Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



As we adapt to the new 'normal' the situation forces us to look for new ways of doing things and new things to do. I suspect sock drawers have never been so tidy, cars have never been so clean (we washed ours ourselves for the first time in 20 odd years!), and gardens have never been so weed free – it's just a shame that we can't buy any new flowers to fill them! We are also adapting to using laptops, iPads, and smart phones to communicate and to see our loved ones – even my brother, who until a couple of weeks ago didn't even have a mobile phone is now adept at WhatsApp and video calls. While these are all great, they are no substitute for a real hug, especially when something goes wrong and there's nothing you can do to help.

Many people in the village may be isolated or unable to go out - this is where our network of fabulous volunteers can help. There is a lot of information published on our website and Facebook page, but please also look out for neighbours that might not be connected. We have coverage across the village for collection of prescriptions, shopping, and other general help – if you are in need contact your nearest coordinator or see contacts below.

Clare Bebbington produces an informative and entertaining weekly roundup of Covid related village news and useful contacts – this is available from the website or via your coordinator. I had intended to call out here some of the great work being done by special individuals, but the most recent newsletter covers this much more effectively.

As I write this we are in the midst of some fantastic spring weather – the last of the late daffodils are fading, the native bluebells in the woods are a carpet of pale blue, and primroses, cowslips and orchids decorate our verges. It is often said how lucky we are to live in such a beautiful area, able to exercise without fear by walking the fields and paths. I have never seen so many people walking, and wonder where all the dogs have suddenly come from. But sadly (you know what's coming next!!) I have reports that the church is suffering a deluge of dog dirt; a tsunami of **** – this quiet and respectful public place is not appropriate for dog walking, but it is used as a connecting footpath. It is completely unacceptable not to pick up – there is even a bin at the main gate. I have a similar complaint from a resident in Mays Lane – unbelievably people let their dogs go onto a private drive and garden, even though there are bins at either end of the hill. I have encouraged everyone impacted to report the offenders, as sadly it might be the only way to stop this offensive minority. Beware – there could be cameras appearing where you don't expect them.

Our first virtual PC meeting took place on 15th April via the videoconferencing app

Zoom. It was very successful, and we will continue to use this facility until the lockdown ends. Anyone can join for the whole meeting or just the public question time at the beginning, and we will publish the link via the agenda, website, and Facebook.

The end of March brought a special anniversary for Mandy and me – it was 30 years ago when we moved in to Avening with one toddler in tow and an almost ripe bump. Since then we have made many lifelong friends, and are almost considered to be locals. We don't intend moving on any time soon – but we are still looking forward to the time when we can do some travelling.

New Zipwire for Avening Play Park

In this period of lockdown it is good to be planning ahead to when children can enjoy playing together again with their friends in the park. The old zip wire which was recently removed had proved very popular with many children, allowing them to enjoy the exhilaration and excitement of speed in a safe environment. The Parish Council has prioritised its replacement under the next phase of the Playing Field Plan.

The Parish Council has applied for a grant of £5,000 towards the cost of the new zip wire from the Calor Rural Community Fund working with Crowdfunder Ltd. All applicants are required to set up a Crowdfunder project to enlist public support. Those projects with the most public support will make the finalist stage and then be judged by an independent panel against a set number of criteria.

We are taking the opportunity through this crowdfunding scheme to help raise funds towards the approximate zip wire cost of £8,000.

We would therefore like as many people as possible, along with families and friends around the country to "like", "share" or pledge a donation during the "Supporting Period" which opens on 4 June and closes 18 June, to increase our chance of reaching the finalist stage. The project receives 1 point for every "like" or "share" and 10 points for each pledge. Locked Down or Opened Up?

Fed up with being enclosed, wanting to do the 'normal' things in life, nervous even to go shopping? Lots of reasons to be less than content at the moment even for those who are not ill.

But perhaps there are opportunities as well as deprivations. During this extended celebration of the Easter story – it continues through May – we are reminded of the events of another lockdown. Shortly after the resurrection the close followers of Jesus were locking themselves in a room to avoid contact with the religious leaders who might recognise them and take hostile action against them. It is hard to know what they were feeling or quite what would happen next, or when: so some parallels to our current situation.

Then the unexpected happened. They became aware of the presence with them of Jesus – well, not the Jesus in the same form as they had previously known him, although transformed, undoubtedly him. The walls of the house were no barrier to this experience which opened their eyes to a new way of seeing themselves and the world around them: it was the first phase of their inspiration and motivation for devoting the rest of their lives to spreading the spirit of Love into an often difficult and sad world.

We might well ask ourselves whether, and how, our lockdown will change us. Perhaps there are thoughts, ideas, feelings, experiences that we are having during this time that are worth holding on to and developing in the future.

