Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



My day - Tuesday 16th June:

27 phone calls; assorted emails, texts and messages; and some face-to-face conversations. Subjects include: fighting the planning application for 14 dwellings opposite the playgroup; drop-kerb safety review; highways issues; speeding bikes along our green lanes; applications for Covid grants; discussions with the Environment Agency (EA) about problems with the stream; discussions with the police; dog attack in the playing field; neighbour complaints; flooding at the school and village hall; some other items that aren't in the public domain – all while trying to complete a house sale!

I'm not looking for sympathy as this (thankfully) isn't a typical day, but this is just to illustrate the very wide range of subjects your Parish Council has to deal with. Our group has different skills and knowledge, but our overall driving force is to get things done that will benefit the village. This might include scrutinising documents or planning applications, physically undertaking work in the playing field, or reacting to an emergency to clear flood water from the hall – your councillors have done all these things just this week! So, if we don't react to your priority quite as quickly as you would hope, please bear in mind we are all volunteers and have to prioritise what we do – especially now that we are unable to meet up as a group.

A different dog problem in the playing field this month (although the usual subject refuses to go away!). One person has been slightly injured and another frightened by out of control dogs. The law states that pets must be under control at all times, so if your dog is prone to running off you must put them on a lead. If they need more exercise, the chances are you do as well so don't just let them run manically around the field, take them for a proper walk! Oh, and clear up after them.

Following 6 years of resistance the planning application at Sunground has been referred to the Planning Committee at CDC, which has given us one final opportunity to get it stopped. It will have <u>huge implications for Sunground, Lawrence Road and the Playgroup</u>, but unbelievably there has not been a single comment from any resident in Avening against any of the three applications dating back to 2014! We need your support to get this unsuitable, unsightly, and potentially dangerous development stopped, so please visit the CDC planning page and comment against reference 19/04221/FUL. If you don't use the internet, you can also forward comments to the clerk.

Highways have started a very intensive road re-surfacing programme - included in this is Star Lane to the A433 Tetbury Road at a cost of £282,335. Other potholes are being filled along the Nailsworth Road and on the A46. I met with Highways in early June and they have agreed to install a channel to direct spring water away from the lane at Farm Hill and at Cherington Lake on the Nags Head lane. It is unlikely to happen in this financial year, but the latter may benefit from some earlier remedial work to improve the existing gullies.

The stream has caused concern over the last couple of months – low rainfall has combined with man-made interference leading to dangerously low levels. The reason for the most

recent incident remains a mystery, but I am working with the Environment Agency to establish the cause. We will also identify what can be done to restore the stream once Covid restrictions ease. There is, of course, some good news – otters have taken up residence, we get sightings of Kingfishers, and Herons are well established in the area. We now need to ensure the whole ecosystem is healthy for these higher predators.

Like my hair, Avening is getting a bit shaggy! Following on from the great spring, the recent rains have been great for gardens, so please check your boundary hedges and shrubs to make sure they don't impede the road or pavements, and give them a trim where needed.

There will be more details later in the magazine, but our Community Café team have pulled off another master stroke – if the people can't go to the café, bring the café to the people. Inspired!

At Home and at Church

Please also be aware of the government guidance which includes the need for hand cleaning, for physical distancing and mention of those who are particularly vulnerable and are not being encouraged to visit open churches.

One of the positive outcomes of recent weeks has been more time spent worshipping in our own homes. 
Compline Service


Farm Life



Last month I gave a little insight into the history of our farming business. This time I will let you know what we have been up to recently on the farm.

To start with, I will go back to May, when we released our young stock from their winter housing. This is a job that reinforces that summer is around the corner and that whilst our workload lightens in terms of tending the housed stock, we know that in a few weeks we will be flat out making enough fodder to last us for the winter months. The change in routine offers a welcome break! What makes this year different for us is that we have initiated a new grazing regime called 'Mob Grazing' for our younger cattle.

Mob Grazing is a sustainable farming method and a modern version of a traditional grazing technique. The principle of Mob



Grazing is to set out an area of land into small paddocks and you then graze these one at a time with a large number of stock. The cattle get moved frequently around these paddocks, typically lasting about a week in each one. The reason they are moved regularly is so as to not over-graze the pasture, leaving about half of the grass to start to photosynthesis. As each paddock is not over-grazed the grass plant then tillers, meaning that it is forced to produce more shoots. The objective of adopting this method is to reduce the amount of artificial fertiliser needed.



