Dear friends,



The responsibilities are: -

Footpaths – Gill Parsons. Cllr Parsons said she may need help from other Parish Cllrs. It was agreed that Cllr Parsons will ask for volunteers when required.

Should you have any matters that need the attention of any of the Councillors, their e-mail and contact numbers are readily available on the village website.

Playing Field: It was unanimously agreed to install CCTV cameras to cover the Playing Field and the Orchard. It will enable monitoring of some of the local wildlife on an ongoing basis and give some reassurance that we are doing our bit for wildlife conservation. The cameras will be discreetly placed so as not to be obvious and will be a 24hour operation. So please be aware that if you are in the Playing field you are likely to be filmed. CCTV notices will be posted around the area as a reminder to the presence of cameras. They will also have the added benefit of perhaps making the area a safer zone, as and when the days get shorter and the evenings longer.

Bus Shelter (Adjacent to Old Hill junction): You may have noticed that this shelter has suffered a terminal blow from an unknown vehicle and therefore we will be replacing it with a new shelter subject to getting reasonable quotations for the cost.

Parking on Pavements: We have received several complaints from residents about vehicles being parked partly or entirely on pavements. There are increasing numbers of cars in our lives, and parking, particularly in historic village streets is a real problem. If there is no alternative way of parking available, please make sure that there is sufficient room on the

pavement for a wheelchair or pram to pass by safely.

General: On a broader front, and taking into consideration the pending change in unitary authorities which are planned for later this year and early 2026, Avening Parish Council will make efforts to liaise with and work in unison with our surrounding Parish Councils. The aim will be to make our voices and opinions heard by Government and the current County Councils.

Memorial Hall: The re-roofing is scheduled to start on 21st July and hopefully completed before the end of the School Summer Holidays.

Reminders: -

Face Masks: Still available, free, from the Tuesday Café or by arrangement with any of the Parish Councillors.

Knead Bakery: Still visiting us on a regular basis, Last Saturday of each month, from 9.45 until 10.30am Outside of the Memorial Hall.

Wild about Avening - Wildlife Sightings Wanted

Wild about Avening are running a Biodiversity Blitz on the weekend of the 4th-6th July

From the 4th to 6th July we are asking you to record the wildlife you see in your gardens, around the village or across the wider parish. These records will be collected and submitted to the Gloucestershire Environmental Records Centre (GERC) and will then form part of Avening Parish Council's biodiversity audit.

The more we know about which animals and plants live in the parish, the better we can take steps to look after them and the natural environment. A healthy and resilient environment provides economic, environmental, health and community benefits.

Over that weekend please record all the wildlife you see, noting:

- 1. WHO name of person recording
- 2. WHAT species and number of them seen
- 3. WHERE where did you see it (grid ref preferably/What3Words/Address)
- 4. WHEN date

Please get involved. There are lots of Apps out there to help you identify species by sight or sound.

District Councillor's Report



Cotswold District Council (CDC) has a new leader: As expected Councillor Mike Evemy has been elected as the new leader of the Liberal Democrat Group on the council and formally took over as council leader at the Annual Council Meeting on Wednesday, May 21. He succeeds Councillor Joe Harris, who stepped down after six years in the role. Cllr Evemy represents the Siddington & Cerney Rural ward and has served as deputy leader and cabinet member for finance since 2019.

How the move to a Unitary Authority will affect Town & Parish Councils: I attended a Town & Parish Council Summit at the Royal Agricultural University on 4th June. The need for effective Parish Councils will become even more crucial as the proposed reorganisation means that CDC could be dissolved as soon as 2026, and residents will no longer be represented by a District Councillor to champion their needs. It is likely that the equivalent of two county councillors will provide this service instead. Gloucestershire is one of only 21 areas in the country still with 3-tiers of local government (County/District/Parish) and the government plan is that both CDC & GCC will be scrapped in favour of one or possibly two unitary authorities. Following this first step, full devolution may follow and entails the transfer of powers and funding from Central Government to Strategic Authorities of around 1.5 million people.

The Unitary plan is still being worked through with the government, but Gloucestershire has been invited to proceed in November 2025. These options were submitted for review: a single Unitary – including the whole county; two Unitaries – one including Cheltenham/Tewkesbury/Cotswold and the other the Forest of Dean/Stroud; Two Unitaries - Enlarged Gloucester city area, and the rest of the County. The final submission will be made this November, with the transition (including more elections for a 'shadow' council) commencing from May 2026.

The unitary authority will unlikely be able to afford to cover everything district and parish councils do now, with their focus being on adult care, children, planning, highways and other county wide services, so parishes will need to take ownership of local services and charge accordingly. Although the theory of a unitary authority will realise savings (fewer councillors, CEOs etc), the reality from previous transitions is that local taxes will probably go up. There will be a lot of work (and costs!) to explore how the new setup will work, as no one has all the answers!

