Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



The sun is shining, lockdown is easing and an air of optimism is surfacing; albeit tempered with caution and slight uncertainty.

After what seemed a period of inactivity fuelled by lockdown with all its implications for availability of labour and the scarcity of materials, we suddenly seem to be getting things to happen. At the time of writing the installation of the Zip Wire in the playing field has started and should be completed before the end of July. Additionally, we have installed two 'pub benches' – one within the children's section and the other one adjacent to the football pitch. If you are into exercise, great; if you're not you can sit and relax and take in the views. After what seems like a year or two it's so good to see the end result of the effort by the Playing Field Committee – John Hetterley, Christine Howell and Richard King. We are still looking for your views and ideas on what equipment and facilities you would like to see in the Playing field so please get in touch with John, Christine or Richard with any suggestions; ideally before the end of August which will enable them to draw up a priority list to present to the Parish Council.

It's that time of year again – Villager of the Year nominations, Adult and Young Person respectively. Given the issues caused by lockdown I'm sure there has been a lot of goodwill, help and support which has gone unheralded and is worthy of recognition, so please give it some thought and get your nominations in – a really special way to say thank you.

We have seen our fair share of road closures in recent weeks and it has to be said that the signs have been less than informative – 'close a road in Nailsworth and put signs up in Tetbury' - OK, a slight exaggeration but not much of one. Diversion notices sent us miles out of our way only to discover that we could get home using the road that was supposed to be closed. The Parish Council have made several requests to the County Council and Highways to qualify where exactly the closure is located. Highways put handwritten notices indicating dates and times of closures, so I think it is reasonable to ask for just one more detail to be added to the template. So far this has been beyond their remit, but we will keep asking. Those of us who experienced driving immediately after the gritting of the Nailsworth / Avening road will know what a frightening experience it was – however, after I phoned the emergency number, Highways did respond the next day with a road sweeper, the trip is now less stressful – so I thank them for a speedy response.

Recent village events such as the Bear Hunt clearly showed what talents and enterprise we are fortunate to have within our parish. However, if I'm permitted to have one negative observation it is this – there are numerous posters stapled to lampposts or electric poles, advertising events, promoting products, taxi services and the occasional missing pet. If you have already, or intend to put posters up, please

have the courtesy of removing them after a suitable interval. Technically it's littering and it detracts from the image of the village; but managed properly, I'm sure they would have more impact if they are seen to be current. (If it's a missing pet – even more important to update it)

The low levels of water in the stream in recent weeks is still the subject of investigations by the Environmental Agency and while we are not at this stage privy to details; they have assured us at a recent site meeting, that they have ongoing correspondence with the appropriate land owners.

Affordable Housing: the proposed development at the end of Lawrence Road is an opportunity for anyone who is interested to apply for one of the houses – the application is online at Homeseekers on the Cotswold District Council website.

On a bright note, I'm pleased to announce that there will be an Avening Village Fete scheduled for 12th September – the return of the famous Duck Race and all that goes with it.

As always – keep safe and look out for others.

Good news! We met our crowdfunder target of £10,300 in June! The zip wire has now been ordered along with a couple of picnic tables which should be delivered soon. We also obtained a better price for the zip wire which will free up funding for other play equipment.

Over 210 people pledged during the two crowdfunder campaigns. The level of your support led to the recent donation of £2,000 by Cotswold District Council and we were also fortunate to receive funds from Calor Rural Community Fund, GCC Growing our Communities Fund, Renishaw, The Langtree Trust, Tetbury Lions (in memory of Bert Hand who used to live in the village) and the Parish Council. Lammastide, 1st August at 3.00 pm

The word is an abbreviation of 'loaf-mass' and is derived from the Anglo-Saxon

Hlafmaesse. It was a common service before the Reformation as a thanksgiving for the first-fruits of the wheat harvest, and is now increasingly being recognised again: we will play our part in that renewal with a service which, by kind permission of Henry Arden, will take place at Coxes Farm – leave Cherington village green with the hall on your left, the farm is a short distance on the left just before the next road junction.

