Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



Warning: The following article contains subject matter that causes offence

I have been asked to highlight again the tsunami of dog waste blighting our public areas, especially the churchyard and playing field. It's hard to imagine why anyone would allow their pets (there are definitely multiple offenders) to be in a churchyard in the first place, but then ignoring the resultant residue is beyond belief! The PC has provided many bins in key locations throughout the village, including one in the churchyard, and 3 in and around the playing field, so there is really no excuse. This is not just a local issue - I read today that a city in Spain was working with the local university to build a DNA database of defecating dogs – maybe a bit extreme, and not very practical here, but we do need to take collective action to tackle the issue. I hate the culture of fines by council jobsworths for every little misdemeanour, but I think a little public shaming might encourage the right behaviour. In the first instance, when we see it happening (if comfortable doing so), we should politely highlight the deposit to the offending owner (even the most diligent of us can sometimes miss a squat & drop!). If not, consider mentioning it to the CDC dog warden, parish clerk, or any of your councillors (details on the website). A photo of Fido would help immensely. Ultimately though, a fine may be the only answer.

In our recent quest to co-opt two new councillors, I thought again about the type of people who might apply for the role – would they be 'management types', or perhaps retired and ready to 'give something back' - and what shapes their desire to join us? Coincidentally, I had a need to look at my family tree that I hadn't reviewed for a while. In scanning through the names on my mother's side, I noticed a certain William Fowles (who is commemorated in the memorial fountain at the cross) was my third great-grandfather. Many members of my family have been good organisers in various fields, and some have had quite senior voluntary roles. Perhaps altruism has nothing to do with location or situation, but more to do with genes??

Update on the Memorial Hall improvements – the WiFi has been connected; the projector and sound system installed; the floor will be repaired before the start of term; but most importantly, the sound attenuation/insulation panels are in place. We'll monitor their success to see if they are adequate, and add more if necessary. This will mean a much better learning environment for the school, and better experience for all users – we would love to hear what you think.

So we can commit our lives into God's hands, year by year, day by day, moment by moment. I like to use this prayer in the morning – you may find it helpful.

Eternal God, our beginning and our end, accompany us in this day's journey.

Dawn on our darkness, open our eyes to praise you for your creation and to see the work you set before us today.

Take us and use us to bring to others the new life you give in Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Cherington Show 2015: The Wet Year



... it rained and just kept on raining, from 8 am 'till 5 pm ... we thought it would stop ... they said it would ... but no, this was what we were going to get. This was the tester (we never contemplated cancelling) - getting wet and becoming increasingly soaked. How would we manage? Would people come? 'We came to support you,' they said! And they did – about one third of the usual number sporting umbrellas and wet weather gear, encouraging reluctant wet dogs.

The sun had been out for the 'Eve of the Fete' party at Westrip Barns, hosted so generously by Roger Maggs: before the chill set in we feasted and brain-jogged our way through the quiz - setting off home we couldn't believe the weather would not be on our side.

Kate Gegg and the Village Hall team completely re-arranged the Handicrafts several times in order first to give shelter to the William & Colin Special stand, cushions piled decoratively around, then to Designer Clothes. Luckily, however, between the Bate-Williams' TopupTents sheltering the Band on the Green and the Tea Tent on Coxes' lawn, Henry's Barn for the Art Show, Kitty's great barn for Horticulture and the church for the Flower Arrangement competition there was usually somewhere to take down the brolly and dry off.

The Rev. Poppy drew the Raffle and at 5 pm, as Autumn Phillips and her daughter Savannah, presented the cups, the sun obliged for Henry's photographs. Beryl Milsom won the Handicrafts, Anya Pockett won the Childrens' Cup, Christine Williams won the Best Flower Arrangement Cup and Johnny Nettleton won both the Horticulture Cup and the Mabberley Cup for Best Horticultural Exhibit. Watery sunshine rounded off the day with prayers and hymn conducted by the Rev. Poppy on Coxes Lawn. Thank goodness for Gazebos! Wet conditions made more difficult the task of Roger Gegg's Set Up and Take Down team (the Cricket Club). Disappointingly on this day ice creams were not a prime concern, nor the barbecue, nor freshly made elderflower but Danielle's Teas were popular: cakes sold out as usual, even if the books did get soggy... and how do you keep a dog's coat dry?... despite these adverse situations, all stalls contributed a most respectable result.

We turned over in excess of $\pm 6,000$, with an anticipated net profit of c. $\pm 3,200 -$ about half our usual result – a highly acceptable achievement considering the weather and greater than we could have imagined.

The time and effort contributed by so few of us in Cherington, from March onwards - the administration, keeping account, the Childrens' Workshop perpetuating our Handicrafts, the creativity, knitting and sewing, the baking, the growing, sowing and planting, gathering the prizes, tidying the Village, we are proud to have not disappointed ourselves or our supporters this year and so many thanks to all who participated in raising funds for our worthwhile causes, the Church, the Village Hall and the Cricket Club.

