Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



We have all experienced new events in recent weeks – lots of rain after a very dry summer; and I'm tempted to say lots of Prime Ministers in very short order. We can only hope that 10 Downing Street sorts itself out, common sense prevails and life returns to some semblance of normality, financial stability, and peace of mind for us all. The prospect of a proliferation of strikes will for some of us bring back memories of the 1970's, three day weeks, electricity shortages etc. Let's pray that the issues can be resolved without too much damage and to the satisfaction of all parties involved.

Meanwhile, back in Avening: -

The Memorial Hall: We have experienced two mini floods in the hall in recent weeks and I suspect we will have more near misses in the months ahead as the almost unpredictable storms rain down on us. We have the situation whereby the cumulative rain that falls on the High Street and adjoining roads culminates in an almost mini tsunami by the time the water reaches the front of the Memorial Hall. The water reaches such volumes that the kerbside would need to be a foot tall to have any chance of diverting the waters, and the detritus it carries with it, from swamping the front entrance door. Despite the best efforts of willing parishioners on each occasion (thank you to Mandy, Tony and Jane Ruston) we are at the mercy of the weather and in a situation that resembles King Canute trying to turn the tide. The Trustees are considering various options that might be applied to minimise the flood risk. Highways have now confirmed that part of the problem is within the drains, which appear to have collapsed underground where they pass under the road and into the adjacent stream. Excavations by Highways are planned to establish the facts and the required remedy.

One solution that has been mooted is to erect a low wall on the inner side of the path to act as a flood barrier; diverting the water around to the side of the hall and simultaneously creating an attractive courtyard to the front entrance. If anyone has an idea for this flood prevention project, then please contact the Clerk to the Parish Council and the ideas can be considered by the Hall Trustees.

On a brighter note, the **Memorial Hall** celebrates its **100**th **Anniversary** this year and it will be open to the villagers on **Sunday 13**th **November** immediately following the Remembrance Service in the Church. There will be a slide show to celebrate Avening and this landmark, plus photos of Avening and profiles of those who gave their lives in the World Wars. The Parish Council are providing drinks and nibbles to accompany this event so please make every effort to attend. Oh! – yes its free!

Villager of the Year Award: I shall use the occasion of the celebration of the Memorial Hall to announce this year's winner for Villager of the Year 2022 — the recipient is someone who is extremely deserving of this award.

Playing Field: The Parish Council have ordered a new gate and posts for the main entrance which will be erected as soon as possible. We have also ordered a pedestrian gate for the western end of the field which will make it a safer route for toddlers so that they don't run out into the lane. N.B. It will also be wide enough for wheel chair access.

Also, a set of exercise bars are to be installed very soon.

The time scale for all of these improvements depend on the contractors' diary and the weather; but will be asap.

Dog Poo in the Playing Field: The 'Dog Poo Fairy' is still not doing her job! So please, if your dog fouls the Playing Field, or any other public space, do the right thing and pick it up.

Highways road signs and diversion signs: These magically appear, often on a weekly basis, and seemingly divert us round in circles for very little reason. I'm reliably informed that the signs are supplied from depots in Birmingham and placed by contractors who are similarly not from this area. If only they would do their homework first! — I suggest Geography & Map Reading for beginners!

Avening Cinema Club: Just a reminder that this is now back.

Christmas: The Avening Christmas Tree lights will be switched on at 6.00pm on Saturday 3rd December, so please come along if you can. The location is as usual by the old telephone box at the top of the high street. There will also be carol singing.

Last but not least; the **Avening Village Sign**, which has graced the centre of the village for many years, is nearing the completion of its restoration and will soon be back in situ in the school gardens. Our grateful thanks go to George Buchanan for his time and skills in this project.

Another Road Closure!

Nailsworth Road will be closed 7th Nov - 2nd Dec. 24 hours per day, weekdays only. Please note pedestrian access WILL NOT be maintained.



