christianity.

Not all of us are always inclined to be radical thinkers, but 'back to basics, to use a political radicalism which got a bad name, may be just what the nation and the Church needs just now.


Who Was Joseph Rowland?



When we moved into our 300-year-old house in the High Street 17 years ago, I was stripping off several layers of wallpaper from one of the bedrooms. when I came across a name in flowery handwriting on the bare wall: *Joseph Rowland*. Who was he, I wondered?

A clue was revealed on the adjoining wall, which also contained some writing, albeit in a different hand. It was difficult to decipher, but it referred to a visit to Cirencester on 12th August 1830. There were also a series of marks up the wall, suggesting that a youngster's height might have been measured occasionally to check how he was faring. Possibly the writing on the wall, whilst not necessarily connected, could have occurred at about the same time.

A further set of clues appeared a week or two later, when we received the deeds and other official documents from the solicitors who dealt with the purchase of the house. Some went back to the early 1800s: laboriously written in longhand on parchment, these documents described in great detail various purchases and sales of the property. From these, I was able to piece together the likelihood that at one stage our house, with the stream at the bottom of the garden, was initially a weaver's cottage. This was not surprising as Avening was heavily involved in the cloth industry in the early 19th century, with the stream providing power for several cloth mills in the village. Some years later, the property was extended substantially and it operated as *Cotswold Stores*, which accounts for its current large windowed frontage and profusion of electric power sockets. More recently, the house became the local Post Office for several years, although all that



remains now is the safe in the wall and a raucous burglar alarm.


One of the papers in the pile was an Indenture, which was such an impressive document that we decided to frame it and hang it above the fireplace. This document revealed that, on 6th March 1824, Joseph Wood from Tetbury provided a mortgage of '£130 of lawful money of Great Britain' allied to the property to two carpenters. Their names were John and Thomas

Rowland. Apparently they purchased a 'feoffment' of three dwelling houses from John Wheatley, a butcher living in Monmouth, who had inherited the property from his mother, who died intestate in 1797.

The Rowland brothers bought the three cottages for £55 and converted them to larger dwellings. What happened to the tenants, James Fletcher, Samuel Fletcher and James Ind, is not clear, for the new houses were subsequently occupied by Thomas Rowland, William Parsloe and John Curtis, with two of the houses being converted into one by 1874. These houses were numbered 9 and 10 High Street; our house is number 48, which gives some indication of the amount of building that went on in the village since those days.

As John Rowland was not occupying one of the houses, it was beginning to look as though Joseph Rowland was the son of Thomas. Further evidence emerged from the church graveyard, where there are a number of graves featuring the Rowland name. John Rowland died in 1842 at the age of 57, some 16 years after they bought the houses, and his brother Thomas died in 1859, aged 67.

The 1891 Census has a large Rowland family farming at Avening, and church



headstones show there were Rowlands living in the village until at least 1931. most of them achieving three score years and ten. Apart, that is, from Joseph Rowland, for I found his headstone eventually: he died in 1846 at the age of only 29. If it was Joseph who wrote his name on our bedroom wall, he would probably have been about 13 years old at the time. Whatever, hadn't the heart to obliterate his signature, and so a little square of bare wall still retains his name.



She is hugely enviably but knowledgeable, wears her learning lightly, as they say. On the day of our visit, she was delighted to

have a bee expert in the crowd who had identified the greatest diversity of bees he had seen in any one spot — amongst Jekka's herbs. There is the herbetum, containing over 300 culinary herbs in raised beds, and then there are the rows of herbs for sale. Jekka created her very first show garden for Chelsea this year, 'A Modern Apothecary' for St John's Hospice, London and won a silver gilt. She has also recently been appointed a vice-president of the RHS, a terrific feather in her cap. I bought a myrtle, an evergreen shrub which has very distinctive and attractive flowers. Do look at the online directory of her herbs on her website; the next Open Days are on September 2nd and 3rd, so don't miss the opportunity.

Talking of bees, there is an exhibition, on until September 29th at the Oxford University Natural History Museum, entitled: 'Bees (and the odd wasp) in my Bonnet', based around the art works of Kurt Jackson, including a panel showing

(as preserved specimens) all 270 British bees. Would you have thought there would 'bee' so many? Still in Oxford, the War Memorial Garden, at the entrance to Christ Church meadow, just off St Aldates, is looking stunning — and attracting plenty of bees!

With the roof back on at Dyrham, the National Trust are turning their attention to the restoration of the gardens. The chief designer, between 1694 and 1704,

was George London; an engraving by Johannes Kip of 1712 provides the source for the restoration of the borders in the west garden; more is planned. A special exhibition, at Dyrham, gives a fascinating historical overview.

Now is the time to take some cuttings of those favourite plants which are not reliably hardy. I particularly like the salvia microphylla ('blackcurrant sage' – just smell the leaves!) and the marguerite daisy. Take a heel cutting, peeling back a short shoot at a joint and trimming off any straggly bits. (Plant growth hormones are concentrated at a joint). Then strip three quarters of the leaves and make sure there is neither flower, nor flower bud. Clean, sharp scissors or secateurs are a must. (Thank you, Jekka, for that piece of advice. How we, would-be gardeners all, winced when she gently lectured us about keeping secateurs sharpened!) Poke cutting into small pot, keep damp and out of direct sunlight. (Oh, and resist temptation to yank it out after a couple of days to look for roots. Nature needs time to work its miracles.)

Top tip for gardening cooks (or cooking gardeners): never prepare food with plaster on finger. Suddenly, you look down and the plaster is no longer there. In horror, you look amongst the chopped tomatoes and onions in the cooking pot

(for the plaster, not the finger). You waste hours searching kitchen and garden, only to find it (the plaster) where you'd just dug up some potatoes.

Now, if you have a garden which gives of its very best in late May and early June, as I do, then it will by now be fairly weedy, wayward, wan and windswept (I was going to add: 'washed out' but 'dried out' is more to the point at time of

writing, but, alas, not alliterative). But, oh recompensing joy: I overlook from the top landing a garden which is a positive firework display of colour in August! Some gardeners do things one way; some do things the other. Some people are right-handed, some are left-handed, some - lucky souls - are ambidextrous; some are just plain confused. (Which means we make some interesting and unexpected diversions on our long car journeys.) Ah, well. Vive la différence!