Even if you cannot have the holiday you would wish, I hope that you are able to have a fulfilling break of some sort - we are fortunate to live in an area where others come for their holidays.



Church Details

The winter of 1947 was bitterly cold in England, with temperatures from the end of January to the middle of March barely rising above freezing- and frequently it was well below freezing. Snow fell almost every day somewhere in the country and because of the low temperatures the snows stayed on the ground, blocking roads and preventing delivery of food or coal. The weather was so cold that in Avening the ground under the floor of the church porch froze, pushing the stone floor up so that the outer church doors could not shut properly. When the thaw finally arrived, the floor stayed in its frozen position, and the doors remained partially open. The outer doors are thick heavy oak, and it wasn't until 2009 that two strong volunteers re-shaped the doors and then rehung them so they could be shut.



Steam Engine AB 1823 Arrives in Avening!

If, by chance, you have glanced into the driveway at The Old Rectory you may have noticed a rather large steam engine sitting on the lawn – this is "Harry" and here is his story.

Originally just a number, AB 1823 was ordered on 4th December 1923 for stock by the locomotive builder, Andrew Barclay Sons & Co Ltd from Kilmarnock in Ayrshire. In 1924 an order came from the Colzium Quarry Ltd on 30th January. The steam engine was outshopped for £1,370 in black lined dark red on 14th March 1924 and then despatched to their Kilsyth Quarry in Stirling around the same time. AB1823 was the only locomotive on site but sadly the Quarry went out of business in 1929.

In 1933 the locomotive was sold to the Yorkshire Tar Distillers Ltd, Kilnhurst Works, Rotherham,

Yorkshire where she remained until 1947 and was known as "Chemicals" having replaced "Chemicals Manning Wardale 1773/11" who had been the sole locomotive until this time.

The steam engine was reboilered in 1946 and with the arrival of a new AB, transferred to their Stourton Works, Yorkshire between 1947 and 1958. Here she replaced "The Colonel Peckett 1486/17" and was the only locomotive on site between 1955 and 1956. She later returned to the Kilnhurst Works between May 1958 and 1965. The name "Chemicals" was subsequently dropped before she once again returned to Stourton Works around 1965 before going on to Kilnhurst Works for a year and her last overhaul in 1967. "Chemicals" was then transferred to Cleckheaton Works in Yorkshire and from 1967 to 1969 shared the work with a diesel locomotive.

Ownership then passed to Midland-Yorkshire Tar Distillers Ltd in December 1967 where she was stored before returning to Kilnhurst Works between 1969 and 1971 after which time she was not in use.

Between 1971 and 1974 the engine was sold to KG Rose and moved to Mersey Docks & Harbour Board at Princes Dock, Liverpool for storage. She then worked a steam hauled train on the docks on 19th March and again on 24th July 1971.

Unfortunately, the storage shed was due for demolition, so the engine was moved to Yorkshire Dales Railway Co Ltd, Embsay, Yorkshire. The site was renamed the Steam and Vintage Transport Centre around 1971. Once again, the locomotive entered traffic with the livery "Chemicals" on 29th July 1971 and was repainted in white. However now in need of repair and being too small for the line the engine was sold.

Crossley Brothers (Shipley) Ltd Scrap Merchants subsequently bought the engine and moved her to their site at Shipley, Station Road, Shipley, West Yorkshire where she was brought back into industrial use from 20th June 1974 until 3rd August 1984. This purchase

was made as an assurance due to the persistent threat of oil supplies at the time and to ensure there was a reliable standby to the diesel engine. Returning to industrial use and entering traffic in 1974 in unlined dark green, black and red frames "Chemicals" was standing in for the diesel when under repair.

With the arrival of a second diesel in October 1976, she was shunted to the back of the yard and stored. The elements were not kind and before too long the locomotive started to decay.

Then, Peter Davis KWVR volunteer, offered to restore the engine to working order and this was done between July and December 1980. She then re-entered traffic in dark blue lined white and adorned with the Crossley Company emblem on the cab sides in honour of the founder of the firm Harry Crossley. Alan Crossley re-named the locomotive "Harry" on 8th January 1981 and once again she re-entered into industrial use although sadly unseen by railway enthusiasts.

