Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



What a crazy few weeks this has been! I had been planning to write my final piece as chairman and hand over the reins to the new incumbent of the role. In reality it's been all hands to the pumps to make sure we have a plan in place to help everyone that needs it in these worrying times. I was away starting my retirement when it was all kicking off so could only offer remote support, but Patrick, Richard and especially Clare led the way to create the Avening Community Coronavirus Team help network, and the associated information leaflet – thanks to all of the people from all corners of the community who made this happen.

But that's just the start – now the hard work begins in making sure those in isolation or who are ill receive all the support they need. I know there are many people who have already signed up to help, but as the virus progresses we will need to keep up with increasing demand so do make yourself known to your local network coordinator (details are available from the Parish clerk (Shani, 07415 039234 if you don't know who yours is).

Another consequence of the pandemic is that the Parish Council meetings and AGM have been cancelled. The PC will continue essential business via email, with a small sub-group meeting up where needed. Without a public AGM we can't elect a new leader, so I'm afraid you will have to put up with me for a little while longer!

With all that has happened our hedge laying weekend at the playing field seems an age away, but despite the weather (which was relatively kind compared to the forecast), we had a fantastic turn out on both days (*Many thanks to James Rymer for the photos - Eds*). We made good use of the café on Saturday with a bacon butty run, and we also kept losing workers who went down for a cuppa! Mandy provided the butties on Sunday to keep us all going. The result is a very tidy living barrier along the whole length of the field – we will have to add the final





'featherings' next winter, but even now it's a huge improvement on the overgrown unruly jungle that it was before. Patrick persisted with the bonfire, and once it (eventually) got going we were able to consume every last scrap of waste material – very satisfying! Next year we are going to turn our attention to the upper wooded area, and will have some

lessons in coppicing.

Still in the playing field, in last month's Villager we reported what we thought was the illegal felling of a large tree. This wasn't the case, as planning permission had been granted, but because permission had been applied to the household and not the field, the connection wasn't made. It is very important to engage the PC first in similar circumstances, not only to ensure we are agreeable, but also to ensure a plan is in place to remove the debris. However we apologise to the householder for getting the police involved – the 'crime' has been struck from the record.

Our projects will inevitably suffer delays as the funding infrastructure in local councils and large organisations will be on hold for some time, so please bear with us.

Stay safe, stay healthy, and do reach out to your nearest team of helpers if you are struggling.

Your church in unprecedented times

At the time of writing there has just been a closing of all churches which must include our own village churches. However the church remains active and eager to maintain prayer and service.

This is an appropriate time to remind ourselves that prayer, and the Christian life in general, are not dependent on any particular building or specific to the day of the week. Many members of our churches, and others, are actively supporting neighbours and friends in a variety of ways, not least just to maintain human contact, albeit often by phone rather than in person.

Copies of the intended Mothering Day service were widely distributed even though we could not hold the service in the normal way and there was encouragement to put a lighted candle in front windows at 7pm on the day, a symbol of hope as suggested by the Archbishops.

We would have had services on Maundy Thursday evening (7pm), on Good Friday, the much-valued Tenebrae service (2pm), and on Easter Sunday morning (9.30 at Cherington, 11am at Avening). If you would like to receive copies of these services by email (possibly to follow them at the appropriate time) please do let me know.

<u>www.sacredspace.ie/</u> is a website that offers, each day, a sequence of brief prayers aimed at deepening the relationship between the user and God.

<u>https://www.churchofengland.org/</u> is the website of the Church of England with a great deal of material: the 'Prayer and Worship' tag leads to various resources including the wording of services being used across the cathedrals and churches of the land each morning and evening.

Easter stands as the supreme example of hope, of the conviction that there is a spirit of love that ultimately overcomes. Our villages will tap into that spirit over the coming challenging weeks.

Indeed, much mutual support is already evident with friends and neighbours being prepared to think for each other and to be aware of each other's needs – how encouraging. Thank you to those who have contacted me to say that they are willing to help others who are in significant difficulty. If you are in great need and are not sure where to turn please don't hesitate to contact me and I would hope to be able to put you in touch with some appropriate support.

Is Faith Relevant?

We, the nation and the world are faced with a situation totally outside known human experience – a situation that is bringing dreadful consequences for the lives and wellbeing of large numbers, and essential changes and challenges for us all.

