Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



A relatively quiet month with seemingly little to report, although there are a number of issues as mentioned in previous letters bubbling away in the background; such as the water levels in the stream and progress on repairing and updating the Memorial Hall. I will keep you updated on these as and when we have something new to report.

I will be making every effort to attend the Community Café each Tuesday morning, and use it as a form of Parish Surgery for anyone that wants to meet and discuss any parish issues in person.

Playing Field

Always feels great to report good news – the Parish Councillors have unanimously supported the purchase of two more table benches to further enhance the experience of enjoying the playing field, whether it be for a picnic or watching your children play. These should be in place by the time this has been published as the two benches were delivered to my house yesterday.

I'm also very pleased to report that the Parish Councillors have approved the purchase of two additional pieces of play equipment for the children's 'enclosure' - namely a Slide and a small Roundabout. I have just placed the order and with a lead time of about 8 weeks, it will be around the Christmas period when they are installed.

Both of these pieces of equipment will be suitable for younger children, from the age of 2 upwards. The Roundabout is known as a 'Low Rotator'; and the slide is a 'Mound Slide' which will be wide enough for an adult to accompany a younger child if necessary. It will effectively be floor mounted on a mound of earth so falling off sideways presents minimal danger. So, no excuses for grandparents – come and have a go.

Tree Planting

As part of the Ash die-back replenishment we have asked for an allocation of 150 whips from Gloucestershire County Council

There is an on-line consultation to help form decisions for the 2022/23 budget. I would ask everyone who is able to go online and register their views and gain an insight into the current financial restraints placed on the council.

The consultation is open until midnight on Friday 19^{th} November 2021, and can be accessed via the Cotswold District Council website. There will also be a local 'Budget Consultation Engagement' visit on Friday 5^{th} November in Tetbury, The Market Place, 11.00am – 2.00pm for anyone wishing to attend.



The Truth About Brictric

There is a legend that our church in Avening was founded by Queen Matilda, wife of William the Conqueror, as an act of penance.

Before her marriage, Matilda was a princess in Flanders (one of her ancestors had married the daughter of Alfred the Great, from whom our present Queen is also descended).

To Flanders came an ambassador who the Thane (Anglo Saxon gentry) called Brictric (though Domesday Book spells it as Beorhtric). Matilda fell for him and proposed marriage, but he did not reciprocate.

Years later, when she had married William of Normandy and become Queen of England, she



took her revenge. She appears to have persuaded her husband to dispossess Brictric of all his lands, including those in Avening, and caused him to be sent to prison, where he is said to have died.

What are the known facts about Brictric? They are few but these are the sources.

The first is Domesday Book, which says that in the time of King Edward the Confessor Brictric held the Manor of Avening though 'now' (in the time of King William when the Domesday Book was completed) it belonged to the King. In addition, Brictric held land at Thornbury, Old Sodbury, Fairford and, most importantly, Tewkesbury. He also held several other small places, all of which now belonged to the King. Brictric had been the wealthiest Thane below the rank of Earl and also owned estates in Worcestershire and elsewhere.

Before the Norman Conquest some of the English nobility had defected to Canute. It appears that Brictric was among those, because he continued to witness royal Charters well into the reign of Canute. His reasons for transferring his allegiance will never be known. It seems that support for Aethelred the Unready and even for Edward the Confessor was wavering and some people genuinely thought (and probably rightly) that Canute would make a better King. However, it may also have meant that they would remain in a position of power, as indeed they did.

In the 1040s and 50s Brictric was still holding a position in the witness list, which was an indication of great importance in the royal court. In one Charter he retained some sort of ownership of the estates his father had bequeathed to Tewkesbury Abbey until 1065 at the latest.

It was not until after the next conquest under William the Norman that Brictric's career came to an abrupt end, as told in the legend, and the stage was set for Matilda's Act of Penance.



Avening School

It's all happening at Avening School!

There is so much activity happening in school at the moment and it doesn't stop at the end of the school day. The variety of weekly after school clubs taking place this term include; football, tag rugby, cross country and art. FGR also run a multi skills club after school each week. There is also plenty of singing to be heard at the moment with our Young Voices choir learning the songs for the concert in January held at the Birmingham NEC.

Before half term, school will hold its annual harvest festival with children bringing in donations for Cirencester Foodbank. The y1-y6 pupils will also be paying visits in their classes to the community orchard in Avening where they will take part in seasonal workshops.

On Friday 12th November, the school council are asking the whole school to wear anything with strips, spots or patterns on to raise money for Children in Need. We also have 'kindness week' coming up this month with the whole school working on anti-bullying themes.

The children were so excited beforehand and a huge thanks must go to FOAS and also to Mel and Richard Young who ran the disco. As well as being a wonderful event for the children, the disco also raised much-needed funds for the school.

We are looking forward to welcoming children's author Hannah Shaw into school this term when she comes to talk to the children about writing and illustrating stories and will read from her hugely successful 'Unipiggle' books,

Last month, we bid farewell to our wonderful Reverend Gerald who came in and gave his last assembly before his retirement. We are incredibly grateful for everything that Reverend Gerald has done for our school community over the past few years and wish him all the very best for the future.