It was said that a visiting British Rail diesel (Class 31 diesel of York MPD) arrived, and the driver was visibly shocked when she steamed out to receive the empty wagons! The company found that it was cheaper to run their steamer than to start up one of the three diesels. The only drawback was the time it took to get up steam! The yard handled 1,000 tons of scrap each week and shunting must have started very early each morning. If "Harry" was not ready until 11 am then the Hunslet or one of the two Rustons diesels were used to get the wagons moving. Yard Manager, Anthony Evans, confirmed that approximately 25 wagons were turned round each day.

"Harry" became redundant in April 1982 due to the introduction of 100-ton air-braked freight liner wagons being introduced in 1983/4 as the locomotive was not suitable for handling them.

Ownership then passed to Crossley Evans Ltd around 1984 when "Harry" steamed for the last time on 27th July 1984. On the death of Alan Crossley, ownership passed to Mrs Lilian Crossley from 1984 until November 1992. "Harry" was put on permanent loan with the Peak Railway at Midland Station, Buxton, Derbyshire from 3rd August 1984 until 5th March 1989. "Harry" re-entered traffic in dark blue lined white in 1984. In 1986 the locomotive went in for an overhaul and once again re-entered

traffic in dark blue.

The locomotive was still in working order in April 1988, and in 1989 she was transferred to a new site at Darley Dale to start track laying. She steamed on 5th March before going on a two-week whistle stop tour in April 1989 to various shopping premises at Sheffield, South Yorkshire before returning to Darley Dale in December that year.

From December 1989 until November 1992 "Harry" was moved to Middleton Railway Trust at Hunslet, Leeds. On subsequent inspection it was

found that the engine needed a complete overhaul.

During the first week of June 1990 the locomotive became known as "1823 Harry". Subsequent, with a change in the management of the Crossley, the company no longer wished to retain ownership of the locomotive and in 1992 it was sold to Mr Ian Smith of Newport, South Wales and the engine was moved to the Pontypool and Blaenavon Railway. Over the next 29 years, it gained the appearance of 'Thomas the Tank Engine' by being re-painting in light Nacton Blue, and Ian Smith was able to complete a certain amount of restoration, but it has not steamed since 1990. Due to failing health, Mr Smith sold all of his collection of wagons and engines to a glamping company in Kent, but Harry was surplus to requirements and so was sold on to the current owner and delivery to Avening shed took place in May 2021.

The plan is to cosmetically restore 'Harry' so that he looks something like he will appear once the mechanical overhaul is complete. 1823 is basically 99% complete and fundamentally restorable. The good news is that the frames and motion are in good condition, but the tank is life-expired, and the boiler will need significant surgery at the boiler hospital! 'Harry' will be in Avening till the spring of 2023 before going away for its full mechanical overhaul, so that hopefully he will be steamed again sometime during his 100th year, fingers crossed.

A couple of months ago the Parish Council asked the residents of Avening for feedback about how you use the playing fields and for suggestions about what additional facilities you'd like to see provided.

We have had feedback from a wide range of residents including Hawks Class of Avening Primary School! We are hoping for more feedback and suggestions, and will keep the consultation open for another month or so, but thought that it would useful and interesting to summarise some of the feedback received so far.

Playing with friends, entertaining children, dog walking, football and basketball seem to be the most popular uses of the playing fields, although sledging in the snow also received a mention!

The most popular suggestions for 'new' equipment was a replacement zipwire and seating in the play area, both of which we are delighted to report are now underway thanks to the tireless efforts of John Hetterly and the generosity of the many donors. Other suggestions are for out-door gym equipment, a nature corner, more bins, a slide, more equipment for toddlers, tyre swings in the woods, new park benches, improved basket ball area, a tennis court, an outdoor table-tennis table, new football posts and finally lighting, power and water.

