## Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



I should like to begin my report by reference to progress in the ongoing stream issues, which have been a source of concern in recent months. The Environment Agency (EA) and CDC are compiling a report, which will examine the effect of the major earthworks at Aston Farm, just beyond Cherington Lake, involving a newly cut route in the cleared valley and damming of the springs to form a new lake. The flow only returned to normal in our stream once that lake had filled. If the report indicates that this action is the reason for the problems experienced then it may form the basis for enforcement action against the estate for the destruction of rare habitats impacting critically endangered species, plus planning and water infringements. Following the damage to our stream and depending on the findings of the report, the PC have unanimously agreed to take legal advice once our options are more obvious. We will aim to obtain financial restitution to enable us to reinstate livestock in the stream that was killed when the water flow was cut off. We always try to work with our local landowners and neighbours, but this has had such a serious impact on the health and diversity of the stream that we must take action .

During the ongoing discussions with the EA about these issues, I have arranged a meeting with them for a review of our flood defences and the holistic health of our streams – more on this next month after the meeting.

Thanks to Pete Barton for organising, and to all the participants for a highly successful litter pick – it's both interesting and disturbing to see the variety and amount of rubbish discarded in the verges! Separately, I have logged a case with Highways to clear the rubbish along the

Nailsworth road – there is a lot to clear, including huge numbers of bottles and cans!

By the time you read this we will hopefully have a new Memorial Hall management committee (although I do have doubts that we will have filled all the roles first time of asking). We have been discussing options for the responsibilities and relationship between the hall trustees and the management committee, and we need to have a close look at costs (we have already switched to cheaper electricity tariffs). I have asked for a meeting with GCC to review the lease and service charge arrangements with them before the new financial year as we haven't done so for many years, and much has changed since the lease was set up. This won't affect the school's status or budgets, but without any income from public rentals we need to ensure the hall is on a sound financial footing.

Along with many people I'm enjoying Farmer Sam's articles, and it's great that he has literally put Avening on the farming map with his pedigree herd. Despite having a lifelong

association with our rural community I am learning something new about life on the farm every month. David's travels are also providing some open mouth moments – I'm surprised he's still here to tell some of his escapades in far off countries!

As we slide towards winter the grit bins have all been filled, and we'll be dusting off the grit spreader (available to all residents to help clear local roads) that is housed in the hall alleyway. Cllr Patrick Mulligan will be the snow warden this winter and will coordinate any major weather events with Pete Savage who is our local plough operator.

Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal has kindly agreed to donate our Christmas tree this year, but unfortunately we can't have an event to mark the switch on of the lights. You will however be welcome to add spare decorations, and we'll try to think of something to enable them to be better spread over the entire tree.

If you have visited the website recently you will have seen that it has a fresh new look. The redesign onto a completely new platform was prompted by the need to make it more accessible to people with disabilities, so please do have a look and let me know if there are any errors or issues, or if you'd like to see anything in particular – not all pages are currently available, but these will be reinstated over the coming weeks

## **Memories of Fred Vening**

In 1985 'a Vening' couple arrived in Avening with a destiny to leave a legacy on the village that will last for hundreds of years.

I met Fred and Judith via their neighbour Maud Maxwell. Typically, they had given her all the strength she needed as she moved away from her beloved Ireland for the sake of her husband's health and came to live next door to them. The monumental change and the imminent death of Maud's husband was a terrible time, but she always said she got through it with the help of Fred and Judith's immense generosity of spirit and sense of humour.

Fred and Judith moved from Avening in 1996 after which Judith had a cancer scare as well as a serious operation on her shoulder. After she recovered, it was to everyone's delight in the village that they regularly came back to the church...... starting with

the 8 o'clock, which was impressive, as they had moved a good half hour's drive away...... in order to say, as Judith put it so beautifully: 'Thank you'.

