Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



As the curtain rises on the New Year there seems to be a general air of

optimism – Covid restrictions are about to be eased with the promise of life returning closer to the normality of the pre-pandemic period.

Looking back, the Christmas period was celebrated by a full congregation at the Carol Service and I would pass on our grateful thanks to the Gatcombe Estate for once again supplying a Christmas Tree for the benefit of the village.

This being the Queen's Jubilee year there is the opportunity to enjoy some community celebrations. Many of you may well be planning your own localised house or street parties – however the possibility of bringing the village together in some form of 'Avening celebration' is one not to be missed if at all possible. The Parish Council would like to hear from anyone who has ideas on how and what we might arrange – so please let us know your wishes and we'll see what we can do.

Whilst on the subject of the Queen's Jubilee, Avening has received two Oak 'whips' which we will planting to mark the event. One of these has been kindly accepted by Jane Rushton to plant in the school garden; the other we plan to site in the playing field.

This year we will also celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Memorial Hall – so again any suggestions or offers of help will be welcomed by the Parish Council. Worth mentioning that it is in memory of some 48 local lives sacrificed in the two World Wars.

Top of the Parish Council agenda this month has been the 2022/23 Budget. Always a difficult balancing act between prioritising and achieving ambitions and keeping costs to a minimum. You may be aware that Cotswold District Council have decided that they will pass on the costs of local elections (not National Government Elections) to the individual parishes. The cost to Avening would be a charge of £2,700.00 p.a. with no corresponding reduction by C.D.C. in their Council Tax Charges – i.e. it is a way of raising more money without C.D.C. taking the blame/responsibility. C.D.C. also plan to pass the costs of servicing Dog waste bins to local parishes – again with no corresponding reduction in Council Tax Charges. Avening Parish Council have decided to strongly object; whereby we will be writing to the C.D.C. informing them that we do not wish to comply with this strategy and we will also be inviting all the other Parish Councils to adopt a similar stance.

Unfortunately, Ash die-back will cause a large impact in the Parish Budget for this year – we need to raise an additional £5000 as a minimum, to deal with a significant number of trees around the Playing Field which represent a possible danger to the public. Failure to act on the problem may well compromise our Playing Field public liability insurance so we find ourselves between a rock and a hard place.

2022 has arrived so let's try and make the most of the year ahead. I'm always available on the phone or at the Tuesday Café if you want to discuss any of the issues mentioned or have any others that need addressing. Keep safe and well.

One of my roles on the Parish Council is to oversee the village defibrillator located in the old red BT telephone box on Avening High Street. Regular weekly checks are undertaken to ensure its always ready for use in an emergency. The existing instructions for use are being revised and updated in order to help simplify how it should be used.

Working alongside the other Parish Councillors, I contribute, support and offer suggestions as to how issues raised by local residents may be addressed whilst working within the financial and practical constraints within the Parish.

Happy New Year to us All! It has been a fulsome couple of months here. Our December was enriched with carols, mince pies, candles and glorious church services. The service of Lessons and Carols led by the Avening Angels, and the Nativity as presented by the children of Avening, were particularly wonderful. On Christmas Eve, Michael Irving made the middle-of-the-night journey from Painswick to Avening to lead us in a beautiful Midnight Mass, for which we are deeply grateful.



Then, just as the Christmas trees were taken down, January brought the Twelfth Day of Christmas and the arrival of the Three Kings, to worship the new-born Babe during that ancient era of plots, intrigues and political jostling - which sounds rather like the world we live in today.





Congratulations to Avening resident Sabine, who has Charles been awarded an OBE (Most Excellent Order of the British Empire) by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in her Year's New Honours list for 2022. Charles, ex-war reporter and Huntington's disease advocate, has been awarded the honour for charitable and voluntary services in his mission to improve the lives of Huntington's families everywhere. Charles said ""This is far from an honour awarded to me alone. It must

be shared with the hundreds of

thousands of courageous Huntington's disease patients and their carers whose brave struggles have, for generations, remained in the shadows of recognition beyond our community, because their plight has been so hidden."

Church Details

Until about 20 years ago, the church organ was situated under the tower, in the arch of the South Transept. Older men in the village would grin as they described how, as boys, they had raced down the footpath from Church Farm to the back door of the transept, in time to pump the organ for the organist on Sundays. When electricity was installed, the boys were redundant and, eventually, the pipe organ was replaced with a modern electric model.



The walls of the transept have now been plastered, giving no hint of the grand Perpendicular window which had filled the East wall there, however the stone shaping can still be seen outside, near the stairway to the bell tower. The transept would have been luminous!

On the inner side of the archway of the South Transept there are a few streaks of dark red paint. They are the only surviving remnants of the coloured paintwork which would have decorated the church in its younger days.

