# **Avening and Cherington Churches**

How can the end of summer have arrived so quickly? We hope it has been a time of fun and restoration for everyone.

The church in Avening will be open from 8:30 to 10.30am on Wednesday, September 6th, the first day back at school and the beginning of the Playgroup term. Coffee and tea will be served, with plenty of cake, to ease our way back into the routine. The toys will be set out for younger children.

On September 17th we celebrate the dedication of our village church, almost 950 years ago. We refer to 'Avening Church' all the time, rarely using the church name. Ours is Holy Cross Church, and the Feast of the Holy Cross is in the middle of September. The Archdeacon of Gloucester, Hilary Dawson, will take the Holy Communion service for us at 10 o'clock that day, and we will party with cake and fizz in the church afterward. All are welcome.

Afterwards, there will be a procession down to the Memorial Hall, bearing the pig's head for the Pig Face Day event, an interpretation of the feasts provided for the villagers by Queen Matilda on the completion of the church (originally with pork from the wild boars in Hazel Wood). Holy Cross church in Avening is the only church in the country to have been commissioned by a queen.

There will be a schedule of the afternoon events elsewhere in the magazine. It sounds like a great day out!

# **District Councillor's Report**



**At CDC:** There was no meeting in August, so nothing to report directly, but we are aware of a looming crisis in the planning department due to several officers resigning, where there was already a shortfall of staff. This will obviously affect residents who need to apply for property works in the coming months.

Readers may be aware of the forthcoming changes to parliamentary boundaries — a government commission was tasked with making all constituencies the same size of around 77,000 voters. These changes will apply from the next general election, but we effectively now have a new MP in our area of the 'South Cotswolds' (which includes the area from Cirencester to north Wiltshire) — James Gray. As CDC councillor in his new patch, I was invited to show James around the area, and took him on a driving tour of Grumbolds Ash and beyond, pointing out local highlights and where issues have arisen.

James is very approachable, is very active in the community, and prides himself on responding to all enquiries from the public.

**Avening:** I briefed James on several issues in the village, notably the ongoing issues with the stream, and he was keen to help when appropriate. At the end of the tour, we entertained James and other invited guests at The Bell, who provided the usual excellent food and hospitality.

There was no Parish Council meeting this month either, so a little quiet in Avening. Patrick may have mentioned this in his article, but the building works by the Playgroup have continued to cause issues, and I am frustrated that the traffic management plan that we insisted upon is useless as it only covers activities on the site itself – definitely not what was intended!

#### 1947-2023

With the kind permission of her family, here is the eulogy from Della's funeral service held on Monday 24 July.

Della was one of 3 children, John Richards being her older brother and Marlene Smart her younger sister. She was born in The Forest of Dean and spent her first few years in Coleford with her mum Queenie Baker and brother John. She spent a lot of time with her 'Granny & Grancher Richards', who she thought the world of.

In her early years Queenie and Della moved from the Forest and took up residence on the Chavenage Estate in Lodge Cottage. Chavenage was to be at the heart of Della's life for years to come.

When she was 15 years old, Chavenage House advertised for a nanny for the Lowsley Williams children; Della applied for and succeeded in getting the position. This was the start of a role which saw her stay with the family for 61 years, and it was only when ill health took over that she could no longer make the short journey to Chavenage to her 2nd family to do the job she loved so much.

It was on the Chavenage Estate where she met her beloved husband-to-be Barry, who was also working on the Estate at the time. They married on the 10th September 1966 and soon afterwards made the short trip to Avening, where they set up home in Sunground and lived happily with their two children Mark and Claire. Mark and Claire also have a lot of childhood memories at Chavenage; feeding the lambs, riding the horses and many happy days playing in the stable yard—and also being chased by the bull one day whilst going to the allotment.

Della and Barry very much enjoyed ballroom dances and would go to many dances with friends and dance the night away. Della also had a huge passion for her garden and enjoyed all the different flower shows, open gardens and garden centres, buying new species for her garden which she was so proud of.

Another love was for all her animals; her bantam chickens, her fish in the pond which Barry built, her beloved African Grey parrot Tilly who still sounds like Barry and very occasionally swears like Barry! We also have her beloved tortoises, one of them being older than Mark, who have now set up residence with Claire in Nailsworth, and most of all her companion for life Oscar the Cairn Terrier. You may have seen her walking Oscar every day, until ill health took over and she was no longer able, but he was her best friend right until the end and is now being looked after by her granddaughter Jessica.

