Update on Avening Stream

Following pressure from the Parish Council to the Environment Agency (EA), Equiland Ltd have submitted a retrospective application for an 'impoundment licence' to impede or obstruct the headwaters of the Avening Stream. In simple terms this is for the new dam and lake at Aston Farm, Cherington. The lake and associated works are likely to be a factor in the stream drying out this year, and definitely caused the water to stop flowing during its construction, which has caused irreparable damage to the dependant wildlife of the stream.

The Parish Council have formally objected to the application and have further requested the valley to be reinstated to its original state. Other concerned villagers have also written objections, and anyone can comment by emailing the EA at <u>PSC-WaterResources@environment-agency.gov.uk</u> quoting the reference NPS/WR/036529 – these details and a link to the application are on the website. Please comment before **19th October**.

I am still working with the EA to establish what other factors may be impacting the amount of water flowing through the system, and I will update you in due course.



In Loving Memory of Christine Duff

3rd May 1933 to 6th August 2022



Avening resident Christine died peacefully on 6th August, aged 89, having had heart complications. She leaves 4 children, Virginia, Alistair, David and Richmond, one nephew Nick, 10 grandchildren and 2 great-grandchildren, to all of whom she was devoted.

Christine's family roots were in Cinderford in the Forest of Dean where she had an idyllic childhood, later moving with her family to Minchinhampton as a teenager. After studying art and physical education in Eastbourne, she moved to Nottingham where she brought up her children with cardiologist husband Robert Duff, and taught as a sought-after "supply" teacher at Fairham Comprehensive. In 1995, after the death of Robert, she returned to Gloucestershire to be near her two sisters, Josie and Sally, sadly also deceased, and to be near her dear friend Reverend Celia Carter in Avening, despite repeated pleas from all her children to live with one of them! Here she became a faithful member of the church community and loved taking part in church activities until she had a major stroke in 2005.

She fought hard to regain her speech and some mobility, enjoying weekly visits from her family and outings to the Forest bluebells, Clevedon Pier and William's Kitchen, when her health allowed. In the last couple of years, she was in poorer health, but still managed weekly scrabble games and keeping in touch with all her friends and relatives. She was very grateful for all the help she received from friends and neighbours during medical emergencies – indeed she was very lucky to have lived in such a wonderful village and to have shared in the lives of so many special Avening people.

Christine May Duff was a source of happiness and we are certain that she herself had a very happy life. She will be forever in our hearts.

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The Cost of Living Crisis

Here at Citizens Advice Stroud and Cotswold Districts we are seeing an increase in demand for our services as a result of the cost of living crisis.

Over the last three months we have seen a 92% increase in

requests for charitable help from the same period last year, with people seeking help with food, fuel or hardship fund payments.

Whilst the Energy Price Guarantee announced on the 8th September comes as a huge relief to households, energy bills are still very high. In winter 2021, the energy price cap was set at £1,277 for typical use. The new Price Guarantee starting on 1 October for households on typical use will be £2,500 a year.

We are very concerned about how vulnerable residents will cope this autumn and winter when temperatures drop and they need to turn their heating on. Many of our clients have been unable to afford their essential costs during the summer months. We have already had clients on prepayment meters who do not have enough credit to run medical equipment that relies on electricity; clients who cannot afford to heat their water; parents who are skipping meals to feed their children and pensioners unable to afford their fuel bills. In our largely rural districts, many residents rely on oil for heating and hot water and we have been contacted by people who cannot afford the cost of the minimum order.

What to do if you are worrying about money

If you are worried about paying your bills there are a few simple things you can do:

- 1. Work out your budget. Find out exactly how much you have coming in, and what's going out, and think about where you may be able to make savings. There is a useful budgeting tool to help you. on the national Citizens Advice website (https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk)
- 2. If you don't think you can pay your energy bills, contact your supplier. There are schemes to help customers but if you don't tell them you are struggling then they can't help you.
- 3. If you have debts, look at the guidance on debt on the national Citizens Advice website.
- 4. Check if you might be entitled to any benefits. If you have internet access you can use Turn2Us, Entitledto or Policy in Practice benefit calculators to check what you might get.
- 5. Make sure you have received any cost of living payments that you are entitled to. If you are in council tax Band A-D property you should have received a rebate on your council tax and if you are a pensioner, on benefits or disabled there are various payments that you should be receiving.

