As a keen (but novice) gardener, April is one of my favourite months. The seedlings I planted in March can make their way to the greenhouse to begin hardening off, the trees are blossoming, and garden centres are full of tempting displays that seriously threaten my bank balance. It's a month filled with hope and anticipation of the glorious displays of colour that are just around the corner.

April is a month filled with hope and anticipation for other reasons, too. Ramadan has ended and Shawwal begun, our Jewish friends and neighbours will be celebrating Passover from the 12th - 20th, and Easter Day falls on the 20th April, bringing the joyful celebration of Jesus' resurrection. After more than 40 days of Lent (which feels even longer to those who've given up something for the season) there will be plenty of anticipation ahead of the big day. Both the colourful spring blooms and joyful cries of "Halleluiah! Christ is risen!" bring so much hope to a world emerging from the dark days of winter. Last month, I encouraged us to seek out joy – now, with Easter (almost) here and signs of spring all around us, we don't have to look hard to find it.

Joy comes in many forms. It might be a long-awaited event – a birth, holiday, retirement, or cup of tea and cake at the end of a long walk – or it might be little, unexpected moments, like bumping into an old friend or spotting an animal in the wild. The joy of Easter is both. Jesus' resurrection was long-awaited by people such as the faithful Simeon and Anna (see my February reflection) and unexpected, despite Jesus telling his disciples explicitly: 'The Son of Man is to be betrayed into human hands, and they will kill him, and three days after being killed, he will rise again.' (Matthew 9.31) It's incredible to think that this event is still bringing joy now, 2000 years later, as we celebrate the new life that it offers us.

Whether you're celebrating the end of Ramadan, the festivals of Passover or Easter, or simply the joy of spring, may this season of new life bring you unexpected moments of joy.

Letter from Chairman of Avening Parish Council



The sun has started to show its face in the last few days giving us some hope of better weather and warmer days to come.

For those villagers living in Old Hill or Rectory Lane, life has been disrupted by the Gas board digging holes in the roads for the renewal of the gas mains. While it is necessary work, it did result in disruption to waste collections. This is likely to continue for a week or so yet; but I have been liaising with the Cotswold District Council to reorganise their collection methods and residents have co-operated by grouping all the bins and bags in a central spot to make the collections as easy as possible for the collection lorries. I will continue to liaise with Ubico for the duration of the road closures with the aim of keeping the collections on the usual due dates.

Otherwise, all is relatively quiet in Avening at present; and as a result, there is minimal activity or news to report.

Playing Field – As I have mentioned in previous reports, the Parish Council has been looking at various actions to overcome the problem of dog poo being left uncollected by irresponsible dog owners. We have agreed on a plan of action which will include installation of cameras to identify the offenders. So please be aware, as offenders will be liable for significant fines.

So as to ensure that everyone will have the opportunity to abide by the rules and clean up after their pets; we will be supplying two containers which will hold new poo bags for anyone who forgets to bring their own. The containers will be sited adjacent to the two existing poo bins, and should be in situ before the end of March. Dog fouling of the playing field has been a problem for so many years - so please encourage everyone to be vigilant when their dogs are running and playing in the field. Let's make a real effort to keep our village clean and tidy, and the playing field in a hygienic condition for our children to enjoy.

Telephone Box – The Parish Council has agreed the allocation of funds to repair the telephone box. It is a listed 'building' and as such we have a legal responsibility to restore it as close as possible to its original condition. The work, which will take several days, will involve stripping off the old paint, repainting and fitting a new door. When completed we can then decide on its use (library etc).

Memorial Hall – Plans are being put in place to reroof the hall during the School summer holidays, and I will be able to give more details nearer that time.

Face Masks – Still available, free, from the Tuesday Café or by arrangement with any of the Parish Councillors.

Knead Bakery – Still visiting us on a regular basis, Last Saturday of each month, from 9.45 until 10.30am Outside of the Memorial Hall.

District Councillor's Report



Gloucestershire County Council (GCC): Whatever your views on our national government, it's important to understand what you are voting for in the May elections. You can obviously use your vote however you see fit, but the real purpose of the election is to vote for a councillor to represent you and the community at GCC. It's important to understand that GCC forms the biggest chunk of your council tax, and covers things such as roads, health and social care, and education. Do look at the manifestos of individual candidates and vote with your head, as protest votes can easily impact the costs and quality of the services you receive.

Litter: Another one to cast your mind back: a discarded McDonalds package was found in a local verge and the details passed on to our CDC fly tipping officer to trace the perpetrator. I can now confirm that a fine was issued and has been paid! Interestingly, a second package was found recently and that too has resulted in a substantial fine. The message is simple – just take your rubbish home and dispose of it properly.