A417 missing link: Members of the project team visited the A3 Hindhead Tunnel at Devil's Punchbowl, Surrey this month by invitation of the National Trust, to understand what lessons could be learned about building a repurposed road, like that planned on the A417 scheme. This is especially important for the Missing Link project. We know that poor planning of disused old roads can lead to antisocial behaviour, failure to take up missing opportunities of repurposing and expensive servicing by both Gloucestershire County Council, Cotswold District Council, the Police and other bodies.

The Missing Links scheme has shared an exciting update about the innovative UK-first

trial it has been running to explore how vegetation removed from the site can be reused to make significant carbon savings. Biochar – a charcoal-like material produced by burning organic matter at extremely high temperatures – was produced from vegetation removed by the scheme, turning it back into a product that can be reused to fertilise new plants and catch microplastics. The study produced five tonnes of biochar on site, which is a saving of 13 tonnes of CO2 – the equivalent of roughly five flights from London to Perth.

Adders were translocated to new sites as part of the Missing Link scheme. High numbers have been seen to be in good health and have expanded across their new receptor sites well.

Matilda, Duchess of Normandy's Diary

17 OCTOBER 1066

Sixty metres! That's the length of the tapestry the town of Bayeux are designing to illustrate the Battle of Hastings! How on earth they are going to house it is beyond me. And if I know my William, the story it portrays might well be economical with the truth.

Certainly the first reports of the battle were very positive: our troops were fresh, and far better armed, with cavalry and archers against men with pikes. King Harold was killed – he got an arrow in the eye – and his men were routed. But some of the reports I'm hearing suggest that it wasn't as simple as that: Harold had taken the high ground, and formed his troops in a defensive posture, rather like a Roman phalanx. This meant that our archers were ineffective, arrows bouncing off the men's shields, and neither the infantry nor the cavalry could get amongst them. Worse, when fighting broke out a rumour went round that William had been killed, causing a retreat, and he had to charge around with his helmet off, showing his men that he was alive and urging them on.

Apparently it was a 'feigned flight' that won the day, as the English troops imagined that William's men were beaten and retreating and charged after them. This exposed them to the cavalry, waiting on the flanks, who set about them and caused a rout. Well, if it were true, it was a clever tactic of William.

Now William assumed that once Harold was killed he was automatically King, but in England it's not as simple as that. He has to go to London to be officially crowned. I have to be crowned as Queen too, but I shan't be going there with the family for at least a year or so as I don't want to disrupt the boys' education, particularly Robert, as he is likely to follow his father as King one day. I'm not sure I want to subject them all to the English diet either, especially the girls, as it can easily lead to obesity.

I do wonder what drives William to conquer lands and extend his territory, given all the death and destruction he creates. Surely it can't just be that he was teased and bullied as a boy. Perhaps some men are just born like that.



Avening Playgroup

In last month's issue I wrote that our AGM would be held on June 17th. This has now changed and will be early July, date to be confirmed. Don't forget – everyone is welcome!



We must say a very big thank you to Joe, our committee chair's partner for raising £610 for the playgroup by completing the "Dorset Gravel Dash" during the May half term break. This is a two day event where competitors had to endure 100 miles of offroad cycling, which included around 2000 meters of uphill climbs and had to sleep out in the open. The money raised is going on outdoor equipment and resources. Our treasurer, who will unfortunately be leaving the committee this year, has also been busy applying for grants. With this money and the money that Joe raised we have been able to purchase new picnic tables, trampolines, a forest water run, balance

beams and some smaller resources, such as chalk pens and white board pens, for the children to practice writing their names. So, once again, a very big thank you.

We have been busy over the last few weeks, looking at the following topics:

Minibeasts: making playdough minibeasts, going on a minibeast hunt in the playground, painting ladybirds, finding all the minibeasts on the tuff tray, threading spider webs, colouring and painting minibeasts as well as finding the right habitats for each one.

Healthy Living: Lots of discussions about being healthy, eating fruit, doing exercises, keeping clean and looking after our teeth. We made fresh juice out of oranges and apples, which everyone tasted and liked. The children made teeth out of playdough and put them into a mouth. We did our physi-gym exercises.

Avening WI

A group of six members, one Labrador and a Labrador puppy, set off on a lovely sunny morning for a Wildflower Walk in the beautiful Avening countryside. We walked up Woodstock Lane, diagonally across the field to climb up beside Brandhouse Farm, following the footpath around the wood past Cold Harbour and Westfield barns, to arrive at the perfect picnic spot looking down over Westend and Avening. The undisturbed deep banks along the old trackways have a lovely variety of wildflowers; we recorded over 30 species



(not counting the very common ones). While we walked we remembered childhood family walks and regional names for wild flowers including Batchelor's button (Cornflower), Pudding bags (Bladder campion), Keck (Cow Parsley), Queen Anne's Lace (Wild carrot) Bird's eye (Germander speedwell) and Dog daisy (Ox-eye daisy). Lesser known flowers spotted were Wild Basil, Hedgerow Cranesbill, Greater Celandine and Rockrose.



The book group met in Amberley Cafe7 to discuss 'The Wind Knows my Name' by Isabel Allende. The story intertwines past and present as the lives of the two main characters Samuel, a Kindertransport child, and Anita an Asylum seeker from El Salvador, parted from her mother at the American border, become connected. Half of the group members had not managed to finish the book for various reasons. Those who had read it, while not finding it an easy read regarding the theme of childhood trauma, found it interesting and highly relevant in the modern world.