Highways will shortly be carrying essential ground investigation works of B4014 Avening – Longman's Barn. This section of the B4014 is experiencing cracking in the road which over time could pose risk to road users. The cracking is caused by ground movements below the road.

The closure is proposed in order to carry out a ground investigation to drill boreholes in the road and install monitoring equipment.

It is necessary for a road closure to be in place because the road is too narrow for temporary traffic lights.

Angela Joy Kerry *née* Roberts 1945—2022

Angela made her first appearance in this world in Cheltenham Hospital on the 28th of December 1945, born to Jack and May Roberts she was the youngest of their two daughters, following her elder sister Margaret by seven years and seven months. The family moved to Avening when Angela was just six weeks old, as Jack was head gardener for Lord Lee of Fareham. Angela would grow up in the area attending Avening School where she was a very good pupil. She went on to Tetbury Grammar which was less successful and which she didn't enjoy. Her dad had to pay £10 to enable her to leave.

Angela would then go in to the world of work starting as a hairdresser working for Ruby Harper in Stroud for some time before starting her own business in Nailsworth. She would have this business for over fifty years building up a very loyal customer base, many of whom became as much friends as customers.

My amazing, beautiful mum had a way with words, and she certainly made us laugh right to the end. I had the best childhood ever growing up on the laps of Mum's customers. As I was growing up I can always remember Mum reliving the memory of giving birth to me, telling everyone she met that she would have been quite happy if she had given birth to 56lbs of potatoes as the pain was horrific. What a memory, comparing me to a potato!

My favourite memory was taking Mum to see Kris Kristofferson in Bristol. We had tickets a few rows back and Mum started speaking to a man outside who asked her if we had tickets as his two friends couldn't make it and they were front row seats. Out came her purse and she bought two more. Mum's face was a picture that I will never forget – watching her watching him. The best thing was he touched and held her hand twice, oh how everyone knew this. On leaving the theatre she told me it had been the best day of her life to which I said surely that was the day I was born to which Mum laughed and replied that does not even come close.

More recently, Mum had a stay in hospital, and I took Ralph to visit. He was going swimming in the lido after; we hid behind the chair to get changed. Mum asked what he was doing; I said he is getting changed and doesn't want you to see and she laughed and said she had seen bigger on a squirrel.

Before Mum passed away she hadn't spoken a word for a while when suddenly she took a breath and said loudly and clearly 'I'm ready'

Mum you told us you were ready, but I wasn't and I'm still not ready now. The day you were born, Mum, they broke the mould. You were one of a kind, very stubborn but there wasn't and never will be anyone like you. One word you used a lot when you were told something you didn't know was 'whiff' and I can still hear that word now as everyone is gathered here today to celebrate your life as you are so loved. You told me before you left this world that you will always be on my shoulder, and I hope you are there looking over me as I couldn't ask for a better guardian angel. Sleep tight Mum, you are now pain free but the pain of losing you will remain with me forever. I love you so much, chicken, until we meet again, Mum, goodnight.

I would like to read this card from Mum's palliative care nurse who didn't know her for that long, but you would have thought they had known each other for years as it is Mum to a T.

Nothing can prepare you for the reality and finality of losing someone you love, but her love for you all was so clear and I hope this will bring you comfort in the difficult weeks and months ahead. I loved to visit your mum, her sense of humour and ability to look on the bright side of life was inspirational. I know how important her independence was and I am pleased she was able to remain at home as she had wanted. You have been

fabulous in helping to keep mum comfortable and speaking up for her when she was reluctant to admit that things were changing. The twinkle in her eyes will live on in you and your children so she will always be with you.

In loving memory of a special Grandma. The day you left and gained your wings, My heart just broke in two, I wish you could have stayed with me, But heaven needed you. You left me with the memories, And I love you dearly still, No matter how much time goes by, You know I always will. You were a very special person, With kindness in your heart, And the love we had together, Grows stronger now we're apart. I know I cannot bring you back, Although I wish it everyday, But a piece of me went with you, The day you went away.