Also notable were the number of comments about dog fouling and we are very aware of the problem and are considering ways of tackling the issue. Litter was also reported as an issue and we are also looking at ways of improving the current situation.

To better understand the impact of these diseases and other threats to the trees of Avening the parish Council have decided to try and record the location of the significant trees in the village. We hope that this will give us all a snap shot of the current health of the village trees and help us monitor and changes.

As a first pass at this we'd like to invite the residents of Avening to let us know about significant trees in the village. There is no strict definition of 'significant' for this exercise, but we are looking to identify mature trees that could be considered to form an important part of the village landscape.

Tony Slater's Story

I recently spent a very happy afternoon with Tony and Mandy in their wonderful new home, munching a delicious scone, pressed on me by Mandy (for purely research purposes you understand), and enjoying a very welcome cup of tea. This set the scene perfectly for finding out about their lives together and a bit more about Tony in particular, who as you will know, has just stepped down from being Chairman of the Avening Parish Council. He served with distinction,





charm and good humour as a Councillor for many years, as Deputy Chairman to both Jim Parsons and Mick Williamson and finally Chairman for the last seven years. During this time he has achieved so much for our village, including his wonderful photographic coverage of events over many years, often featured in the Villager (see cover for this edition!)

Tony was born in London on 8th October 1960. He was the youngest of four children. As the much loved baby of the family he remembers a supremely happy early family life. Certainly, the photos show a smiley little boy, who grew up to be a happy man. He won a place at Shooters Hill Grammar School and then went on to join Lloyds Bank in London where he learnt his banking 'craft'.

Tony's move with his family from London to Cherington in 1982 was the result of his mother's long held wish to return to her roots once Tony's father retired. Although Tony has always loved this area, the move eventually stunted his career which had been progressing nicely when he worked in London. He moved branches in Lloyds a couple of times when he arrived in Gloucestershire and whilst working at the Stroud branch he met Mandy Vaughan, who knew a good thing when she saw it and after a two year courtship they were married in Cherington in 1984, when Mandy was 22 and Tony 24. They settled into their



new life together and their daughters Shelley and Emma were born in 1988 and 1990.

In 2006, when he was 45, Tony took voluntary redundancy and went freelance, working in the financial services industry as a project manager. He worked for various organisations, including Lloyds, Norwich Union, and Nationwide and told me it was in every way a good move for him and the family. He was his own boss and never unemployed. He retired in March 2020 when he turned 60 with judicious use of his final salary pension arrangements.

In 2013 he was able to buy the plot of land on which the new house has been built, which was directly opposite the house in Sandford Leaze the family lived in for 30 years. An architect was appointed in January 2014, but thereafter Mandy and he masterminded the build which was completed in December 2015. There were considerable bumps on the



way and at times it was Mandy, left behind while Tony was away working, who was pivotal in guiding the project through to the end. They are thrilled with what has been achieved, but even now there are times they cannot believe that it all ended so well! Many of our readers will have watched the story of their project on Building the Dream with Charlie Luxton, and followed events in the Villager.

The happiness of his earlier life has been continued for Tony with the arrival of their first grandchild, Ethan, now nearly 2, followed by Cody this July, with another grandchild due later this year.

Tony became interested in local politics initially because he had realised, during his working life, that he had a gift for spotting useful solutions for difficulties in which he felt interested and concerned. As a Councillor he was closely involved in matters connected with roads, one of those issues which acutely affect our daily lives. He enjoyed working with Jim and Mick and developing his own projects when he finally became Chairman.

I asked him what he is most proud of during this time. He feels that the important thing is to be consistent and to keep momentum going. His continuing efforts to renovate and conserve the Memorial Hall are vital not only as a place for events to take place, but to make sure that the school can continue to function in a number of ways there. Although his plans for the playing fields were perhaps seen as a bit ambitious at the time they were drawn up, he is particularly happy to see the zip wire project well on its way and other plans, similar to ones he had dreamt of, in the pipeline.

