AVENING COMMUNITY HEARTBEAT DEFIBRILLATOR

(in the village phone box outside the Old Bakery

DANGER	Ensure you and the casualty are safe. If not <u>Call 999</u>
RESPONSE	Speak to the Casualty in both ears, Tap the collar bones. Do not shake the person !
SHOUT	Shout for Help If the Casualty does not respond <u>do not</u> leave them at this stage. <u>Call 999</u> now. Ambulance control will advise if the defibrillator is needed.
AIRWAY	Ensure airway is open and clear. Open the airway by lifting the chin and tilting the head back
BREATHING	Listen & look for breathing sounds and movement. If the casualty is not breathing or you have any doubt <u>Call 999</u>
<u>CPR</u>	Place your hands in centre of the Casualty's chest and press down hard. Just do compressions. If confident give breaths as well. 2 breaths every 30 compressions.
DEFIBRILLATION	Do not leave the casualty alone. Continue with CPR and wait for help and the ambulance. If someone is available ambulance control will give you the access code to the defibrillator. Turn on the defibrillator which will give you clear instructions to follow

The defibrillator will not shock the casualty unless required

Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



The Queen's Jubilee – what a fabulous array of celebrations around the country. At the time my last month's article was going to press we didn't have any volunteers or the prospect of having a community celebration. Then, at the 'last minute', Click Mitchel and Rev Celia Carter came to our rescue and organised not only a venue, live music and a few food options including a Jubilee pudding, but also a memorable and sizeable beacon. Our thanks go to them both for stepping into breach and providing the forum for a quintessentially English village gathering in which to enjoy everyone's company and hopefully make new acquaintances.

The Memorial Hall – just a reminder in case anyone is not aware of the change – the new Trustees of the Hall are the Parish Councillors together with Bob Scurfield who is Chairman of the Trustees. I'm delighted to announce that we have arranged for the interior of the hall to be redecorated as soon as possible after the school breaks-up for their summer recess. There will also be some outside work on the North side, where a French drain will be formed in an effort to reduce the rising damp in that particular wall. At long last I have received quotes for external work needed on the roofs, these will be put before the Trustees for discussion and action in due course.

The Parish Council is anxious that the village should play some part in helping those villagers who are suffering financially because of the current rash of price increases for food. With this in mind we are exploring the possibility and logistics involved in opening an Avening Village Fridge. This has been done seemingly successfully in Tetbury and we are consulting with them to gain any advice from their experiences. So, if there is anyone who would like to be involved in this venture please let me know. We will welcome helpers on the ground as well as donations and financial support to bring this to fruition. (Anyone getting rid of a good Fridge or Freezer? – we might have a home for it)

Playing Field – It's getting better and better – we have just installed new goal posts to replace the ancient and rusty ones that have been there for years and years. There are no nets - so no hazard to animals or small adventurous two legged mountaineers.

This month it is the turn of Cllr Gill Parsons to introduce herself to the village – although being one of the longest serving councillors, Gill needs little introduction. She is a valued source of local history and village geography. Over to you, Gill!

My family have farmed in Avening (since Noah was a boy or so it seems) ploughing the fields with horses, delivering milk in churns by horse and cart, certainly a different type of horse power today, brought up to speed by technology. My main passion is my livestock which consists of Dorset Horn Sheep and Purebred Aberdeen Angus Cattle.



Why did I join the Parish Council over 20 years ago? This has

caused me to reminisce – this was not a political agenda, but a deep interest in people and our village, which seems to be changing by the minute and still is evolving. Along the way, with fellow Councillors, I have helped with updating the Village Plan. We entered for the Bledisloe Cup which we won as Best Newcomer.

Some of my most memorable memories are of my parents, my marriage in Holy Cross Church, and my 4 daughters. I am also proud of helping to sett up the first Avening Playgroup in the British Legion Hut – now the Social Club.

The 1st Avening Brownies were set up 50 years ago In 1973 when 24 brownies planted 30 Norwegian Spruce trees. Now just one remains at the Television mast.