During this time, Judith got confirmed and as Fred heard the names of those who had died on the War Memorial read out one by one on Remembrance Day, he was inspired to find out their backgrounds. This was no mean feat, as there are 48 for WW1 alone on the stone plaque in the church. However, being a perfectionist, he pursued the research with a vengeance and his attention to detail was mind-boggling. He was, of course, helped by Judith and, also, their good friend Ann Brick who has given so much of her life to Avening Church and village. Fred described Ann as 'a good egg' and used to say: 'to get a head, get a brick'. Thank you, Ann, for helping me remember all he did.

Researching all those on the War Memorial, from both wars, meant going online and then cross-checking the Parish Registers, so to compile basic family trees for all the men. He often sent Ann off to check the local newspapers at Stroud Library for any obituaries.

A further massive amount of his time was taken to locate the soldiers' family homes with his wonderful idea of placing blue plaques on the outside with their names and dates. He did this with old maps and knocking on doors to talk to current owners. All this work is beautifully presented in four binders and it inspired other places to do the same, such as happened in Nailsworth. Fred was always happy to help others with their research, even meeting several people from overseas looking for their family roots.

He then went on to transcribe the Avening Parish Records from 1700 onwards to complement Ann's work of the earlier years.....and then the census entries for Avening 1841-1911 – again all indexed and filed meticulously along with lots of information of the Village history with different files for various categories.

Ann also helped Fred and Judith with several family history days enabling all the records to be available in the church or village hall for people to consult. It drew a great deal of interest as you can imagine. Not content with all this, he then went on to map the churchyard, recording all the graves and even helping to keep them tidy. He and Judith also ran the book stall for the fete for many years, and Fred served on the PCC.

The Village Hall in Avening was built as a Reading Room during WW1 by the owner of Avening Court in memory of his two sons killed in action. It was designed as somewhere quiet for returning soldiers to go to. Above the main door there was an inset intended for the names of those killed. Tragically, it could not be used as it was not nearly big enough, so a stone plaque was inscribed and put in the Church. When Fred found out how to get the blue plaques made via the National Memorial Arboretum, he realised that the same workmanship could fill the specially shaped inset and, yet again, through his determination to honour the soldiers, he got it fitted and there was a great opening ceremony. His vision was done and his way of doing it inspired the Parish Council to create a Son et Lumiere on the side of the church for the hundredth anniversary of the end of the First World War, using his material.

Nick Winkfield, another great volunteer, remembers Fred as a super friend who was very kind, always cheery and pleased to see you, with humour in almost everything he said. His last memories of Fred are of him standing in the Churchyard after the Remembrance Service, with Judith waiting patiently behind him as always, telling stories to a group with his inevitable light-hearted banter. 'Gosh', says Nick, 'we really miss him and we will certainly never forget him.'

No, we cannot...... because wherever you look in the village there is a touch of Fred. In the blue plaques, the Hall, the Church Records and then those wonderful files telling of the soldiers' childhoods, their ages, their incredible bravery in a factual, but sensitive way: all of which is such a reflection of Fred himself. Brave, proud to serve his Queen and Country, and deeply loving. Fred and his right hand, Judith, came to the village of their name and left their stamp upon it for generations to come.

Wow! What a man!



## **Cherington Villagers Turn Apples into Juice!**



Harvest remains such an important time in our rural community and we wanted to find a way to come together as a village and celebrate harvest both great and small. Normally we would have a harvest 'bring and share' supper in the Village Hall following the church service, but of course this year such a gathering was not possible. The allotments and back gardens of Cherington have been a hive of activity this year with folks having more time on their hands and more determination to grow to their own. With that in mind we decided to combine our abundant apple crops to celebrate harvest, raise some funds for the village and church and have some fun shaking the trees – producing our very own

Cherington Apple Juice!