It was also during the disciples' lockdown that Thomas was elsewhere when the others first experienced the presence of Jesus. When he returned, he was reluctant to believe what they told him – perhaps not surprising. Elsewhere we read of Thomas being his own man and being open and honest with others about his thoughts and feelings.

When the experience of Jesus again comes to the locked room Thomas is there, probably expecting a telling off from Jesus for expressing his previous doubt. However, that is not what happens, instead Jesus invites Thomas to see the crucifixion wounds. Thomas does not need to, he is overcome by the presence and immediately convinced. So, it is at that moment, when Thomas is being most genuinely himself, that God comes to him. Perhaps our current situation is reminding us of the sort of people we really are, warts and all, doubts and all. Being open to that is an invitation for sacredness to make its mark on us.

Another story that we hear during this Easter period is that of the two travellers making their way home, meeting and chatting with an apparent stranger. They invite him into their home for a meal and it is only when he blesses the food set out in front of him that they realise his true significance – "didn't our hearts burn as we talked with him" they say as they realise they had experienced the risen Christ. We might look back on some past experiences and appreciate within them a significance that was not apparent at the time. The divine comes to us unannounced and unrecognised at the most unlikely times and places.

Bertram (Bert) Hand 1934-2020



Bert passed away peacefully at Scarlet House on April 11th after nearly half his life spent as an Avening resident. Bert and I moved to Minchinhampton last year but we had lived in Avening for 42 years. We both lived in the same town in the Midlands and met at the church youth club and would have been married for 63 years on 27th April 2020.

When Bert finished his National Service he had a choice of career; an offer of a job in a bank and another in insurance. He chose insurance and enjoyed a very successful career. He didn't retire until his late 70s. He attended night school and achieved his Associate and then Fellowship qualifications. His first promotion was accompanied

by a company car an Austin 35. His area was very rural and the car enabled him to visit farms and farmers markets to help advise the farmers. He then worked in Birmingham, followed by London. We moved to St.Albans for 10 years before arriving in Avening when he moved his company to Gloucester. After a number of years, the company was absorbed by a larger set up. During his career, Bert had a number of visits to many countries such as Norway, Japan, Bermuda, Germany and Belgium. After many years working in Gloucester, Bert was head-hunted to help the Chinese set up an insurance company in London to provide cover for the growing number of Chinese restaurants in the UK. He had to undertake a regular commute from Kemble to London, meaning long hours. It was hard work for Bert starting from scratch; creating all the business and even furnishing the office. The majority of staff were brought over from China and Hong Kong, with no knowledge of England or the language. Fortunately Bert's insurance expertise ensured the business thrived even though he was only ever able to communicate in English! We were taken to China twice for incredible business trips as well as for regular 'team-building' weekends all over Europe. This was a very happy time in Bert's career.

Though in his later years Bert became an expert 'armchair sportsman', in his youth he had been a keen footballer and his passion for Wolverhampton Wanderers and fishing were constants throughout his life. In the war he used to go with his dad on their push bikes to watch the match and loved fishing with his Uncle Arthur in the River Severn. He never forgot once opening the basket on the railway platform and releasing the large eel his uncle had caught for his supper! In the 70s he was a keen golfer as well as badminton player and Bert and I joined the new course at Minchinhampton on arrival in the village. Our time playing golf led to a number of enduring friendships over the years. It was very early days as the club had just moved from the common, and members were expected to help by collecting stones off the fairways. Bert spent many happy hours enjoying the club facilities and fairways, even arranging several village skittle matches and village events at the clubhouse. Along with others, we started the Avening badminton club based at the Home Farm Trust as an initiative to increase links between residents and villagers – a great success. These Tuesday evening sessions led not only to longlasting friendships with the residents who came to watch and chat but greater opportunities for village participation in the many HFT social events held in those days.

In 2000, with Bob and Wendy Jennings, Bert and I started the Avening Amblers. We walked on Sunday mornings, taking lunch at the pub, and enjoyed many fun walking holidays with the group over the years. Bert enjoyed the companionship, but was a more enthusiastic walker when following a little white ball!

Bert was a 'home bird', even more so after his career necessitated so much travelling. Along with his love of sport Bert spent much of his leisure time fundraising for others, whatever the weather. Bert gave financial support to the village football and cricket clubs over the years. A dedicated member of the Lions Club for over 50 years, he joined the Tetbury Lions on moving from St.Albans. He served as club Secretary for most of his time and was responsible for delivering the Tetbury Advertiser around the village and surrounding hamlets until only the last couple of years. The Lions Club involved lots of social as well as charitable events. Living at the top of a steep drive in Avening had its difficulties but friends learned to park on the road, particularly if likely to risk imbibing one of Bert's notoriously strong gin and tonics before the days of drink driving!