We took annual holidays to Tenby with all the extended family for many years, where we would take over a guest house run by family friends, Don and Joyce, and we all have so many happy memories of these times, we would load the dingy up in the morning ready for the day ahead and spend all day on the beach with all the

family before returning to the guest house, and we would do this for the whole week we were there.

Della was quite a private lady but family was everything to her. She loved her children, Mark and Claire dearly, and she was over the moon when Mark & Fiona went on to have their own children Jessica and Zac, she was so proud to be a grandmother and her love then extended to Jessica and Zac. As the years passed Jessica and Zac went on to have their own children Evie and Esme which made Della a great grandmother; she was over the moon and her love for all of us extended to be one big happy family. The great grandchildren brought the biggest smile to Della's face and she lit up when they visited.



# Village People

#### **Frances Conway**

As you will have gathered from last month's editorial, Frances Conway, who has been a valued member of the editorial team for this magazine for ten years, is stepping down as she is moving out of the village - all the way to Tetbury! Before she goes, we thought you would like to know a little more about her.



Frances was born in London, where her father was a doctor who later became a very distinguished cardiologist. Her parents met at the hospital in Brighton, where her mother was working as the Almoner, or hospital-based social worker; she told her daughter some fascinating stories of the poverty and tribulations faced by people during WWII and in the days before the NHS.

Frances's own life, however, was very different. "We lived in this vast house in Chelsea," she explains, "where my brother and I lived on the top floor with our nanny, just like in Victorian days! It really was from another era, so unbelievably different from family life now or even how I brought up my own children. But it was a very happy and secure childhood despite that." She went to junior school in Kensington and at the age of 11 became a boarder at Godolphin School in Salisbury. "It was very old-fashioned, but I have to say I

loved boarding school," she continues. "I was very eager and keen and wanted to join in everything and loved all the sport."

Although she doesn't mention it, she was obviously very bright and did well there, going to university a year early, to study law at University College London. "I didn't really enjoy university as much as I might have done, possibly because I was too young, and I also decided when I graduated that the law wasn't for me. Luckily I had also had some secretarial training, and I got a job at the Old Bailey as the assistant to the Judges. That was a great job; very interesting, because I got to sit in some fascinating cases, but also great fun, as I was involved in all the traditions and celebrations involved in the court, such as the Lord Mayor's procession."

Then Frances got married and moved away from London to settle first in Uley and has lived in various villages in Gloucestershire ever since. She stopped working for a while to bring up her two children, Nick and Lucy, but when her marriage broke up a few years later she went back to work, mostly in the legal sphere, but also with stints teaching students at Cirencester College to be Peer Advisers as well as being a tutor for the ESOL course (similar to Teaching English as a Foreign Language).

"My degree gave me part 1 of a legal qualification, but I never completed the second

part to become a fully qualified lawyer - as a single Mum I didn't really have the time - so I worked as a Family Law Executive with local solicitors, concentrating on family law, with a little crime thrown in (!), which I enjoyed enormously. I tried to help people so their experience of things like divorce was not as bad as it sometimes can be. It was very interesting and rewarding.

"I spent the final part of my career with Citizens Advice, again specialising in family law," she continues. "Despite the subject matter, I never found it depressing. People are fascinating; they came from all strands of life but we're all the same underneath. I finally retired when I was 70!"

Frances has been married to Dominic for over 30 years, having been introduced at a party by some mutual friends, and between then they have 4 children and 6 grandchildren. They moved to Church Farm in West End in 2006 and have loved living in Avening. "What's been fun is that we've done quite a lot and tried to join in life in Avening and been made very welcome," she explains. "It's

a nice village to live in and the people are very positive. I like the fact that it is a very diverse community with a wide range of ages and there are groups and people who work hard and are very supportive throughout the village. We will be very sad to leave but we feel it's the right time to downsize and go somewhere a bit easier. I'm particularly sad to leave the house, which I really love, and has so much history. Do you know we have a 'coffin way' through the house? The hall runs in a straight line from the front to the back door, and from there we have a path that goes right down to the church. It was designed so that if a funeral party couldn't get round the bend to New Inn Lane because of snow they could walk right through the house instead! I actually heard of an old lady when we first came here who remembered the last time it was used!"