By the time you read this the group walking the Cotswold Way should have completed their journey by walking the last leg into Bath. Some non-walking members plan to welcome them at Bath Abbey to celebrate their achievement. No champagne but a welcome cup of tea and cake!

Churchyard FAQs

Our churchyards are cherished and sacred places — a space of peace, prayer, and reflection. Thanks to the dedication of our volunteers, they are lovingly maintained to honour those who rest there and to ensure they remain a safe and beautiful environment for everyone.

Help us care for our sacred churchyards

As a consecrated space, churchyards are governed by regulations set by the Consistory Court. These rules apply to all, including clergy, families, and funeral providers, and cover burials, the interment of ashes, and memorials. Full regulations can be found in each church or by scanning the QR code below.

Below, you will find some answers to some of the common questions and queries about churchyards. Please contact Revd. Natalie Jennings at associate@minchchurch.org.uk or 01453 798852 for further information.



I want to install a headstone or memorial tablet. What do I do?

Please speak to a stonemason as a first port of call. There are specific regulations that govern the size, material, and wording of all memorial stones including headstones and cremated remains tablets, which local stonemasons will be familiar with. The parish priest <u>must</u> approve all applications before installation, and only memorials which adhere to the regulations will be approved.

Can I scatter my loved one's ashes?

We seek to inter ashes into the garden of remembrance or existing graves wherever possible, but it is not possible to scatter ashes in the churchyard. The parish priest <u>must</u> be consulted about all burials in the churchyard, so please make contact before planning any kind of interment.



What items can I place on a grave?

We welcome you to honour loved ones by placing fresh flowers on graves. Please remove any plastic wrapping and take away faded or dead flowers. Vases are not permitted, except for those built into approved headstones. Artificial flowers are not permitted, except for Remembrance poppies or traditional Christmas wreaths, which should be removed after two months.

What items are not permitted on graves?

- Grave surrounds (e.g. edging or fencing)
- Stone chippings or other ground coverings
- Ornaments (except a single toy or tribute on a child's grave to be removed after six months)
- Trees or shrubs
- Vases
- Artificial flowers (except for Remembrance poppies or traditional Christmas wreaths, which should be removed after two months)
- · Lights or lanterns

Do I own my family member's grave?

The land in a churchyard, including graves, is owned by the incumbent (parish priest) of the church. The family of the deceased owns memorial stones (including headstones and cremated remains tablets) and are responsible for their upkeep.

Items that don't meet these guidelines, including memorial stones, may be carefully removed and stored for collection. Unclaimed items will be respectfully disposed of after one year.

I got a text asking me to click on a link to reschedule a parcel delivery I'd missed. I was waiting for a parcel from Royal Mail at the time, so I clicked on the link and was asked to make a payment. Luckily, my daughter told me it was a scam and to ignore it, but I almost gave away my personal details. How can I spot the signs of this type of scam myself?



Parcel delivery scams are increasingly common. These scams can be in the form of a text, or an email or phone call. There are also reports of fake 'Something for You' cards, which Royal Mail leave when a delivery is attempted, but no-one is home.

Here are some tips on how to stay vigilant and spot scams:

- If you're waiting for a parcel and get a message that asks you to pay to get it, or reschedule the delivery, it's usually a scam.
- Don't click any links or attachments in the text or email. Delivery companies won't ask you to pay them through a link in an email or text.
- Parcel delivery scammers often pretend to be from an organisation like Royal Mail and can try to make you click on a fake version of the company's genuine website, which asks for personal information or login details these can appear real.
- To check if a link is genuine, hover your mouse over the link without clicking on it, or press and hold on the link on a mobile device. You should be able to see the address the link goes to and check it's the same as the company's official website address.
- Make sure you check the address carefully fake link addresses can look similar to the genuine address.
- Other signs of a message that is a scam include bad spelling and grammar, and when
 it starts with a general greeting instead of your name. But scam messages can
 sometimes be sophisticated so don't rely on obvious mistakes only.
- If you get an email, check if the email address matches the sender's name or organisation you might have to click on their name to see the email address.
- If there's something you're unsure about, don't feel pressured to act. You can find the official details for the company the person who has contacted you says they're from and ask the company if they've contacted you.

Falling victim to a scam can make people feel anxious or embarrassed, but remember scammers are clever and scams can happen to anyone. Reporting them helps stop scammers and prevents other people from ending up in the same situation.

The Village Notice Board

The village notice board, on the side of the Memorial Hall, is a good way of publicising village events and items of local information. Posters, ideally size A4 or A5, can be put up for you on this board. They can be delivered to John and Sandra Hetterley, 2, Orchard Field or given to them directly. They will be taken down once they are out of date. Other posters may be removed and recycled once they are faded or to make space for others.

Hedge Cutting: Where hedges are obstructing public pathways, please cut them back. Overgrown hedges can be very dangerous causing pedestrians to walk into the road.