Cattle are very selective in their grazing habits and under normal conditions would leave any plants/forage that they deem undesirable. This way of grazing cattle has the added benefit of building up biodiversity in the pasture, this is because they are forced to eat weeds that often become invasive and under other grazing systems would rely on chemicals to control.

So far the young stock have adapted very quickly to this way of grazing and at the end of the week in a paddock can be seen queuing up to be moved on to the next one. This cycle continues for the grass growing months (March-Sep).

Although this might sound boring to some, it's a big step in moving the farm away from artificial fertilisers and towards a more eco-friendly farming system.

Other news is that I have received a number of positive comments about our wild flower meadow (Brook Field). It's great to see that some wild flowers have emerged, so far this seems to be predominantly Ox-eye Daisy. At the beginning of April we mowed the field to allow the wild flower seed to establish without being choked by the already grown grass. The plan going forward with this meadow is to leave it to nature as much as possible, with a small number of young cattle to graze it after the flowering period in



the early autumn. We will use them as a management tool to create seed gaps with their hoofs and trample in any seed.

The plan for the next few weeks is to hopefully make some fodder, although the long period of dry weather has reduced the grass growth considerably with a lot of farmers seeing low yields. At least the rain we have had recently will encourage some growth and we will be able to make either hay or silage soon. As they say 'A farmer is never happy'!

Avening W.I.



Avening WI is celebrating its 90th birthday this autumn and we have been taking the time during the lockdown to look back over the years. Ten years ago Shirley Hand, Di Wall and Gill Thomas searched the records and produced а booklet of the first 80 years, and Shirley is now in the process of adding the past decade to our story.

It has been stated that "If you remember the Sixties, you

really weren't there" and unfortunately this seems to be the case for Avening WI. Both the Committee Minute Books and the Monthly Meeting Record books for 1961 to 1975 are missing. What was going on? Who were the members? If anyone has any information from that period when the village grew greatly in population and great social changes were taking place, we would be glad to hear from them.

The Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977 was celebrated in true Avening style with a four day event. The WI was particularly involved with the floral display and catering. During that year they also produced a recipe book with members' favourite dishes, which was sold for 50p. Members also helped to decorate a carnival float for Julie Crewe, who was the Carnival Queen, and a drama group was formed.

The photograph shows Avening WI celebrating 50 years in 1980 and shows some familiar faces. Meetings continued to attract about 40 members and the programme included car maintenance lessons.

Into the Nineties and there were many social activities taking place including scrabble, whist drives, safari suppers, quizzes and sugarcraft classes. An Easter Fayre was held to raise money for storm damaged trees at Westonbirt.

At the present time we continue to stay in touch with newsletters, telephone calls and emails, and some members are able to meet up in small socially distanced groups. The committee managed a Zoom meeting and we are waiting for guidance to know when and how we can safely start meeting again. We are not anticipating that our normal meetings will be able to resume until at least September.

We would like to thank all involved in the production and distribution of The Villager for still providing this wonderful magazine for everyone in Avening in these difficult times.

I was so excited that this worked – the results were really excellent – but I didn't know if it would work for AA or if any of the members would trust me to mix their parts – quite a responsibility!

Easter was fast approaching and our usual Tenebrae service on Good Friday had been cancelled. I emailed all choir members to see who was interested and received such a positive response that I decided to go ahead with our proposed song, Man of Sorrows, which we sing to a guitar. So first step was to create the backing track. I recorded the basic song, verses and chorus, then sent this out to all members of the choir with a guide to recording. By this time, I was working from home and had a little more time to play

around with the recordings and later I also took some holiday and unpaid leave which gave me lots of free time to pursue this. My son, Julian, has mixed his own music for a long time now and after much badgering from me he suggested I use **Audacity***, a free, online audio editor.

You would think it might be quite simple to record your voice whilst singing along to a backing track but it requires two devices; one to listen to the backing track and one to record your voice only. It is actually quite hard to get your head around dealing with two devices at once and getting your singing in time and

sounding reasonable. I am sure we all had many goes at this to start with.