80 Years of Continuous Service to the Community

Life was very different 80 years ago when a local branch of the national Citizens Advice set up in the Dyer Street, Cirencester. It was 1941 and the height of the Second World War. Concerns of clients were understandably often related to the war, with many queries about food rationing, damaged clothes and property. As the war ended, questions about help with repatriation and food parcels became more common.

In current times, our top enquiry areas are benefit entitlements, debt, housing, energy, employment and family problems. We work closely with the North Cotswold and Cirencester foodbanks and enquiries about Food Vouchers continue to be high. Advice given by well trained volunteers, backed up by a small number of staff, was as key then as it is today.

In 2013 we joined with Stroud Citizens Advice to become Citizens Advice Stroud and Cotswold Districts. We are a small local charity which relies on support from our District Councils, town and parish councils and on donations from local organisations and individuals. We also receive grants for some of our project work. For many years our work in the Cotswolds has been supported by the Friends of Cotswold Citizens Advice (a separate registered charity). They raise funds, help with publicity and most recently they have provided help with funding to support advice at the

Food Bank, and with computer costs.

The Friends recently helped raise funds with a street collection in Cirencester Market Place, coinciding with the Christmas Market on 5th December. They also wanted to ensure that the local community were aware of the 80 years of continuous service. Thanks to the sterling efforts of the Friends, with help from volunteer receptionists and advisers, a total of £227.31 was collected, which will be increased through Gift Aid.



not-for-profit community event. Any profit made after screening/ licence costs will be donated to local charities.




Down Memory Lane

I was lucky enough to recently be rootling through a few of Avening's historical records, as one does, and came across the following newspaper article entitled 'Tragedy of Ledgemore'. I have shortened it a bit so that it is easier to read and it seems a remarkable example of verbal tradition maintained for many centuries. Sometimes, embedded with such local traditions, might be grain of fact which could point to other interesting and sometimes important discoveries. Here goes:

Around the 1890's, a Tetbury solicitor was talking to an old farmer in Horsley, who had a strange story to tell. He said that in the valley now known as Ledgemore Bottom, situated half way between Chavenage Green and Barton End, there was once a village with a church and that one field had been a burial ground.

On visiting the site, the solicitor was unable to find any visual evidence of this story. However, he did visit the Records Office in London, where he discovered several documents written in medieval Latin, revealing that there had indeed been a village there. This village then disappeared after its inhabitants had been wiped out by Black Death (bubonic plague) in 1349.

I have subsequently had a wander around Ledgemore Bottom and could not find anything to back up the old farmer's story. But I did think of that village and how it might possibly have been rather a good spot back in its day.....

The children are settling back into the playgroup routine after the Christmas holidays and we have been talking about what we did during the break, animals and their babies, as well as looking at ourselves and talking about feelings.

This included the following activities:

- Talking about the Christmas holidays and drawing pictures of our favourite things:

- Do they have a clear bedtime routine so that they are not tired for school?
- Can they use their hands and fingers to draw, colour, paint, stick,



mould dough and cut out?

Farm Life



I hope you all had a lovely Christmas and a Happy New Year. It was a quiet Christmas for us here at Court Farm with the cattle settled into their winter grazing and the field work on hold until the land dries up.

Just before Christmas we started to turn our attention to getting our original herd of Gloucesters into calf using Artificial Insemination (AI). The remaining Gloucesters in the herd were already in-calf when we bought them from the Bathurst Estate.



As we are going back to using AI on our Gloucesters instead of buying another bull, we had the vet call in to scan the cows to determine if they are fertile and capable of conception. It was very interesting for us to see this on a hand-held ultrasound scanner with the vet explaining what he was looking for. A number of factors can contribute to how fertile the cow is, such as how well the last calving went and most importantly their body condition. We have to ensure that the cows are kept in a condition where they will be at their optimum to be fertile. The phrase 'fit not fat' is used where the cows' diet is chosen, to ensure that they

maintain body condition without laying extra fat down. This is in contrast to the cattle that we are finishing on grass and herbal ley where the opposite is true.

Ensuring that the cow is maintained in this condition in the run up to AI starts a long time before the service date. We do this by feeding them on hay made from old grass on the pastures which contain a low nutritional value. This diet can also comprise of straw, being the by-product of arable farming. The idea is to not restrict the cow's intake of fodder, but reduce the nutritional value of the food she takes in. This way she always has a full stomach to allow rumination (being particularly important to create body heat and keep them warm in the winter). Farmers use the term 'fill-belly' for this type of feeding. Another key part of ensuring the cow is at optimum for AI is to ensure that she has ample availability to take on essential vitamins and minerals. We do this by providing them with 'lick' mineral buckets and rock salt.