If you cannot access the internet please call us on our freephone number **0808 800 0510** to access advice.

If you are really struggling and don't have enough food to eat you can call the Trussell Trust Help through Hardship Helpline on **08082 082138**.

Please do ask for help – we understand that these are worrying times.

You can get advice by calling us on our freephone number (**0808 800 0510**) and obtain email advice through our local website (<u>https://www.citizensadvice-</u> <u>stroudandcotswold.org.uk/</u>) under the Get Help section. We are also seeing clients by appointment in our Stroud and Cirencester offices and in the community at various venues across both districts – currently Dursley, Paganhill Community Hub, Stonehouse APT, Wotton under Edge, Moreton in Marsh and Tetbury.

We are also looking for new volunteers to train as admin assistants in both our Cirencester and Stroud offices – if you are interested please email <u>info@ca-scd.org.uk</u>. The Oldest Gravestone in Avening Churchyard?



A recent visitor to Avening, Mike Bennett,, brought this gravestone, to our attention, which lies just below the footpath passing under the North transept window (the front of the church). He thinks the inscription says :

R R 1659

Although the second R could possibly be a K and the 5 might be a 3 or an 8. He wonders if they are the initials of the deceased or if they have a different meaning.

Mike has looked at burial records and discovered that there are three burials recorded for 1639 - James CONER, William BIRK and Thomas RANLINA – none of these initials fit. None are recorded for 1659. But burials twenty are 1689/90, recorded but only one with appropriate initials; Richard KING, buried 1689/90 Feb 23.

Can anyone shed further light on this?

The Sound of Silence

The earth was parched. The lawns were brown. The air was still. Day after day the rays of the summer sun beat down relentlessly on fields and gardens.

And then came the day when the grey rain clouds appeared, opened up and deposited what all the fields and gardens had been waiting for. Good, steady rain. And what a transformation took place. Within a short space of time the garden welcomed back its feathered friends - blackbirds, thrushes, the two robins making sure neither crossed in to the other's territory, a solitary wren and a bunch of lively blue tits who very swiftly took over the bird bath, splashing around and having what was possibly the first good bath they'd had for some time.

But the best thing of all was the fact that the sound of silence had been broken. From early morning right through the following days once again it was so good to hear the birds singing their little hearts out. Long may they go on doing so before the autumn and winter chill comes along and our gardens once again return to silence.

I was about to email this piece to The Editor when the following little cameo happened - it was a very endearing moment which I hope you might enjoy.

I'd gone into the kitchen in the early evening and went to pick up what looked like a dried up brown leaf on the floor in front of the Aga. Well it wasn't a leaf - it was in fact a wren very happily ensconced on the dogs' bedding (dogs weren't there, thank goodness). It didn't appear to be injured or frightened and looked up as if to say I'd quite like to stay here It had obviously flown in through the open window and had



no desire to move. We looked at each other for a moment, its bright little eyes looking at me as I bent down to pick it up which I did very carefully just in case it was injured - which it wasn't.

It was only when I had it in the palm of my hand to take it outside that I realised what a tiny little body I was carrying. Anyway, within seconds of going outside it took off into the evening sky and away it went.

It would be nice to think that it might be the wren that comes regularly to the garden but I'll never know the answer, will I?

Sandra Trinder 1960—2022



Sandra was born on the 22nd September 1960 to Frank and Edie Mann at Wisteria Road, Tetbury, a sister to Dave. However, not long afterwards, the family moved to Avening where Sandra attended the local Primary School, and then received her secondary education at Sir William Romney's School in Tetbury.

She began work, alongside her cousin Alison, at Aerovac Ltd on the Tetbury Industrial Estate. The two cousins were up for any mischievous prank and were often behind any such goingson and they became known as 'The Terrible Twosome'. Sandra's next employment was with Pressboard Limited at Nailsworth. However, for

most of her working life, and from 1990, she was employed as a carer by Gloucestershire County Council, a job she carried out for 25 years until ill-health forced her retirement following an aneurism in 2015.

On the 23rd February 1981, Sandra became mother to her only child, her daughter, Melanie or Mel as we know her today. As a single parent, Sandra with baby Mel moved in with her brother, David, who supported them in those early days until Sandra met Geoff and they moved in together. Later, when David met and married Caroline, Sandra became an aunt to David's children; first his stepson, Lee, and then their two daughters, Emma and Lisa. Sandra was delighted with her new family role and became their proud and loving Auntie.