A team of y5/6 pupils participated in our first interschool event since before Covid, when they took part in a Quick Sticks Hockey tournament at Deer Park School. We were so impressed with the teamwork displayed by our players who won both matches they played, as well as learning hockey skills.

We were so delighted to welcome visitors back into our school again at our annual open morning last month. Visitors were given a tour of our school by members of the school council and then treated to resident baker Mrs Wilkinson's delicious cake.



During the past month the children have been learning about:

During the Pandemic of 2020/2021, Avening's Community Café continued its life with groups of six people meeting in gardens, scattered throughout the village. Farm Life





As we turn our thoughts towards winter, we can take time to reflect on the summer months now behind us. I am really pleased with how this summer has panned out, from establishing new herbal ley fields to making enough silage and hay to last over the coming winter and watching the first of the new offspring on the farm become part of the herd. The past couple of months have been taken up mainly by establishing another 60 acres of herbal ley which again moves the farm closer towards our regenerative agriculture aim. The next few weeks will be taken up with ensuring that the farm is set up for the colder months ahead that will bring with it an increased demand in livestock chores from us as farmers. We 'out winter' all of our cattle, except our young stock and as a result need to start designating pastures that are capable of

withstanding cattle grazing on them all winter. We tend to stop grazing such fields in September allowing tussocky grass to form creating a thick 'carpet' capable of withstanding hoofs without being churned up. Cattle will soon be moved from their summer grazing to these fields by either walking them through the lanes, very reminiscent of a bygone era, or with our livestock box to fields a bit further away.

This year we will be trialing a new method of overwintering cattle called 'standing hay'. The difference with these fields as opposed to our winter pasture is that they have not been grazed at all through the summer, creating a thick tall sward of grass that goes to seed and dries off and dies in the stalk creating the term 'standing hay.' The nutritional value of this is low; however, in the bottom of the grass there is an abundance of clover providing high protein value. We have also dotted bales out within these paddocks to provide the grazing cattle with a diverse and complete diet to aid in their growth and development. This is known as 'buffer feeding'. The benefits to this concept are that the cattle are able to overwinter on fields not usually suitable, less machinery input has been used to make the hay and cattle are able to graze in the form most natural to



them in the wild.

As with most concepts I'm sure we will come across some teething problems but having the native breeds of cattle that we do, they will be able to adapt to any change quickly.

Our new business venture of selling our own native breed beef straight to the consumer from the farm has started really well, the support from the village has been remarkable and we are currently working with our butcher to ensure there is plentiful supply for November and the Christmas period. It installs faith in us as small scale farmers that the public are prepared to buy local and support British agriculture.

Smart Meters

Picture A is a Smart Prepayment Meter (SPPM). **Picture B** is the In-House Display unit (IHD) which displays all the information being collected by the smart meter.



Traditional prepayment meters (PPM) are notorious for giving little information to the user yet the tariff that most PPMs use are above average in cost. Most energy suppliers provide PPM tariffs that are very similar so there is little to be gained from switching suppliers. However, PPMs are popular since they avoid the user getting into debt but have the complication of requiring a key, computer or mobile phone to be used to load the money onto the PPM.

Recently, Citizens Advice was contacted by a client (client B) who had an traditional PPM but had applied for and got a Smart Prepayment Meter installed. With an app on his mobile phone, client B successfully loaded money onto the SPPM. Then the IHD provided him with an enormous amount of information which he used to hunt throughout his house for ways of reducing his electricity and gas usage.

Firstly, the IHD provided `real time` information on his actual usage. So taking electricity as the example, Client B switched off all his electrical appliances so that there was no electricity being used. This revealed that there was a faulty electrical socket in which the electricity was arcing between the wires and using 88 watts (annual cost £100+). Switching off all the plugs in this socket stopped the wastage and reduced the usage to zero.

Client B then switched on, one by one, each of the electrical appliances that he needed to run his home thereby seeing how much electricity each used and assessed what he could do to save electricity. The client used two approaches (1) was to use gas rather than electricity whenever possible because the former is 80% cheaper by, for example, boiling water in a saucepan rather than an electric kettle. And (2) switching off appliances not required. For example client B found that there was a fan for drawing air into the house to reduce dampness which was totally unnecessary in periods of dry weather - so it was switched off in these periods. The client's actions reduced the electricity by half without loss of any necessary appliances while maintaining a home which was kept warm, safe and healthy.

The lesson from this case study is that a Smart Prepayment Meter could give valuable information to consumers which, if used, could save money. Smart meters on their own do not save money, it is the actions taken by the consumer based on the smart meter information which could save money.

(Note that eligibility may vary to the details shown in this article and savings require consumer action)





Church Details

When our church bells are rung the sound travels along the valley, bouncing off the hills and surrounding the whole village. It is a cacophony to lift the heart.

The oldest 2 bells in the church tower date from 1628, and 2 others were added in about 1756. It wasn't until 1903 that the ring of six bells was completed with the addition of two more bells.



chamber is too narrow for any of the bells, so they are raised into position through a round trap door in the ceiling under the tower.

As part of our Millennium project, the bells were lowered and taken to be re-tuned at the foundry, then raised into position on a newly constructed frame.

Avening names going back centuries are inscribed onto the walls of the tower, commemorating some of those who have pulled the bells for us.