What does Frances think about her 10 years as a Villager editor? "Oh, I've enjoyed it enormously! When I was asked to join the team I knew nothing about the mechanics of putting a magazine together but I reckoned I could learn. I wanted to do it partly as a way to be more involved in village life. I'm not creative, but I love writing - I wrote lots of stories as a child - and I enjoyed learning how to do these things on the computer. It's nice when people are interested enough to send their articles and It's given me tremendous satisfaction to be part of the team.

"And," she adds, "you never know, you may get me writing a new column: 'Letter from Tetbury'."

Yes please, Frances - and thank you for all your valuable work on the mag. We'll miss you! Eds.





The active campaigns include: 'Clean Rivers for People and Wildlife'; 'Thinking differently: Autistic and ADHD women'; and 'Stop Modern Slavery'.



# **Cookery Corner**

#### **Blackberry Jelly**



This year the blackberries are early, sweet, juicy and very plentiful, so I thought I would share my mother's tried and tested recipe for delicious blackberry jelly (i.e. jam without the pips). Since she was born back in 1928, the recipe is in imperial measures, but I've give approximate metric measures here as well.

- Pick blackberries and rinse them through, removing any stalks, leaves or wildlife!
- Weigh the blackberries and put them in a pot with 1/4 pint (0.57 litres) of water.
   Bring to the boil and then turn the heat down and simmer until the blackberries are soft about 20 minutes simmering probably, depending how ripe they are.
- Strain the blackberries. The traditional way is to use a jelly bag, but to be honest, I find that a right fiddle, so I just use a large sieve. Theoretically you should leave them to drain overnight and not press or mix the blackberry mush, in order to ensure that the final result is very clear, but I am usually too impatient for that and don't leave it for longer than an hour or two, pressing the final bits of juice out with the back of a wooden spoon; seems to work OK. Throw away the blackberry mush carefully blackberries stain everything they meet!
- Measure how much juice you have got and put into a large saucepan. Add 1 ib (454 gms) of granulated sugar per pint (0.57 litres) of juice and add the juice of 1/2 lemon per pint(ish). Bring it to the boil, stirring with a wooden spoon to make sure the sugar is not stuck on the bottom.
- When it has come to the boil, turn down to a medium heat and leave it boiling gently until the juice reaches 220°F (104.4°C). I find a jam or meat thermometer invaluable there are various ways to 'test for setting' but nothing works as well as a thermometer. It must get to at least that temperature half a degree less and it may not set. This will probably take at least an hour. You don't have to sit and watch it but be careful when it is nearing the final temperature as it can suddenly boil over when it gets much past setting temperature.
- A scum forms on the boiling liquid which doesn't improve the taste, so gently scrape this off towards the end of the boiling process.
- While it is boiling sterilise jars (about 1.5 standard jam jars per pint of juice) by filling them with boiling water, then place in a moderate oven to dry and keep warm
- When the jelly has reached boiling point, take off the heat and leave to cool down for about 15 to 30 minutes before pouring into the warm jars. Leave uncovered

until set, then put a circle of greaseproof paper on top of the jelly and seal. You don't have to buy official jam pot paper seals and cover: I usually just make my own paper circle and use the original tops on the pots.

It has a wonderful flavour so enjoy; it's particularly good with scones! In the sealed pot it should last as much as a year....if you can resist it that long!



# Are you struggling with damp and mould in your home?

Our Research and Campaigns team have been gathering evidence about the problem as we have seen a significant increase in the number of people coming to us about it.

There are many types of damp, the most common ones being rising, penetrating, construction and condensation damp. On our website (www.citizensadvice.org.uk) there is information that may help you work out what type of damp you have, who is responsible and what you can do.

It is important to keep homes well-heated and well-ventilated to prevent damp and mould – you may be eligible for help to insulate and heat your home.

If you are a tenant it can be difficult to work out if your landlord is responsible - check your tenancy agreement for mentions of repairs and damp. A landlord will have to act in relation to damp if it makes the property unsafe for someone to live in. The landlord will also be responsible if the damp is related to repairs they should have carried out. If the damp has damaged items that the landlord is responsible for, such as carpets and window frames, they'll likely have to cover the cost of repairs.

If your landlord is responsible for the damp in your property but doesn't act, there are steps you can take, such as reporting them to the local authority. If you're in social housing you might also be able to use the landlord's formal complaints procedure.