We were fortunate that all of the girls that need to be Al'd were in the correct condition to do so. We even had a surprise when one of our cows on inspection by the vet was found to be in-calf! Despite showing absolutely no sign of being pregnant the vet informed us that she was nearly full term and to expect a calf very soon! This would be an offspring from our previous bull. We are continuing to push on with our direct sales of beef boxes straight from the farm. Retail is a completely new side of farming for us but I think it's fair to say that we are all really enjoying getting to know new people, most of whom have been living in the village for years! We have decided to sell our beef in individual cuts for January and February alongside our beef boxes, so be sure to check out our social media pages to see what's available, or send us an email at: **flpowellandsons@outlook.com** and I'll happily let you know what is currently in stock.

Are you an Owner or a Custodian?

That's the question I pose: do you think you own your house, piece of land or are you just a Custodian for future generations to come. The real answer is you are just a Custodian as humans have not yet found the key to immortality; when you're gone, the house, land etc will still be there.

So let's deal with the Custodian aspect as there are duties that you owe to the area, and by that I mean not just land ownership. For the people who have moved into the area over recent years remember why you came. Was it just that there are good schools, or that the area is a place of outstanding beauty, and/or, all the local traditions that go along with the area which enhance its appeal.

I have lived all my life in Avening and over the 68 years I have seen and enjoyed all that the area can offer. The "Toffs", as we called them in years gone by, also played their part by allowing and supporting functions and sports events on their land, and some in their generosity even gave land to be used by the community. I refer to our playing field, and the now gone Avening Football Field. And don't forget our magnificent Church to which we owe the yearly "Pigs Face Day "celebrations to remember the completion of the building of the Church.

Sadly, the present Custodian of the land in Cherington has decided that permission to use the land where for decades the sound of leather on willow could be heard, watched, and enjoyed by many, has been removed.

When I was small in the 1950's and growing up food rationing still existed; not that I knew much about that, but looking back I remember all the gardens tended with love and pride, not just out of necessity, but out of personal pride and the love of good home grown food. I remember too all the great orchards around the area which as kids we plundered throughout the growing seasons. Strawberry patches, gooseberries and later on in the year, apple scrooping. I think we also enjoyed being chased by the gardeners when they realised what we were up to.

The point I am making is that the former Villagers made the best use of what they had and also enjoyed all the rivalries and traditions that existed between the local football and cricket teams, darts and skittle teams etc. The WI, the Good Companions, our own Brass Band, Bell ringers and Pubs etc all formed part of the village community.

Now I am going to move onto present day and point out some of the good and bad Custodianship that I see around the area.

Firstly, let's give credit to some of the good Custodians who work hard to preserve and improve the area. Let's start with Gatcombe: prior to the present Custodian the estate was falling into rack and ruin, but it has now been brought back up to scratch as a working farm, with walls tracks and fields properly maintained. Avening Court, steeped in local history, is also being maintained and enhanced by the new Custodians, just to name a few.

The Golf club is well run, tidy and an asset and the Parish Councils of both Avening and Cherington are heroic in their efforts to maintain the fabric of the Villages. The local farmers: as an example, take a walk or ride up Star Lane and follow it through to Tetbury or Cherington, and see all the hedges neatly clipped, the fields maintained and planted.

Sadly I move onto some areas where I feel the present Custodians are letting the side down.

Firstly it is not just your civic duty but backed up in law, so please keep all your hedges, walls and trees where they encroach onto the highways or local tracks clear, I notice that there are some that don't.

The area I notice that desperately needs some attention is the road from Avening through Nagshead to Cherington. Trees and hedges encroach onto the highway, woodlands are not being sufficiently maintained, walls are in disrepair and the fields on the right hand side of the road leading out of Nagshead to Cherington are an absolute disgrace.

Going from Nagshead up to Cherington the woods and walls seem to be devoid of attention. However, I'm glad to see that the adjacent Custodians of Aston Farm have taken to clearing a lot of brash and maintaining their woodlands.

We have heard the question of why the water flow through the village has fallen. I can tell you one reason; the fields outside Nagshead on the Cherington side have been left to their own devices and have now become a swamp which is soaking up a lot of water. I remember that as being useful land with a good trout stream running through it.

I hope that posing some of these questions will lead you to consider...

Are you the Owner, or just the Custodian for future generations to come?

Don't forget to claim your State Pension!



In years past you would have received your State Retirement Pension automatically. You may not be aware but this is no longer the case, so you will have to claim it to receive it! At Citizens Advice we have been contacted by an increasing number of people who did not realise this.

You should get a letter from **the Pension Service** no later than 2 months before your 66th birthday (which is the current State Pension Age) telling you what to do to claim your pension. If you do not receive this letter you can still make a claim in the 4 months up to reaching your state pension age.

It is important to claim your State Pension as soon as you can, as there may be delays in payment if you leave claiming it too close to your 66th birthday, which could lead to financial difficulties for some people.

How to claim - The quickest way to get your State Pension is to apply online at www.gov.uk/get-state-pension but if you don't have access to the internet you can request a form by calling **the Pension Service on 0800 731 7898**.

You can check your State Pension age online at www.gov.uk/state-pension-age Get a forecast of how much money you might get at www.gov.uk/check-statepension