What, if anything, does the Christian faith have to say about this? What it certainly does **not** say is that it is God's way of punishing those who have misbehaved! But here are some of the things it can say:

Life is a gift, we have done nothing to earn or deserve it, it has been given freely to each of us in a way that is way beyond ourselves. When we are prepared to allow that feeling to sink into the depths of our being, attitudes to so many things are transformed, not least each moment of consciousness, each emotion, each relationship – and our approach to misfortunes, such as the present one.

The Christian faith focusses on relationships; not only the relationship between God and each one of us but also between people. We don't have to look far into the gospels to see Jesus constantly seeking to improve the relationships between people and especially the capacity for these relationships to bring enrichment and fulfilment to lives. The Christian comes to see that when, as is happening in our villages at the moment, we seek to bring people together to share their needs, feelings, joys and sorrows we are engaged in that very activity which our creator is so wanting to see. In coming together as a caring community, we are being the people we are created to be. This is surely a time to reflect on what is really important in life underneath the veneer of all the luxuries and assumptions of the modern way of life.

Loss of life, especially of those who have experienced too little of it, is a tragedy and it is quite understandable that we want to ask 'why'. However no life is ever a wasted life: every life has the capacity to be treasured by others and every life is treasured by its ultimate creator who holds it in being outside of time.

Of course, we may ask why such things as viruses exist in a universe formed by a loving creator. Leaving aside that some viruses have beneficial effects, this really boils down to why creation wasn't made to be different and perfect, according to our judgment. Perhaps it is somewhat presumptuous to ask such a question: Job tried it in the Old Testament and you may like to read the responses he received. A Christian response adds that from the moment of the 'big bang' the universe has been given the freedom to explore its countless possibilities through an interplay between consistent physical laws and unpredictable random events. This leads to a world which is bursting to produce life in a wide variety of forms and it is this extraordinary process that has enabled you and I to come into being, blessed as we are with consciousness and free will.

We are about to celebrate the Easter story again, albeit in a somewhat different way from usual. We will recall how a rather mixed selection of people (the disciples,

followers of Jesus) from varied backgrounds often with limited education and resources were distraught by the apparent elimination of their expectations at the time of the crucifixion: there seemed little hope, all that they had worked for over recent years was gone - or so it seemed. But not so, the story of Easter morning brings renewed hope, encouragement and much more. That is at the heart of the Christian faith we celebrate, this and every, day.



Avening Community Café Annual General Meeting



The number of you who came to the first Avening Community Café AGM was certainly а ringing endorsement of all that has happened in the past year – we packed in to the social club, welcomed everyone with drinks nibbles and managed the and business meeting efficiently, with good humour and lots of thank yous!

Sandra Hetterley, who has been a

tower of strength as a committee member and a marvellous organiser of the cake bank, was stepping down but will still be very much involved with her team serving behind the counter, coming up with her own imaginative and yummy bakes and generally lending a hand. Thank you Sandra. Peter Barton was elected to fill the vacancy and we are looking forward to harnessing his enthusiasm for almost everything but particularly all things 'green'. Jennie South and Bob Jennings continue as Chair and Treasurer respectively and so do the other members of this hard working (in cafe laid-back style!) team; Gill Adams, Clare Bebbington and Wendy Jennings.

We invited three contributions giving different perspectives on the café.

Tony Slater on behalf of the Parish Council described how the café had filled a gap especially since the shop had failed and that the café offers opportunities that a shop could not. He also welcomed the café initiatives such as the litter pick and green events.

Katy Upton who runs the Avening Cinema described how last June, discussions led to collaboration between the café and the movie club resulting in a movie matinee, featuring The Greatest Showman, in August. Following its success another was held in December showing The Lion King. She thanked the many volunteers for their hard work. They were anxious to keep prices as low as possible and both sold out and met the costs. The surplus funds enabled donations to be made to Avening Playgroup, to go towards outdoor play equipment and roof repairs and to the café's annual charities, The Mark Townsend Trust and Stroud Women's Refuge.

Clare Bebbington described the two green cafes last year, a theme that touches everyone in this beautiful part of world. She noted our use of locally produced milk, the recycling boxes, the two litter picks and working with school ecocouncil who had given a presentation to the café on the avoidance of palm oil. The café had also featured on BBC Gloucestershire radio. At least one other café has been encouraged to follow our lead. Phoebe Carter our café environmental champion had contributed to the green cafés and she described her new community orchard initiative at the playing field with aims including boosting wildlife and providing heritage trees.