Angela's sister has shared some thoughts on her lovely sister and best friend:

Angela was never a dolly sort of person, she preferred animals and birds. She was given a lovely doll when she was about four — our mum had saved up all year in a toy shop in Nailsworth to get it, it had long ringlets and long eye lashes. Angela cut all of the hair off including the eyelashes and our mum was not amused, so when she won a pretty doll in a raffle she sold it to me for a box of chocolates — I still have that doll now! From about the age of ten she always wanted to smoke a pipe; I don't think she ever did but she did love her cigarettes.

Angela always loved animals and birds and her first choice would have been to work with animals. She had a pet Jackdaw which would fly in the window in the morning and perch on her head, sometimes for forty minutes. She wore a black beret which made the perching easy; imagine me sleeping in the same bedroom knowing that this would

happen every morning! My sister was so good hearted even when she was really poorly she would not let her ladies down and would still do their hair. She will be missed by so many people who loved her and I can't imagine life without her. She was my lovely sister and my best friend.

Angela loved her four-legged companions as much if not possibly more than her two legged ones. But she had a great bond with her grandchildren, as Ralph has said she was a great cook of her bread and butter pudding but for Ellie it would always be her roasts especially the lamb ones with all the trimmings, she couldn't get enough of the mash and gravy, and she would always ask for a cup of gravy to drink just as it was.

Angela was a true character, nobody had a nature like her ... she was genuine, warm, loving, whole hearted, straight up, she would say it like it was. If you were her friend you were a friend for life until you crossed her and then you would not be forgiven. She was whole hearted ... simply a wonderful lady



These stories and the essence of Angela will remain with us every day. Angela, and the memory of her, has not ended with her physical death. Her tenacity, her personality and her spirit were given out and shared amongst you, and they have become the living part of the people who were close to Angela, the family and friends she loved and cared for will keep her in their hearts and thoughts. She will be much missed by all who knew and loved her.



Cherington AppleFest 2022

We had a wonderful weekend of glorious autumnal sunshine for Cherington Applefest on October 1st. We first had a community apple and pear pick to make juice in 2020 when our opportunities to come together indoors were limited but outdoor activities were permitted under covid rules. After a break last year we came back in force this year - with all our trees so very laden down with fruit this September and October. Apples and pears were harvested and stored in an empty stable during the week and the remaining trees were picked on Saturday with some ambitious tree climbing and innovative use of rakes and sticks and blankets to catch the falling fruit. We then had a harvest festival service in the church followed by drinks and nibbles to celebrate the fruits of our labours.





On Monday Helen, Duncan and Kate then loaded up 2 cars and a trailer – normally reserve for sheep transportation – to transport literally tons of apples to My Apple Juice in Hungerford. As Richard who runs the place asked us several times as the boxes of apples kept coming – sorry how many people did you say live in your village? – yep just 98 Richard. Richard and his team wash and press the fruit and then pasteurise the juice before bottling in 750 ml bottles which we

will be back to collect in the coming weeks.

Jill has again designed a beautiful label for us for this year's vintage and we have branched out with some cider making too! The cider will come back from Hungerford to ferment here in Cherington ready for sale at the bar at the 2023 Cherington Show.

With more than 20 varieties of apples and some pears the juice is a wonderful and unique blend. Fully pasteurized and with no additives the juice keeps for





over 18 months, and is available for purchase now and throughout the year. Please contact Helen if you are interested on hdm@curzonexec.com. A brilliant community weekend with refreshments to keep us going through the winter months!

Here's a thought.

Were you born between 1925 and 1955? These were, I believe, best years to be born in the history of Earth and we got it all. Thank God for all the times, the adventures, wars won, technology developed, generations after future generations will never experience what a generation we turned out to be.

First, we survived being born to mothers who may have smoked and or drank while they were pregnant, they took Aspirin, ate blue cheese dressing, tuna from a can and didn't get tested for diabetes. After that trauma we were put to sleep on our tummies in baby cots covered with bright coloured lead based paints. We had no childproof lids on medicines bottles, locks on doors or cabinets and when we rode our bikes we had base ball caps, not helmets on our heads.