However, above all he is particularly proud of two other things. He has raised the profile and connection of the PC with the public, achieved by his rebuilding the website, plus direct communication via a new Facebook page that he set up, and of course, sponsorship of The Villager. It has meant that the public feel confident to raise all manner of issues with the Council directly and via these mediums. Secondly, he feels proud of the WW1 Son-et-Lumiere. He helped bring Click's vision to life for one of Avening's biggest ever events. He is looking forward to supporting Patrick Mulligan as he takes up the role of Chairman and although he will continue on the Council for a short time, he intends to leave completely fairly soon to enjoy some travel and his family life, including his grandchildren.

Tony and Mandy feel strongly that they are not essentially risk takers. Each of the three occasions on which they took a chance were carefully considered. They bought, as an investment property, a house in St Ives about 16-17 years ago, which they recently sold. Tony made the bold decision all those years ago to leave his 'safe', but unsatisfying, job to go freelance and finally they closed their eyes, jumped and reached for the stars, when they built their beautiful house here in Avening.



Tony and Mandy are happy, generous people. He feels that he has been lucky, but I think that they have made their own luck and it was fun to hear their story.

Keeping in Touch

They have usually done this with the support and encouragement of a family member and I know it has not been without a good bit of determination on their part and of course some frustration! They have all been very glad they made the effort.

I have recently discovered the work of the amazing charity Abilitynet. Their aim is to make the digital world accessible to all. Amongst the very comprehensive services and support they offer are free fact sheets. They also have volunteers who can provide free IT support to older people and people with disabilities of any age. They can help with all sorts of IT (information technology) challenges, from setting up new equipment, fixing technical issues, to showing you how to stay connected to family and use online services. Realising what a lifesaver emails, photos, and Zoom and FaceTime chats and online shopping have been for many of us perhaps now would be a good time to take the digital plunge yourself or to encourage someone else, with your help to have a go. And a follow up report of a personal experience of using this service

Since writing the above article I had the opportunity to recommend Abilitynet to Mary Hatherall who was looking for help to access online resources for her Aunt, Gaye Powell. Gaye, in her late eighties likes to keep in touch but does not get out and about so much these days. Having made initial contact online Mary was phoned by the charity the following day. They are not able to do home visits at present because of Covid restrictions but offered her the phone number of a volunteer, Steve, who she could ring for help. Mary has done this now a couple of times 'I was not quite sure of the next step and Steve was so helpful' she says. Mary's latest success was a 'Zoom sing along with Auntie Gaye'. Mary, with advice from Steve, has other ideas to try too and in helping Gaye she is gaining confidence and expertise herself – well done Mary and indeed well done Gaye!



Avening Playgroup



Over the past few weeks we have been looking at:

- Going to school looking at photos of the school and lots of discussions about Teachers, uniforms, forest school, school lunches, assemblies and the playgrounds.
- Traditional stories listening to, retelling them using visuals, acting out the stories and drawing pictures about them.
- Physical activities Let's Move program, daily physi -gym, obstacle course, races and ball games football, throwing, catching and bouncing the balls in hoops. The children especially enjoyed the running races and balancing on the beam during the obstacle course.

During the warmer weather the children have had lots of fun and splashes playing with the water – lots of pouring and filling different sized containers.

Staff are currently planning forward to the autumn term and especially looking at the changes to the Early Years Foundation Stage. The aim of the reforms is to improve the outcomes at age 5 and to reduce the workload. The 7 areas of learning and development remain the same, but they are more detailed and



concentrate more on early language and extending vocabulary. There is also a new requirement to promote good oral health. There is a new version of Development Matters which remains non-statutory. The main difference is the age bands which will be Birth to 3; 3 and 4 year olds; Children in Reception. There will be more emphasis on professional judgement, based on practitioner knowledge and experience.

A big thank you to the committee and everyone who has supported the playgroup over

the past year, whether it be cutting the grass, going to the tip, purchasing/donating items or fixing things. It has once again been a tough year and the support has been greatly appreciated. I can only hope that the next school year will be less disruptive for everyone.

We wish the children leaving us this summer all the best and hope they will be very happy starting school in September.