I was commissioned by the British Wool Board for a Dorset Horn Ram for an exhibition in Japan and more recently two Dorset Horn Rams for a famous artist.

We won the overall working class at Crufts with our Clumber Spaniel, Lady a lot of silverware to bring home that day.

Life continues to excite me; take the good, the bad and whatever the day is – it's a good day.

Church Detail

On entering our church there is so much to take the eye that one can forget to look up. When you do raise your eyes, though, you will see that the ceiling above the nave is spectacular. It was built with a series of arches so that it resembles the roof over a covered wagon, or over a tunnel, and is referred to as a 'wagon-roof.' Originally, the wood would have supported lathes and a plastered ceiling (which would have looked brighter and supplied extra insulation from the elements). Down the middle of the ceiling are carved bosses. Where the ceiling meets the walls are small gargoyles, some depicting





surprising models.

What you cannot

see are the pulleys spaced above the wall. From these pulleys the candles would have been lowered, to light them before a service. Now the pulleys are tucked back onto the wall plate at the top of the wall.

Avening Ukrainian Evening

Oh what a night! The Ukrainian Evening at the Social Club on 25th June may have been the brainchild of Maryna Andrushko, who fled her home in Kyiv in February and has been living in Avening since mid-May, but it seemed as though the whole village had a part to play in making it happen – and then turning out for the party!

Avening's cooks and bakers sought out recipes for Ukrainian food and made delicious borscht, deruny, apple cake and sunflower biscuits. The village's crafters got to work making blue-and-yellow bunting, paper chains and flags. Meanwhile, those with more persuasive natures cajoled local businesses and residents into donating some fabulous prizes for the



mother of all raffles. 'Everyone was incredibly generous,' says Maryna. 'I feel as though I have won the jackpot living here.'



A live feed to Kyiv was a bit of a white-knuckle ride, but with tenacity (and a lot of wiring) we were able to link up with Maryna's husband Sergei, a journalist in Kyiv with Radio Liberty, and hear first-hand the awful consequences of the war with Russia. It was a sobering and emotional moment, even more so given the events in Ukraine since then.

Maryna, and her children Oleksa and Ivanka, dreamed up the event as a way of thanking everyone in Avening who had helped them feel so welcome in the village. 'I want you to know how much we admire your hospitality, your kindness and your sympathy towards us,' she said in a moving speech to the 200 or so people gathered at the Club.

She also wanted to raise money to support those on the frontline of the war. The Halo Trust, which works directly with Ukrainian organisations to document and eventually clear landmines and other explosives, was an obvious choice. Almost £3000 was raised thanks to the generosity of all those who bought tickets, bid in the auction and gave donations.

Things you need to know about Play Gloucestershire

Play Gloucestershire — a registered charity — is the leading provider of free, outdoor, active play in the county. Our Play Rangers activities target 7-14 year-olds. Under 7's are welcome and should be accompanied by a parent or carer. We love families to join us.

Our Play Ranger activities are open access. This means there is no registration – children can leave the site at any time. Our Play Rangers will not stop them and may not even know that they have left.

We encourage children to take responsibility for their own actions. We think this is good for them. They will be encouraged to resolve disagreements amongst themselves. We will intervene if absolutely necessary. Play Gloucestershire believe that children need and want to take risks when they play. Our Play Rangers aim to respond to these needs by offering children stimulating, challenging environments for exploring and developing their abilities. In doing this we aim to manage the level of risk so that children are not exposed to unacceptable risks. Our experience tells us that while children play outdoors, they are likely to have accidents. If this causes concern please come and talk to us.

Our activities are outdoors and include den building, fires, arts and crafts, sports and a range of playful games. We encourage children to play freely and choose what they want to do. They do not have to do anything if they don't want to. Children will get wet, hot, cold, smelly and dirty and need to wear appropriate clothing and footwear. Better to wear old play clothes than ruin your best!

Our Play Rangers will provide drinking water at all sessions. We promote healthy eating and sometimes provide free fruit. We believe all children have the right to play. Please talk to us if you child needs additional support to enjoy Play Rangers. We welcome disabled children and their families.