Sandra was also a brilliant Mum – and her bond with Mel became very special. As the years went by, she and Mel were more like sisters than mother and daughter. Sandra was always loving and supportive, and a key to their relationship, especially when Mel entered her teenage years was that Sandra was a good listener – and there was nothing that was 'off the table' that Mel could not talk to her Mum about – and that close, supportive relationship continued into Mel's adult life. When Mel started going out with friends like Kelly Francis, Sandra wanted Mel to have a good night out but would say to her, 'Don't be back too late as I can't sleep until I know you are home safe.'

For Sandra herself had enjoyed her younger years, often in company with her friend, Lorraine, who became godmother to Sandra's daughter, Mel, and then godmother again to Mel's son, Alex. When the need arose in those younger days, Sandra and Lorraine would provide alibis for each other. They enjoyed having 'some laughs' whatever the occasion – and they were not easily deterred from having a night out. On one occasion Lorraine drove Sandra through thick fog all the way to Badmington for a skittles game only to find – surprise, surprise – that the event had been cancelled – too foggy for most folk to come out in – but not our Avening girls – they're cut from a

different cloth!

Indeed, Sandra has always enjoyed socialising. She loved her bingo sessions at the Avening Social Club and, as with friends and neighbours, she enjoyed going to The Cross, where she played skittles as part of The Socialites skittles team. Sandra also played skittles with her friend Julie Woodman in the Cross Avens skittle team. After Sandra's marriage to Geoff Trinder, she and Geoff would socialise on weekends with best friends, Terry and Jenny Francis. All four were regulars at the Avening Social Club, but as Sandra and Geoff were known for being late, Terry's usual greeting to them as they entered was, 'What time do you call this?'

But it wasn't always a matter of going out to socialise. Sandra was very family-oriented and loved family life. She took great enjoyment in home life, and she loved baking for family and friends. Sandra also enjoyed sitting in her garden and socialising there with family and friends. In most respects, Sandra had an easy-going nature and outgoing personality, but she could be impatient, particularly where workmen were involved if called in to do some work in or around the home. Sandra fretted about the time they took to complete the job and could never quite reconcile their need for frequent breaks with requests for 'just another cuppa tea.'

Apart from the birth of her daughter – and later the births of her grandchildren - the most important day in Sandra's life was the 19th December 1987, when Sandra married Geoff Trinder in the Cirencester Registry Office. Theirs was to be a very happy marriage. Geoff has been a very good husband to Sandra, and as a stepfather to Mel, he was, in her words, 'The Best.' Sandra and Geoff had a fantastic marriage full of fun and laughter - they were always messing around and calling each other nicknames at home. It was a marriage that stood the test of time and in December this year, Sandra and Geoff would have celebrated their 35th anniversary as husband and wife.

During these years, and indeed for the greater part of her life, Sandra lived in Avening, in Rectory Lane, until 2018, when Sandra and Geoff relocated to Pathfinder Village, near Tedburn St Mary, about 8 miles from Exeter in Devon – a residential park set in about 40 acres of beautiful woodlands surrounded by the stunning Devon countryside offering a host of amenities and activities. Their decision had been influenced in part as they had holidayed many times in East Devon, not far from Exmouth, at Devon Cliffs, a large seaside caravan resort on Sandy Bay, a secluded bay with a sand beach, about one mile long, with rock pools at one end, backed by high cliffs.

While they enjoyed the lifestyle at Pathfinder Village and had made many new friends and Sandra enjoying the bingo sessions at the 69's bingo club, as time passed, they missed being away from family and long-time friends. So, earlier this year, Sandra and Geoff moved back closer to their 'home' area to St John's Park at Lechlade. One of the greatest attractions of coming back to this part of the country was once again living closer to Mel – although not as close as they had been when they had lived in Avening in a close-knit community of family and friends. For example, when Mel married Neil, he had been known to Sandra for a long time and her daughter and son-in-law settled down as near neighbours to her and Geoff in Avening.