With a blue skies and crisp autumn sunshine forecast and a brief reminder after Saturday evening's Harvest Festival Service, fruit pickers of Cherington got busy in their orchards in the first weekend in in October: picking shaking and climbing to get their fruit. Boxes and bags of apples started to appear in the village hall mid-morning, and after a quick message on the village WhatsApp a team of 6 armed with blankets and long sticks appeared in my garden to help reach the hard-to –reach cookers. Teenagers were off up the tree to shake the branches whilst 4 of us gathered below catching the fruit as they fell into blankets.

Meanwhile Jill Forbes had designed and drawn a beautiful label for our juice. A quick sweepstake to guess how many



bottles we had made saw the highest bid at 160 but in fact we ended up producing over 400 bottles! With 15 different households contributing



400 bottles! With 15 different households contributing fruit we had a really wide variety of apples and some pears. Paul Cable offered to help take the apples to the press when it became clear one car was not going to be enough!

Monday morning we were off to Hungerford to the aptly named Cider Barn and My Apple Juice Limited, where Richard and Sally and their team were on hand to take delivery of our crop. It was straight in the scratter, washer and press for our harvest and they suggested I come back in 3 hours to collect the juice.

The bottles are pasteurised, so the juice keeps unopened for near on 3 years, and there are no added extras, just Cherington apples and pears. All the waste skins and pulp is used to feed the cattle on Hungerford Common, and it turned out Richard and Sally had been at the Cherington Flower Show last year so were happy to think of us selling our juice at the Show next summer.

Thanks to a motorised press and speedy operatives at the Cider Barn, the apple juice was bottled, labelled and ready for me to take back to Cherington the same day. A brief celebratory tasting was held in the village hall by a socially distant cluster of six when I returned from Hungerford with the cases of bottled juice. "Sweet with a good sharp kick at the end"; "honey overnotes with a hint



of lemon"; "very drinkable"; "perfect with gin": just some of the comments.

We remain hopeful that we will be able to sell some juice at the Cherington Flower Show in 2021 but in the meantime the rest is being sold within the village to raise funds for the upkeep of the village hall and church. It was a great chance to come together as a community, celebrate harvest – and make something very, very tasty to last us through the winter months.

All the children have settled into the playgroup routine really well and are building new

friendships, which is lovely to see. They have really adapted well to the different routine we now have at the playgroup.

During the past month the children have been learning about:

Height, length and size: We have measured ourselves and recorded how tall we are on the height chart. The children have put themselves in order from smallest to tallest and found items that are tall or short.



**Goldilocks and The Three Bears:** The children asked to read the story. We have talked about the characters and what they do in the story, as well as played the Goldilocks game on the laptop. The children have also helped to act out the story using small world characters and made bear collages.

**Shapes:** We have been cutting around and colouring shapes, as well as talking about how many sides and corners the shapes have. The children have been playing with the magnetic shapes and talking about the shapes they can see around them.



#### **New Arrivals**

Following on from last month's column, we have had a slight change of plan regarding the breeding of our Gloucester cattle herd. I explained that we were currently breeding using artificial insemination as a way to widen the gene pool. Since then we have accepted the fact that this method does not seem to be working on our cows and as a result we have purchased our first Gloucester bull! 'Hill View James' ('Jimmy'). As well as 'Jimmy' we have also bought a new breeding cow ('Fleur') and her five week old calf. They have all joined our existing herd and are settling in well. Have a look over the wall when you're next out walking to see if you can spot the new additions to the Gloucester herd.



#### Herbal Ley

Over the last couple of months we have been very lucky to have had perfect ground conditions to establish the first of our herbal ley. To do this, 30 acres of fields once in constant arable production have been ploughed, the soil harrowed down and the seed sown and after a final roll we now wait to see what will pop up before the cold, short winter days halt growth until the spring.

A ley is defined as the period of time a crop will be growing for; in this case the herbal ley is destined to last approximately 4 years after which its production will slowly start to diminish. There are ways to slow this down and increase its vigour, mainly by stitching in new seed each year to produce a range of ages within the sward.