We have been blessed with a close and loving family. Our legendary family holiday get-togethers with our daughters Sue and Alison, their husbands, assorted offspring and dogs have given Bert much enjoyment over the years; particularly time spent with those family members who also enjoy golf, fishing and Wolves! Bert had a great sense of humour which the family were always happy to indulge. Bert was particularly fond of spending time with his great-grandaughter Elizabeth. Retirement allowed him the chance to participate more fully with his grandchildren, including helping with the Avening School run. Bert also had time to enjoy walks on the common with his beloved dog Bess. The loss of Bess in 2018 was very sad for Bert and curtailed his walking opportunities and thus sadly, became a contributory factor towards his increasing ill-health. Bert managed to stay in his home right till the last few weeks until his condition meant he needed the specialist care that Scarlet House can offer.

A quiet, unassuming yet hard-working and kind man, who was always willing to do his part for wider society; he will be sadly missed.



Avening W.I.

Our members are keeping in touch and getting used to staying at home in these difficult times. Many are enjoying their gardens, trying new recipes and completing other projects, as well as getting to grips with new technologies to keep in touch with families and friends.

As a group we have responded to an appeal by the Cheltenham and Gloucester Hospitals Fundraising Committee to make drawstring cloth bags for hospital staff to use for laundering their scrubs. As I write several members are busy at their sewing machines and I would also like to thank other villagers who have offered to help.



Shirley has been busy, not only sending

members a fun quiz to test their memories of past WI events, but also updating an account of the history of Avening WI.

As we have no meetings to report at this time I thought it might be interesting to share some history of the early days of WI in Avening:

'The first record of an Avening WI committee meeting is on October 4th 1930, at Brookside House, chaired by the first President, Mrs Stanley Clarke (her Christian name was Evelyn, but the use of her husband's name is an indication of the formality of the time). Every decision had to be proposed, seconded and voted upon – for example the purchase of blue/grey crockery from Bon Marche in Gloucester in 1936, and the choice of teaspoons – either Woolworths at one shilling a dozen or Bon Marche at two shillings and sixpence; the latter was chosen as being more serviceable.

The first meeting of Avening WI was held in the Memorial Hall on Thursday November 6th 1930 when 40 members were enrolled. Following the formalities, games and dancing concluded an enjoyable evening. Most monthly meetings were held in the schoolroom until 1934, when the Parish Council approached the WI to use the Memorial Hall for a cost of £4 10s for ten evenings a year. The emphasis was on domestic skills in the early years, with talks on vegetable preservation, poultry keeping, how to cut paper patterns for dressmaking, bottling of fruits and even hat making. There was also a popular social half hour with plays, monologues, games and refreshments. Contrary to expectations cakes were purchased not homemade; in 1936 the decision was taken to purchase

locally from Mr May, rather that Mr Phillips of Tetbury. There were two competitions, judged by all the members – best darning, neatest buttonhole, garden on a soup plate, toy made from matchboxes and the annual homemade wine competition, which in 1936 featured beetroot wine in the red and parsnip wine in the white categories.'

Let us hope that we will all be back together at our meetings again soon, but meantime stay safe and well. The photo shows our village planter now that the tulips are out.

Top 5 Tips for Dealing with Uncertainty and Fear

Just to say I'm on the end of the phone to give advice on sprains, aches and pains of all sorts and to give advice on management of symptoms possibly brought on by stress and anxiety. Of course there is no charge. My web site: www.casbw.co.uk.

Meanwhile here are my five tips

1) Acknowledge and express how we're feeling - it's ok to feel frustrated, angry, unsettled etc many people skip over these emotions and instead want to stay strong and carry on. Safely expressing these emotions allows them to be recognised and processed, journaling is a great way you could do this.

2) Focus on what you can control - so much is outside of our control right now. Notice where your focus is for the majority of the day, if it's on things outside of your control it will make you feel helpless and disempowered. Write a list of what's inside of your control and purposefully focus on those throughout your day.

3) Stay in the moment - Fear only exists in the future or in the past, you are either projecting what could/may happen or thinking that something from the past will happen again. Mindfulness is a lovely way to help you to practise staying in the present. Even short periods of time in the present can do wonders for calming your nervous system.

4) Find something purposeful/meaningful - The purpose or meaning in your day may have changed since this pandemic started. Losing, or changes within our purpose, can feel unsettling so it's important to readdress them. Reconnect to something which brings you meaning, find something useful or meaningful about your day.

5) Have fun, play - Joy, smiling and laughter release happy hormones and yet people often forget to let go and enjoy during more challenging times. You can release joy through music, dance and enjoyable hobbies so make extra time for these and give yourself permission to feel enjoyment as you do them.