Down to Earth



If you didn't go anywhere exotic in the holidays, you could take a trip to one of my favourite places in Gloucestershire, 'India in the Cotswolds', Sezincote House, open Thursdays and Fridays. John Betjeman used to visit when he a student in Oxford was and describes the approach in Summoned by Bells:

"Down the drive, Under the early yellow leaves of oaks; The bridge, the waterfall, the Temple Pool -And there they burst on us, the onion domes, Chajjars and chattris made of amber stone: 'Home of the Oaks,' exotic Sezincote!"

The house was designed around 1800 for Sir Charles Cotterell, on his retirement from service in India with the East India Company, by his brother, Samuel Pepys Cotterell. It takes its inspiration from Mogul architecture of Rajasthan, as drawn by Thomas Daniell and nephew, William, whose works may be seen inside the house. Humphrey Repton designed the gardens which include a Thornery around a stream flowing from the Temple of the Goddess Surya, a pair of Brahmin bulls atop the bridge and a hissing, three-headed cobra coiled around a trunk in a pond. (All statues, of course, but designed to keep memories of India alive). When Lord and Lady Cyril Kleinwort took over the property after the Second World War, their programme of restoration and enhancement included a garden on the east side in the form of the traditional Persian *chahar bagh*, the four rivers of life dividing a garden into quarters and meeting at a central point.

Back in the Avening gardens, it is the blues that are attracting the butterflies and bees: echinops, eryngium, caryopteris and the purple buddleia. The echinops, or globe thistle, takes its name from the Greek word for hedgehog, *echinos*, according to Johnson and Smith, in 'Plant Names Simplified', (a gem of a little book, still being reprinted after more than 80 years). The echinops flower is a marvel of structural design. I always try to have one or two interesting flowers from the garden in a vase on the kitchen table. I would get no prizes for floral design but I observe and appreciate.

If ever I were to take up cudgels and protest once again, it would be in favour of local garden flowers as bouquets, not the coarse, crass, crude, gaudy bouquets

that greet one in a supermarket entrance or filling station shop. These are an abomination, an environmental disaster – grown with pesticides, refrigerated for freshness, sprayed with fungicides and air -freighted in, often from Kenya or South America. To quote from an article in The 2006: Guardian in 'One studv of greenhouses in Mexico growing flowers for the global market found 36 chemicals samples from the hothouse, air in including, horrifyingly, DDT '. Roses grown

in Kenya use precious water for irrigation, depriving locals and wildlife. In the nineteenth century Britain had a thriving industry in growing flowers. Could we not make it more fashionable to offer home-grown or locally-grown posies and bouquets once again?

From earliest childhood I remember my mother's books of Constance Spry on flower-arranging - cookery, too. The name evokes the mimsiness of the dull,

'buttoned up' fifties. But, not so. Constance Spry was remarkable in advocating the use of the ordinary – wild flowers, 'weeds' even - to create extraordinary arrangements. James Fenton wrote: 'The starting point of her philosophy was that wild flowers and weeds could be pressed into service just as much as tuberoses. One could indeed spend a fortune. One could also spend next to nothing. This was the source of her popular appeal.' Time for a come-back, then! (Also: spend 'next to nothing' and save the planet!)



All the leaves should be stripped off outside tomato plants by now, and most off the indoor ones. It prevents blight taking a hold and encourages ripening. As for 'putting the garden to bed' as some people call it, don't be overtidy; leave some seed-heads and fruits for the birds and some scruffy undergrowth for the hedgehogs. The rule should be: chaos contained.

As we all celebrate VE Day, never let us forget that the older generation have some wonderful memories to share, such a rich vein of history to tap into - what a sacrilege if these memories were never shared, and consequently lost.





A BIG THANK YOU FROM THE FRIENDS OF TETBURY HOSPITAL!

The Friends of Tetbury Hospital's recent annual door-to-door collection has so far raised a total of just over £9,000. As just over half of the money collected will benefit from Gift Aid, the taxman will also contribute over £1,000.

Last year the Friends bought two pieces of optical equipment enabling many more patients to receive treatment in Tetbury in the new One Stop Eye Clinic.

This year, with the money raised, the Friends will purchase:

- A replacement 'stack' for the theatre, containing a range of clinical gadgets used to perform keyhole surgery; in particular, a camera and screen to enable the surgeon to have a clear image of what is going on inside the patient during surgery
- A phototherapy booth to treat patients with a variety of skin conditions.
 These patients often need regular treatments so this new local service will avoid having to travel to other hospitals

Tetbury Hospital Trust is a charity established in 1991 which receives payment from the NHS for patient treatments though not for new or replacement equipment. The Hospital's survival depends on local fund-raising and the generosity of local people. In addition, local people donate money through their wills and over recent years income from legacies has grown.

Since the recent NHS re-organisation, the Hospital serves both Gloucestershire and Wiltshire with more than 20 consultants from both counties holding regular clinics there.