A herbal ley typically consists of grasses, legumes and herbs. With this composition comes benefits to wildlife, livestock health and soil fertility.

Grasses provide carbohydrates in the cattle's diets, along with the clover that provides protein. Herbs in this mixture, such as ribgrass, chicory and burnet, also



increase daily live weight gains as they provide quantities of minerals. Other species such as Sainfoin and Chicory have a deep rooting system meaning that in dry periods, they should be drought resistant, therefore providing consistent grazing. Along with drought resistance, some of these herbs find important nutrients within the soil that they then make available for the livestock to graze. This means that the farm can become more self-sufficient and reduce the amount of bought-in concentrate (mineralrich) feed. On this note the legume family of plants, such as Clover, fixes nitrogen into the soil, which in turn helps to feed the other plant species growing alongside. This again reduces our need to buy-in artificial fertliser.

Another reason for us planting this type of crop to graze is the anthelmintic (worming) properties provided by sainfoin, birdsfoot trefoil and chicory, considerably reducing our reliance on artificial wormers.



Herbal leys also have the added benefit of

extending the grazing season when compared to a traditional grass pasture. This works well with our current practice of mob and strip grazing, meaning the crop can be fully utilised into the winter months.

The benefit for growing a herbal ley is best summed up by the 1950s author and farmer, R. Newman Turner, who was very forward thinking in his time. He described a herbal ley as "*my manure merchant, my food manufacturer and my vet all in one*".

With this recommendation, I think it's a good reason to give it a try!

## **Celebration and Commemoration**

So much has happened in our first half of autumn term, with trips, visits and celebrations all taking place in a safe way. The Kestrels and Hawks classes (yrs 1-4) had an amazing time at Copsegrove Farm in Bisley and enjoyed spending a day exploring and learning in a natural environment. Meanwhile, the Owls class ventured up to the park to meet with environmental expert Dr Phoebe Carter as part of the 'Orchard Project' and learning everything there is to know about soil as part of their forest school learning.

Continuing on an outdoor theme, Avening School has recently been selected to take part in the 'My school, My Planet' pilot project run by **Learning through Landscapes.** Funded through a Heritage Emergency Fund grant from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, the project aims to support schools during the Covid-19 crisis by re-engaging pupils with their school environment, supporting their wellbeing and encouraging a greater connection to their natural heritage through the delivery of an outdoor education programme.

The Kestrels (y1/2) have been getting creative recently with a demonstration on traditional dip dying techniques by local resident Elizabeth Oliver, who paid the KS1 children a visit as part of their term topic on local mills and 'In and around Avening'. Both the Kestrels and the Eagles (r/y1) have been on walks around Avening recently finding objects, buildings and landmarks that link with the history of the village.

The Owls (y5/6) recently took part in a K'Nex challenge led by Stemworks, which



enables them to build an appreciation of working and experimenting with science, technology, engineering and maths.

The School Council have held their first meeting and have been planning how to hold the usual calendar of school events and activities in a Covid-Safe way. This year's harvest festival will be held in classrooms using Zoom to bring the whole school together and Rev. Gerald will join us virtually for this seasonal celebration. The annual remembrance service will also take on a slightly different form this year with the school paying their respect in their class bubbles.

National Anti-Bullying Week is coming up this month and this year the whole school will be invited to wear odd socks to school for the day to celebrate being different. One of the things we pride ourselves on at Avening school is our loyal and dedicated staff. We are fortunate to have a wonderful wealth of experience on our staff and a real sense of community amongst the team. Over the past two months, we have had two anniversary celebrations. Our fabulous Mrs Sollis and wonderful Mrs Wilkinson have both been with the school for a remarkable twenty years. 
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

## **Nature's Survival**

That was such a beautiful, nostalgic poem that Gillan Bulmer-Davison wrote in October's Villager and what I'm writing are purely personal observations made through the last few months.