On the upside, it has been so funny hearing everyone's stories about creaking chairs, coughing, heavy breathing and coming in at the wrong time! I think we have all learned a lot about technology during this time and I have certainly enjoyed the challenge of synching the parts and getting the balance good enough to sound like our real choir. I also want to thank all choir members for trusting me to listen to their unedited, unaccompanied recordings, not knowing what the finished version would sound like. Jane Archer has also provided wonderful introductions and accompaniments for many of the recordings with her clarinet and whistles, which has really enhanced the finished pieces.

Some of the comments accompanying recordings have been very amusing (those of you

who made these comments might recognise them!!):

"A couple of technical hitches!"

"Another croaky attempt attached"

"My singing might depress you!"

"I must definitely work on my breathing (and everything else!)"

"Don't worry if it's too late, just bin it and sorry about the squeaky chair right at the beginning and end, hope you can lose it"

One of the challenges for me personally has been helping my mother, Gilian, to master an iPad for the first time in her life, made doubly difficult whilst she has been self-isolating. This has entailed me standing in her garden and recording her singing onto my mobile phone though her living room window. Unwanted recording additions have been ticking clocks, birdsong, dogs and lawnmowers!

I am now using **Reaper**^{**}, a more advanced recording and editing tool, to mix the parts, which has enabled more accurate synching and adjustments. I am now back at work and have a good AA Template set up on Reaper which allows me to add each singer's part to their allotted place, balance the voices as if we were standing as a choir and line up the parts fairly quickly.

Who would have guessed that at my age I would be learning how to synch voice recordings with a backing track and render this to an mp3 version suitable for most devices? It is actually really absorbing and I have spent many hours in lockdown glued to the computer, headphones on – essential when replaying parts for the 10th time - to avoid annoying my family who have vowed that they never want to hear these hymns again!!! EVER!!

Massive thanks to everyone who has contributed to these recordings, you have been awesome. I feel I know you all a lot better through listening to your recordings and am amazed at the trust you have put in me to do this. Thank you for entertaining me and giving me some great laughs through lock-down.

Avening School

Goodbye and good luck to our wonderful Year Six!

It has been so wonderful to have more children in school, as we welcomed back pupils from Early Years and years 1 & 6 from the start of June. School life is very different now, with four separate bubbles of no more than 15 children, which do not mix at all during the school day. Tables are distanced, staff are cleaning in between lessons and any reading books borrowed are quarantined for 3 days before being put back on the shelves. Children arrive at staggered times in the morning



and leave in the same way in the afternoon and as much learning as possible is taking place outside. Despite the social distancing measures in place, the children who have returned were so happy to reunite with their friends and teachers. The children of key workers also continue to attend, in their own bubble.

We are making the most of technology, by holding assemblies and governors meetings via video conferencing apps. We also hope to be meeting the parents and children of our new September intake virtually in the next few weeks too. This is all ensuring that the return to school is as safe as possible for the children in our care, for staff and parents, and for the wider community.

We also continue to communicate with all our children who are working from home with work packs sent via email and on our school website, weekly phone calls from teachers and the school newsletter, which is sent out each week.

Emotional well-being and mental health is a top priority at our school and to enable us to focus more on this we now have a new outdoor space known as the ELSA Pod (Emotional Literacy Support Assistant), which we are currently purchasing furniture and resources for with the help of £500 generously donated to us by Tesco.

As we approach the summer holidays, FOAS are keeping with tradition and planning to hold their annual Bear Hunt on the weekend of 11 and 12 July with all the appropriate risk assessments in place for the current Covid-19 situation.

Although the majority of the usual summer term events have been cancelled, we have managed to go ahead with socially distanced bikeability on the top playground for small groups of Year 6. We are so grateful to be able to give as much normality as possible to our y6 pupils who will be leaving our school this month to move on to their new secondary schools in the autumn term. This also gives them an opportunity to enjoy their

last few weeks together and even though a lot of their end of term celebrations won't be able to take place, we will ensure they all have the send-off they so deserve. We would like to take this opportunity to say a very heartfelt farewell to our funny, caring, dedicated and inspirational year 6 pupils and their families who will always be a part of the historical tapestry of our school and we look forward to hearing all about your future endeavours.