They included some wonderfully colourful and creative images and include jokes, messages of support and some brilliant drawings of officers and other key workers, including their own parents. The children have been enjoying English lessons, particularly inspired by Pie Corbett's radioblogging.net, where one of our children had a shout out for super sentences.

The school garden continues to provide an alternative and inspiring learning space and is being well utilised with pupils taking part in Forest School challenges being set by Mrs Carter who has also produced daily Forest school challenges for children at home. The children in school have planted vegetables and flowers and over Easter took part in an Eggstraordinary egg hunt!

We would like to say a big thank you to all of the support that we have received from the community, from the kind words over the school garden wall, to the cakes delivered to us each week from the Community Café and the Easter eggs donated by Waitrose and the National Trust. This has really helped with staff and pupil morale in these very difficult and stressful times.

A huge thank you must also go to all of the staff at Avening School who have endeavoured to maintain an almost impossible sense of normality for all children, both those at school each day and those working from home. Their dedication to the wellbeing of their pupils and their absolute determination to keep the children feeling safe and happy above everything else is testament to their profession and we feel so proud to have such teaching staff in our village school.

We long for the school gates to be open fully again. Until then, keep safe and well.

Dave and Pat Gardiner have sent in some lovely wildlife sightings and photographs including flocks of Golden plover; Skylarks; Brown hare and an unusual sighting of Eels on the golf course! I have set up a Facebook page called Wild about

Avening where I am sharing wildlife pictures and facts - give it a follow and share any of your interesting wildlife photographs or stories.

All of these wildlife records gave me the idea for the *Big Avening Wildlife Watch.* The aim is to get as many people as possible involved in recording what wildlife we have in the village. Please do join in this event on the Bank holiday weekend of **23rd May**. It's a great thing to do to get the kids engaged with nature and a lovely thing for anyone to do to pass some time. Let's find out how wild Avening is.

How to take part in the Big Avening Wildlife Watch

- 1. Grab a piece of paper and a pencil
- 2. Over the long weekend 23rd-25th May note down all the wildlife you see in the garden or on your walks round the village. We want as many records as possible so note down everything you see from birds and bugs to mammals and reptiles. If you're not sure what things are take a look at the links below:

You can spend as much or as little time as you want on this as the idea of this is to get a good inventory of the wildlife in Avening.

- 3. Write your sightings (with your name and address if you are happy to do so) on a piece of paper and drop at 56 Sandford Leaze (I will leave a box out) or email them to me at pklc1@hotmail.com. If you know there are other animals that visit your garden but that you didn't see over the recording weekend, then make a separate note of them too.
- **4.** I will then compile a list of the all the wonderful things you record and let everyone know the results.

A Weed or a Wonder?

Just a quick note of support for the humble Dandelion. Such bright buttons of joy from spring through summer these wonderful plants are far more than weeds. In the UK there are actually over 235 different variations (microspecies) of the Dandelion. Its medicinal properties as a diuretic led to it being called the 'Piss-en-lit' (translated politely as Wet-the-bed!). However, it is much more than a medicinal aid.

A quick call to the amazingly knowledgeable wildlife folk of Twitter led to the discovery that

the dandelion is used by the larval stages of over 50 different invertebrate species. If you then add on the adult butterflies; bees (over 150 bee species are thought to rely on the dandelion); hoverflies etc that use Dandelions as a source of nectar; and then include the birds such as Sparrows, Goldfinches and Bullfinches that feed on their seeds, you begin to see that this is indeed a Wonder and not just a Weed. So, if you can, do save yourselves the time of removing these little yellow wonders and instead marvel at their brilliance as a life support system for so many creatures.

Some Features of Avening Church

The Church of the Holy Cross is one of the most interesting and best preserved



of the ancient churches in the Cotswolds. Dating from 1080 it retains some of its original features of the Norman period.

By the main porch is a handsome Norman doorway with characteristic dog-tooth moulding similar to the contemporary arches in Gloucester Cathedral. This arch is supported by two twisted pillars of unusual Norman design, but similar to those in Durham Cathedral. A

perpendicular doorway has been skilfully blended with this Norman work.

In the chancel is the fine groined stone roof. The vaulting at the far end was skilfully made to



harmonise with the earlier Norman vault when the church was extended eastward. The ribs carry two fine carved bosses.

The present font is modern and replaced



an earlier one in the bottom right of the picture.

Built into the wall by the main door are two fragments considered to be part of the original Norman font.



The smaller fragment may be Adam and Eve, often associated with original sin and baptism.

The other shown in the picture has six figures possibly representing the Apostles, as these were commonly used for decoration at this time.