The focus then moved on to lively discussion in small groups collecting ideas and suggestions for making the café even better and then, what was better still, we had offers from people who wanted to help to make them happen. Huge thanks to all of you and although things will be on the back burner for a while we will be ready to hit the ground running when we open our doors again – and as you will read elsewhere, the café is going to be 'out and about' in little ways to brighten your days in the coming weeks.

Barbara Bennett, 1926 - 2020

I would like to commemorate the passing of Barbara Bennett, nee Jones, with a few words regarding our friendship over the years since the 1930s.

Barbara, her mother and sister Doreen, came to Avening in the 1930s, I was about 8 years old, and Barbara was the same age, we became friends and stayed friends until recently when sadly Barbara died.


When the family came to Avening they first lived in a little cottage in Mays Lane next door to Mr and Mrs Green. Mr Green was the village postman and also the village green Keeper, or Roadman, as he was called. He kept the whole village tidy and beautiful – was always cheerful, and with always a kind word, also when he wore his Postman's cap. We had two deliveries a day and even a morning delivery on Christmas Day, those were the days!

I spent many happy hours with Mrs Jones and Barbara in the cottage in Mays Lane; she was a small quietly spoken woman who made me welcome. Barbara got me interested in reading - being a tomboy I didn't settle down with a book but Barbara changed that, she lent me books by Richmal Crompton (Just William) and Little Women by Louisa May Alcott, and I never looked back.

Then things changed. Mrs Jones and her daughters moved to the Old Police House on Hampton Hill, where sadly Mrs Jones died. Then sadly, years later Doreen died leaving Barbara.

The war came, Barbara went to Newman Hender as a secretary and I went to Vickers Armstrong in Aston Down, then on to the A.T.A. also as a secretary. We did not meet up for a while, then later resumed our friendship. By this time we had both married and had children, later grandchildren. All the while our friendship blossomed until recently.

Now, just prior to her 94th Birthday (7th June) my friend died. "Goodbye old friend, rest in peace"

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Wild About Avening

As I opened the blinds the other morning I was greeted with the sight of one of my favourite birds, the Bullfinch. Each year at this time I see several pairs in the hedgerow at the top of the garden which is always a real delight. However, this one was only a few feet away from me gathering tiny seeds from the dried seed heads of some buttercups which we had left uncut in the lawn. So intent was he on his meal that I was able to watch him for a several minutes before he finally flew off.

Bullfinches are usually shy and secretive birds making them hard to spot. The males have a black cap, stubby black bill, grey back, black and white wings and a bright rose coloured chest. The females are similar but have a greyish-brown chest. They are incredibly rotund and front-heavy and it is thought this large bull-headed shape gave them their name.

Feeding on buds and fruit in woodlands they were once considered a pest of orchards with Henry VIII condemning their attacks on fruit trees to be 'criminal' and offering a penny for every bird killed. It is rather incredible to think that they could ever have been in such large numbers as today they are Amber listed birds of conservation concern due to significant declines in their populations.




Due to their beautiful looks and remarkable ability to learn and imitate new songs and whistles, they were prized as ornamental cagebirds, imported in vast numbers from Germany by the Victorians. The natural song of the Bullfinch is a little mournful but they are quick to learn new songs so people would whistle at them until they copied the tune. In Thomas Hardy's *Tess of the d'Urbervilles*, it was one of Tess's daily chores to whistle to the bullfinches as she works at the house of Mrs d'Urberville.

Bullfinches like to nest in thick hedges so if you can why not leave some areas of your hedgerow thicker and less manicured and leave a few 'weeds' such as dandelion, buttercup and nettles for them to take the seeds from. The reward of seeing them in your garden will make up for a little 'untidiness'.

Wildlife Spotting

Over the next weeks and months many of us will be forced to stay at home more as the country deals with the Corona virus. This is an uncomfortable and worrying prospect for everyone. While we go through this unsettling time and may be more restricted to our gardens and homes why not start recording what wildlife we see from our windows, in our gardens or out on a walk. 


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April sessions are, unfortunately, unable to run, suffering along with most other group activities, from the effects of coronavirus.



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

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
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