Of course, Sandra - and Geoff - were delighted when a first grandchild was born, a

grandson, Alex, in 2005; and then their second grandchild, a granddaughter, Mia, in 2011. Both Sandra and Geoff just loved them to bits. Sandra loved spending time with Alex and Mia and being their Granny. Sandra had looked after Alex when Mel returned to work, taking him to play-group and then to school. She and Geoff with Mel, Neil and the grandchildren had also holidayed together in Devon at the Devon cliffs resort. And even when living at Pathfinder Village, Sandra and Mel were in constant contact, just keeping in touch, and this was so for Alex and Mia too, with for example, Mia Facetiming Sandra just to ask, 'Granny, what are you doing today?' Sandra would also call Alex regularly to ask what her password was for certain apps on her phone or how to use her Amazon fire stick. Alex bought Sandra and Geoff an Alexa and Sandra would laugh as Alexa would never answer to Geoff. Sandra explained to Geoff that Alexa didn't reply to him because he was too gruff!

Although this regular contact meant everything to Sandra, it also underscored the fact that she was missing day-to-day physical contact with her family. So Sandra and Geoff made the move to Lechlade on 5th July, somewhere almost equidistant between Mel, Neil, Alex and Mia at and her friends in Avening, Tetbury, and Minchinhampton area. Sadly, Sandra who had suffered an aneurism in 2015, suffered a bleed on the brain just days after the move to Lechlade, and passed away in her new home at St John's Park on 9th July, the ambulance crew in attendance unable to save her.

Sandra's death was a huge shock to the family, and one that they are still struggling to come to terms with. Geoff has lost the love of his life. Mel has lost more than a mother, but a close friend. Yes, a warm, loving, and supportive Mum and Granny to her kids, but also a kindred spirit to whom Mel could open her heart about anything – and echoing the thought that 'little things mean a lot' – Sandra was always there and ready to chat – even about what Mel has called 'stupid stuff' like prices in the supermarket and everyday happenings. Sandra's friends too are grieving. She was loved and is missed by so many – a dear, fun-loving, and loyal friend – taken too soon. But for all that Sandra has been and all she has given, they join with family in saying, 'Thank You, Sandra' and 'Rest in Peace'.





Ceremonial Disasters

We've all witnessed those spectacular ceremonial scenes recently, which have gone off without a hitch. Our military capability in ceremonial duties is unsurpassed, with rich traditions with which other nations simply cannot compete. I've participated in many ceremonial events in my RAF career, and formerly at the Army's Duke of York's Royal Military School, but I recall three in particular that didn't go too well.



It was fifty years ago, and I was the ADC to the Commander in Chief of RAF Support Command. In those days, Air Marshals had

their own aircraft to get them around, and we were visiting two Maintenance Units that day. At RAF Stafford, we were due to present a trophy to the unit who had achieved the least traffic accidents that year: it was a large silver bowl encased in a wooden box.

After visiting RAF Carlisle, we landed at RAF Stafford to see the entire unit paraded on the tarmac. We taxied to the centre so that my Air Marshal could descend the aircraft steps and receive the salute. Close behind, I grabbed the trophy box to find that it fell open and the trophy bounced all the way down to the bottom of the steps. Previously I had secured it, but I was unaware that the crew had sneaked a peek at it while we were at Carlisle, and hadn't refastened it properly.

Catastrophe! But to give my Air Marshal his due, he calmly picked up the trophy, presented it to the Unit Commander, and reminded him that although they had won the competition, they had had several accidents that year, which was now recognised by the dents in the trophy. But the flight home wasn't so funny.

Fifteen years later, and I've been nominated as Parade Commander for a ceremony at Bury St Edmunds. As I called the parade to attention, the Police Dog handler stamped on the unfortunate Alsatian's paw, and the dog's howl of anguish was as nothing compared to that from all the spectators. Worse was to come: the Mayor, accompanied by our Station Commander, had arrived precisely on time, but the doddery old chap took an age to get out of the car. I knew we had a fourship of Tornado jets bearing down on us, the flypast timed to arrive precisely with the salute, and the one thing you can't do once the aircraft are on target is to ask them to slow down. Even though the Station Commander virtually dragged the Mayor up to the saluting base, the jets would have disappeared long before I could order the Present Arms....perhaps this was the first time a parade has saluted someone's backside!

A few months later, the Air Officer Commanding was receiving the salute outside the RAF Honington Officers' Mess at the start of his annual inspection. We all looked on in horror as the four Tornados flew over the Sergeants' Mess, clearly a serious navigation error. This did not augur well. After the inspection, the Station Warrant Officer had a word with the lead pilot: 'Looks like you'll be Parade Commander next year then, Sir.'



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
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The Village Notice Board






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