I do have to say that in spite of all the cars spinning along our country lanes at all times of the day and night, nature seems to be coping pretty well.

I've never seen so many wonderful butterflies in my garden - Red Admirals, Peacocks, Cotswold Blues, Skippers and many more – and quite often accompanied by the heavy drone of bumblebees, evoking very much the feeling of a summer's day, particularly with swifts screaming overhead and the sight of the swallows lined up on the wires. Skylarks, too, singing their little hearts out and well away from patrolling foxes. Looking at various heaps of feathers scattered around, I don't somehow think that the pigeons have been quite so lucky.

Sad not to have any hedgehogs but why should I complain when on a sunny day there are goldfinches swaying on thistle-heads, robins, blackbirds and thrushes singing away and a pair of wrens flitting in and out of the shrubbery – so tiny and so agile. Blink and you miss them.

The hedgerows have become larders for wildlife with huge crops of early blackberries and now enormous sloes all ready to be pricked, dropped into bottles of gin, put away in the cupboard to mature and, hopefully, not drunk for months. Masses, too, of really early holly berries awaiting the arrival of the fieldfares and waxwings that come in like plagues of locusts, strip the berries and disappear.

As the days shorten, the animals and birds - like the rest of us - settle into autumn and winter mode. But the owls will still hoot, the foxes and the badgers will go about their nightly patrols, the squirrels will be digging up the lawn burying their horse chestnuts and nature will do what nature always does, against considerable opposition a lot of the time. And I think in this strange and sometimes scary world we are living in, we have to thank nature for what it gives to us.

The loss of the show is disastrous because of the financial support it gives to the Church, Village Hall and Cricket Club, amounting to £2,000 annually. It also generates reserves for any 'unexpected' situations in the village. The VE day celebrations in May were also a loss - but life continues, and thankfully everyone has survived the pandemic. There is much to applaud in how everyone has supported each other, making sure that things are OK, doing shopping, collecting prescriptions and generally just being there. Thank you all.

Working from home seems to be the new standard, which has its good points, although getting away for the day is also nice, unless it means a massive commute.

Currently our Village Hall is closed. Wendy and Hilary have run the hall for many years, responsible for everything from cleaning and opening for hirers, to carrying out the administrative tasks. Many thanks to them both - they have done a sterling job that has made life easy for the rest of us. Hopefully, it will be closed only until January, for the work involved in fulfilling new pandemic regulations and protocols. This gives us an opportunity to look at what needs doing to bring the hall up to date. Thanks go to trustees Zac Curtis, Alison Sharpe and Kevin Macmahon for all the work they have done over the years in keeping the hall so well maintained.

Camilla Trotter kindly took over the role of Administrator after Wendy left, and she and Kate Gegg, representing the Parish Council, are now overseeing all the works that are needed. They have the support of Harriet l'Anson, who is helping us with all the legal issues. The three of them have joined Kevin Macmahon as trustees since Zac and Alison are sadly stepping down too, due to work and other commitments. I know the new trustees would welcome any input or opinion - so do please get in touch with them if you would like to be involved.

The aim is to make the hall truly fit for purpose, and this will mean initial works to provide warmth and a new door and ramp which would give better access to all users. In time there are further plans to improve the hall so that it can be more widely used and be more financially sustainable, but we will come back to you on that. Under the terms of the hall's Trust any changes need to go to the Village vote.

Normally we have a Parish Council AGM in May which gives us a chance to run through the goings on in the village over the past year, and so that issues can be discussed for the coming year, but obviously this has not happened this year. There have not been a lot of planning applications in the Parish this year, but we have welcomed some new residents who have realised very quickly what a great place Cherington is to live.

The one costly purchase we have made was the phone box which we bought from BT - for a pound! This is now the property of the village and we welcome any suggestions for its use. First, it will need a fresh coat of paint.


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
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