As infants and children we would ride in cars with no seat belts, or air bags, bald tires and sometimes no brakes, we drank water from a garden hose or a local spring not from a bottle, we shared one soft drinks with four friends and no one actually died from this.

We ate cupcakes, white bread with real butter and beef dripping, drank pop made with sugar and we weren't overweight, WHY? - because we were always outside playing, no one was able to reach us all day and we were OK! We would spend hours building our go carts out of scraps and old prams then ride them down the hill only to find out that we had forgot about the brakes; after running into the bushes a few times we learned to solve the problem.

Play Stations, Nintendo, X Boxes or video game didn't exist, no 150 odd TV channels or personal computers or cell phones, what we had was friends and we went outside and found them. When we fell out of trees, got cuts or broke bones and lost teeth there were no law suits from these accidents, and the idea of a parent bailing us out if we broke the law was unheard of...they actually sided with the law.

We would get spankings with wooden spoons, belts, sticks or just a bare hand and no one would call child services to report abuse. Worms were eaten and we made mud pies and the worms didn't live in us forever. We made up games with sticks, bows and arrows and although we were told it would happen we did not put anybody's eye out.

We had sports facilities available, football, cricket teams and a playing field, we had freedom, failure and success and responsibility and we learned how to deal with it.

If you are one of those born between 1925-1955 - congratulations! We had the luck to grow up as kids before the lawyers and government regulated so much of our lives for our own good, and we didn't have the pest of the so called social media or cell phones.


How do we sum up Alfie in a few words? Handsome; loving; naughty! He was always entertaining and will be very much missed by all the family.



As we approach the winter months it is a good time to reflect on the busy summer in the village and to pay tribute to all the people who have worked very hard for its benefit, not only for now but also for its future.

As chairman of the Parish Council it is not only a privilege to help oversee the goings on in the village but to be aware of who does all the work for the events that we have during a year and how much work is put into each event to make it a success.

I often hear of other villages laying on an event and are very pleased with the outcome only to then find out it produced a fraction of the income we at Cherington achieve. For our 52 households in the parish the results are amazing, as are the residents who do all the hard work.

Only yesterday at the Council meeting I was told that we had over the weekend collected enormous quantities of apples and pears, which were then taken to the processor to be converted into Cherington apple juice or cider. With luck and good will this will produce around 600 bottles which will then be sold in and around the village. It is not only the income this brings in but the community spirit within the village, everyone working together.

This is the same as the annual Cherington Village Show in July. Everyone helps in their own way and we keep our community together. I quite see that by having a small Parish we all get to know each other which is possibly not the same in a larger community. We have the same core population with some residents coming and going but somehow all the new residents want to join in with the events.

There are some people who are Leaders and some Doers but we seem to have a whole village of Doers. Some of the Doers are Leaders too when asked, and Lead very well.

As a parish we try to raise all our income from events, and every now and again the Parish Council is asked to help. This means we are able to have a very low precept. This year we supported the Village Hall with a new door. In addition the Hall Committee are working very hard to create the funds to improve the heating, which will then help towards the income of the Hall in the future. With luck we might also get a grant to help with this.

Christmas is not far away and the first Saturday in December is the Christingle Service, which is also linked to the lighting of the Village Tree on the Green. For just over a month there is the reminder each morning and evening of Christmas and I would hope that it puts a smile on the face of those passing by.

It has been a sad year in ways too. We had a very good lunch in the village to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee to then have the sad news of her passing. I have no doubt that some in the village went to London to pay their respects, or to just see the amazing flowers that others had left.

We in Cherington were lucky that the Queen had twice been to services in our little

church and a tree has been planted in the Church Yard in celebration of her long reign and in memory of her.

There is not much to be happy about in these difficult times with the war in Ukraine, and uncertain economic times which is a huge problem to us all and quite an eye opener. It would be nice to think that our political leaders could maybe think about the future of the country rather than their political aspirations.