Dog mess: this is a somewhat more difficult nut to crack and relies on witnesses coming forward to report incidents. Do let me know if you see anything, especially if you have photographic evidence, and I will be happy to progress the matter with CDC.

Roads: Having highlighted the issue to our County Councillor Stephan Fifield, I am pleased to confirm that he has worked with Highways and the passing places along Chavenage Lane will be properly reconstituted in May. I am hoping that the rutted verge areas along the well used lane will also be repaired.

Amongst other things I'm permanently checking that my bird bath has got enough water in it to accommodate all the washing and preening of feathers going on in the bird world. The other morning I watched a male blackbird having a really good, long, splashy bath before retiring underneath a nearby bush to preen his feathers, dry off and disappear. And, surprise, surprise, he was swiftly followed by a female blackbird following the same routine and also disappearing. So who knows - maybe they had a secret, pre-arranged assignation somewhere in the garden

There are also two very macho-looking male pheasants who strutt around the lawn keeping a respectful distance from each other but no doubt hoping that the female, who does appear from time to time, will turn up, but she's rather elusive and tends to appear when they've disappeared. Obviously she just doesn't fancy either of them.

After all the cold, grey, rainy days we've had, this burst of Spring sunshine has certainly transformed not only activity in the bird world but it's brought out quite a number of large bumble bees and, the other day, a yellow brimstone butterfly which landed on one of the shrubs and decided to do a bit of sun-bathing. A really welcome sight and it seemed to confirm that the whole garden had come back into vibrant life, helped by the wonderful colour-contrasts of the purple and yellow crocuses, golden daffodils, primroses and primulas and purple grape hyacinths.

But the star of the show is, without doubt, my amazing shocking-pink camellia bush that, all through the really cold weather, the rain and the frosts, has gone on producing buds which, in the last week or so have burst into these bright, colourful flowers and will now go on flowering for weeks to come.

So, forget the grey, rainy days we've had. We're now into the colourful, sunny days of Spring.

Listen to the birdsong, watch the arrival of lots of butterflies and bees. Take in all the colours and be happy that we're lucky to live surrounded by such beautiful and everchanging, natural countryside.



I've recently found myself living alone after a relationship breakdown. My council tax bill is due soon, and I'm worried I won't be able to afford to pay it on my own. I'm already struggling to cover the cost of my other bills. What can I do?



You're not alone in worrying about struggling to pay your bills. It's a difficult time for people who are battling rising costs for food and essentials, as well as seeing bills creep up.

Fortunately, there are options available to people struggling to pay their council tax, but you'll need to find out if you're eligible first. You might be entitled to pay less, or not at all, depending on your circumstances, because councils offer discounts and other reductions.

Firstly, because you're the only adult living in your home, your council tax bill can be reduced by a quarter. For example, if your bill is £1,000 for the year, you'll only have to pay £750 now that you live on your own. You'll need to tell your council someone has moved out of your home and the date that they left. You're entitled to the discount from when they moved out - even if it was a while ago.

When the council works out how many people live in a property, there are certain people that don't count - they're called 'disregarded people'. This includes under-18s, full-time students, long-term hospital patients, people with severe mental impairments, and many more. You can check our website (**www.citizensadvice.org.uk**) for more information on disregarded people. In some situations, everyone living in a home is disregarded. If this is the case, the council tax bill will be reduced by half. If everyone in a home is a student or severely mentally impaired, there'll be no council tax to pay.

If you live with an adult who isn't disregarded, but who is on a low income or receives certain benefits, you might be able to get a discount called a 'second adult rebate'. You can find out more about getting a second adult rebate on our website.

If you or someone you live with is disabled, this can also affect your council tax banding. If your home has been adapted, you can ask to be placed down one band. For example, if you're living in a band C property that has been adapted for a disabled resident, you should only be charged council tax for a band B property.

There's also something called Council Tax Reduction, which is designed for people on low incomes. Your council will ask for details about your income and circumstances, to check if you're eligible. If you are, they'll reduce the amount of council tax you have to pay. When it comes to Council Tax Reductions, different rules apply depending on whether you've reached State Pension age.

And lastly, if you're struggling to pay for essentials, your council can reduce your bill further, or cancel it altogether, under what's known as a 'discretionary reduction'. This usually only happens if you can provide evidence that you're suffering severe hardship and can't afford to pay council tax. If you're in this situation, ask your council for help.

If you're not given a discretionary reduction, you might be able to appeal to a valuation tribunal. If the tribunal agrees with you, they can order your council to reduce or even cancel your council tax bill.

Whatever circumstances you're in, if you're struggling with your council tax payments, it's important to let your council know. Citizens Advice is also here to help you find a way forward, should you need our support.


